A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS divers marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces did, at the time of their respective enlistments, engage to serve His Majesty for the limited period of seven years, provided His Majesty should so long require their service, and also for such further term, not exceeding six months, as should be directed by the commanding officer on any foreign station, and not exceeding three years, as should be directed by any Proclamation of His Majesty, provided always, that in the latter case the additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of the said seven years; and whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of February one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, to direct that all marines then serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces, who had been enlisted as aforesaid, should continue to serve therein for the term of three years after the expiration of such limited period of seven years; provided always, that the said additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive treaty should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited period of service: and whereas the war between His Majesty and the United States of America unhappily continues to exist, and marines enlisting as aforesaid, cannot therefore claim the benefit of this provision, notwithstanding a definitive treaty of peace between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty, was signed at Paris on the thirtieth of May last, and the ratification thereof was duly exchanged on the seventeenth of June following; We, taking the same into Our most gracious consideration, have therefore thought fit, in the name and on the

behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to publish this Proclamation; and We do hereby direct that all marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces, who have been enlisted for such limited period as aforesaid, and whose services were extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, for the further term of three years after the expiration of such limited period as aforesaid, the original period of whose services is not yet expired, shall be entitled to their respective discharges from the expiration of such limited period for which they were so enlisted as aforesaid. And that all marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal Marine forces who have been enlisted for such limited period as aforesaid, and the period of whose services was extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, for the further term of three years after the expiration of such limited period as aforesaid, and whose original period of service for which they were so enlisted is expired, shall be forthwith entitled to their discharges from and immediately after this Our Proclamation, notwithstanding the provisions of His Majesty's Proclamation of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, this seventh day of November one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, in the fifty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS divers soldiers, now serving in His Majesty's army, under the provisions of the Mutiny Act, passed in the forty-sixth year

of His Majesty's reign, cap. 66, schedule A. did, at the time of their respective enlistments, engage to serve His Majesty for the limited periods therein respectively expressed, provided His Majesty should so long require the same, and for such further term, not exceeding three years, as should be directed by any Proclamation of His Majesty, provided always that in case of such direction, the said additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any Definitive Treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited periods as aforesaid; and whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing date the thirty-first day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, to direct that all soldiers then serving in His Majesty's army (the Veteran Battalions excepted), who had been enlisted for such limited periods as aforesaid, should continue to serve therein, for the space of three years after the expiration of such limited periods respectively, provided always that the said additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any Definitive Treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited periods respectively; and whereas the war between His Majesty and the United States of America, unhappily continues to exist, soldiers enlisting as aforesaid, cannot claim the benefit of this provision, notwithstanding a Definitive Treaty of Peace, between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty was signed at Paris on the thirtieth of May last, and the ratifications thereof duly exchanged on the seventeenth of June following; We, taking the same into Our most gracious consideration, have therefore thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to publish this Proclamation; and We do hereby direct, that all soldiers now serving in His Majesty's army (the Veteran Battalions excepted), who have been enlisted for such limited periods as aforesaid, and whose services were extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of the thirty-first of July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, for the further term of three years, after the expiration of such limited periods respectively, the original period of whose services is not yet expired, shall be entitled to their respective discharges from the expiration of the several periods for which they were originally enlisted; and that all soldiers now serving in His Majesty's army (the Veteran Battalions excepted), who have been enlisted for such limited periods as aforesaid, and the periods of whose services were extended by His Majesty's said Proclamation of thirty-first July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, for the further term of three years after the expiration of such limited periods respectively, and whose original periods of service for which they were enlisted are expired, shall be forthwith entitled to their respective discharges from and immediately after this Our Proclamation, notwithstanding the provisions of His Majesty's Proclamation of thirty-first July one thousand eight hundred and thirteen.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any artificer in wool, iron, steel, brass, or other metal, clock-maker, watch-maker, or any other artificer of Great Britain, to go into foreign countries out of the King's dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon indictment or information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any sum not exceeding **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** for the first offence, and shall be imprisoned three months, and till the fine be paid. And if any person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the discretion of the Court, and imprisoned twelve months, and till the fine be paid.

If any of the King's subjects, being such artificers, shall go into any country out of His Majesty's dominions, to exercise or teach the said trades to foreigners; and if any of the King's subjects in any such foreign country, exercising any of the said trades, shall not return into this realm within six months after warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the country where such artificers shall be, or by any person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this realm; such persons shall be incapable of taking any legacy, or of being an executor or administrator, or of taking any lands, &c. within this kingdom, by descent, devise, or purchase, and shall forfeit all lands, goods, &c. within this kingdom, to His Majesty's use, and shall be deemed alien, and out of His Majesty's protection.

Upon complaint made, upon oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any person is endeavouring to seduce any such artificer, or that any such artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's dominions, for the purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his warrant to bring the person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the oath of one witness, or by confession, that he was guilty of any of the said offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such person shall refuse to give security, the Justice may commit him

to gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due course of law. And if any such artificer shall be convicted, upon indictment, of any such promise, contract, or preparation to go beyond the seas, for the purpose aforesaid, he shall give such security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till security given.

If any of the above offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any artificer in wool, mohair, cotton, or silk, or in iron, steel, brass, or other metal, or any clock-maker, watch-maker, or any other artificer in any other of the manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this kingdom or Ireland into any foreign country not within the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon indictment or information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the county, &c. wherein such offence shall be committed in England, or by indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by indictment or information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such offence be committed in Ireland; the person so convicted shall, for every artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit **FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS**, and shall suffer imprisonment in the common gaol of the county or stewartry wherein such offender shall be convicted for twelve calendar months, and until forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent offence of the same kind, the persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every person contracted with or seduced, **ONE THOUSAND POUNDS**, and shall suffer imprisonment in the common gaol of the county or stewartry wherein such offender shall be convicted, for two years, and until such forfeiture be paid.

If any person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any ship or boat, not bound directly to some port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such tools or utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the preparing, working up, or finishing of the woollen or silk manufactures, or any part of such tools, he shall, for every offence, forfeit all such tools, or parts thereof, put on board, and **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS**, to be recovered by action of debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's warehouses, all such tools or utensils prohibited to be exported, as such officer shall find on board any vessel not bound directly to some port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all tools so seized shall, after condemnation, be pub-

light sold to the best bidder; and one moiety of the produce shall be to the use of His Majesty, and the other moiety to the officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his vessel, he shall, for every such offence, forfeit **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS**, to be recovered as the penalties inflicted upon persons exporting the tools; and, if the vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS**, but shall also forfeit his employment, and be incapable of any employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any entry outward, or sign any ticket or certificate for the shipping or exporting of any of the said tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS**, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his office, and be incapable of any office under His Majesty.

One moiety of the forfeitures shall be applied to the use of His Majesty, and the other moiety to the use of the person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like penalties and forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to persons packing or putting on board any vessel, not bound directly for some port in Great Britain or Ireland, any machine, engine, tool, press, paper, utensil, or implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the cotton, steel, or iron manufactures of this kingdom, or any part or parts of such machines or implements, or any models or plans thereof; and all Captains of ships and other persons receiving or being in possession of any such articles, with an intent to export the same to foreign parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of tools and utensils used in the woollen and silk manufactures.

By Command of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

Notice is hereby given, that, by an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-fourth year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the better regulation of the several ports, harbours, roadsteads, sounds, channels, bays, and navigable rivers, in the United Kingdom; and of His Majesty's docks, dock-yards, arsenals, wharfs, moorings; and stores therein; and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose," it is enacted,

SECT. 11.—That, if the owner, master, or other person having the charge or command of any private ship of war, transport, or other private merchant ship, or vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft whatsoever; or any person working any quarry, mine, or pit, near to the sea, or to any such har-

bour, haven, or navigable river, or any other person or persons whatsoever, shall cast, throw, empty, or unlade, or cause or procure to be cast, thrown, emptied, or unladen, either from or out of any such ship or vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft; or from the shore any ballast, stone, slate, gravel, earth, rubbish, wreck, or filth, into any of such ports, roads, roadsteads, harbours, havens, or navigable rivers of this kingdom, so as to tend to the injury or obstruction of the navigation thereof, or in any place, or situation on shore, where the same shall be liable to be washed into the sea, or into any such ports, roads, roadsteads, harbours, havens, or navigable rivers; every person so offending, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding ten pounds, besides all expences, to be incurred in removing to a proper place, what may have been so deposited contrary to the Act.

And this penalty and expences are, by the 21st section of the Act, declared to be recoverable before a Commissioner of His Majesty's Navy, or a Justice of the Peace, who are empowered, on nonpayment thereof, to commit the offender to the common gaol or house of correction for three months; and, by the same section, one moiety of the penalty is directed to be paid to the person giving information of the offence.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY.

Whereas Mr. John Hawkes, of Albrighton, in the county of Salop, yeoman, whilst he was travelling in the morning of the 18th day of November now last, between eleven and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, towards the town of Shiffnal, in the same county, was met, about half way between Mr. Slaney's Lodge-House and Upton-Common, and within the hundred of Brimstry, by two men, who violently assaulted him, cut off a part of his left ear, and robbed him of bills and notes to the amount of two hundred and eighty-one pounds, some of which were written upon the back with a pencil. The name of a Mr. Owen was upon one £20 and two £5 bills, and that of a Mrs. Smith upon a £5 Bank of England note.

A reward of £20 (over and above what is allowed by the Albrighton Association for the Prosecution of Felons) is hereby offered by the said John Hawkes to any person upon whose information and evidence the offenders, or either of them, may be apprehended and convicted of this daring robbery; and either of them impeaching his accomplice shall, on his conviction, be intitled to the same reward, and endeavours will be used to obtain his pardon.

One of the robbers was about six feet high, stout made, fresh complexion, round face, and had on a large drover's coat, of a grey colour, light grey stockings, and large clasps in his shoes. The other was about five feet seven or eight inches high, rather slender made, and had on a large old coat, something like his companion's.
