By His Royal Highness the PRINCE of WALES, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty,

A. PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS divers marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces did, at the time of their respective enlistments, engage to serve His Majesty for the limited period of seven years, provided His Majesty should so long require their service, and also for such further term, not exceeding six months, as should be directed by the commanding officer on any foreign station, and not exceeding three years, as should be directed by any Proclamation of His Majesty, provided always, that in the latter case the additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of the said seven years; and whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of February one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, to direct that all marines then serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces, who had been enlisted as aforesaid, should continue to serve therein for the term of three years after the expiration of such limited period of seven years; provided always, that the said additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive treaty should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited period of service: and whereas the war between His Majesty and the United States of America unhappily continues to exist, and marines enlisting as aforesaid, cannot therefore claim the benefit of this provision, notwithstanding a definitive treaty of peace between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty, was signed at Paris on the thirtieth of May last, and the ratification thereof was duly exchanged on the seventeenth of June following; We, taking the same into Our most gracious consideration, have

therefore thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to publish this Proclamation; and We do hereby direct that all marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces, who have been enlisted for such limited period as aforesaid, and whose services were extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, for the further term of three years after the expiration of such limited period as aforesaid, the original period of whose services is not yet expired, shall be entitled to their respective discharges from the expiration of such limited period for which they were so enlisted as aforesaid. And that all marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces who have been enlisted for such limited period as aforesaid, and the period of whose services was extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, for the further term of three years after the expiration of such limited period as aforesaid, and whose original period of service for which they were so enlisted is expired, shall be forthwith entitled to their discharges from and immediately after this Our Proclamation, notwithstanding the provisions of His Majesty's Proclamation of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, this seventh day of November one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, in the fifty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf*

of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for continuing to His Majesty certain duties on malt, sugar, tobacco, and snuff, in Great Britain, and on pensions, offices, and personal estates, in England, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

An Act for raising the sum of twelve millions five hundred thousand pounds by Exchequer Bills, for the service of Great Britain, for the year one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

An Act to enable the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to issue Exchequer Bills on the credit of such aids or supplies as have been or shall be granted by Parliament, for the service of Great Britain, for the year one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

An Act to continue, until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, an Act for suspending the operation of an Act of the seventeenth year of His present Majesty, for restraining the negotiation of promissory notes and bills of exchange, under a limited sum, in England.

An Act to repeal an Act of the last session of Parliament for granting duties of Excise on certain sorts of glass made in Ireland, and for granting and allowing certain countervailing duties and drawbacks in respect thereof.

An Act to continue, during the continuance of the present hostilities, and until six months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace, so much of an Act of the thirty-fourth year of His present Majesty, as permits the importation into Great Britain and Ireland, in neutral vessels, from states in amity with His Majesty, of certain goods, wares, and merchandise.

An Act to continue, until the expiration of six months after the conclusion of the present hostilities, an Act of the forty-sixth year of His present Majesty, for authorising His Majesty in Council to allow the importation and exportation of certain goods and commodities, in neutral ships, into and from His Majesty's territories in the West Indies, and Continent of South America.

An Act to make further provision respecting the duties payable upon East India goods, and to allow bond to be given for payment of the duties upon such goods when imported by private traders.

An Act to continue, until six months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace, an Act of the forty-fifth year of His present Majesty, for granting to foreign ships, put under His Majesty's protection, the privileges of prize ships, and for allowing aliens in foreign colonies, surrendered to His Majesty, to exercise the occupations of merchants or factors during the present war.

An Act to amend several Acts relating to fines, in respect of unlawful distillation, in Ireland, to the

warehousing of spirits, and to the securing the duties of Excise on spirits distilled, and on hides and skins tanned in Ireland.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intitled "An Act to provide for the better execution of the laws in Ireland, by appointing superintending Magistrates and additional Constables in counties, in certain cases."

An Act to impose certain duties on the importation, and to allow drawbacks on the exportation, of certain sorts of wood into and from Ireland, in lieu of former duties and drawbacks on the like sorts of wood, and to indemnify persons who have admitted certain sorts of wood to entry, on payment of a proportion only of the duty imposed thereon.
