

houses shall have been established: But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, nevertheless, and His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to permit the importation of corn, grain, meal, flour, bran, biscuit, pulse, rice, horses, mules, neat cattle, sheep, hogs, or any other species of live stock and live provisions, into any of the said islands, lands, or territories, in which there shall not be, at the time when such articles shall be brought for importation, the following duties on such articles, being of the growth or produce of the United States of America, viz:

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to appoint the Honourable William Temple to be His Majesty's Secretary of Legation at the Court of Stockholm.

Whitehall, January 2, 1815.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Thomas Noel Harris, Esq. Captain in His Majesty's 36th (or Herefordshire) Regiment of Foot, His Majesty's royal licence and permission, that he may accept and wear the insignia of the Imperial Russian Order of St. Wolodimir, of the fourth class, and

of the Royal Prussian Order of Merit, which their Imperial and Royal Majesties the Emperor of Russia and the King of Prussia have respectively been pleased to confer upon him, in testimony of the sense entertained by those Sovereigns of the distinguished conduct displayed by the said Captain Harris during the memorable campaigns of 1813 and 1814; provided nevertheless, that His Majesty's said licence and permission doth not authorise, and shall not be deemed or construed to authorise, the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining unto a Knight Bachelor of these realms:

And His Royal Highness hath been further pleased to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered, together with the relative documents, in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Edward Pemberton, of Longnor, in the county of Salop, Esq. in behalf of Edward William Smythe Pemberton, of Condoover Park, in the said county, Esq. a minor, of the age of twenty years and upwards, only son and heir apparent of the said Edward Pemberton, and of Anna Maria Emma his wife, eldest sister and coheir of Nicholas Owen Smythe Owen, late of Condoover Park aforesaid, Esq. deceased, His royal licence and authority, that he the said Edward William Smythe Pemberton, and his issue, may from henceforth assume and take the surname of Owen only, instead of that of Pemberton, and bear and use the arms of Owen; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office; otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

Whitehall, December 26, 1814.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Abraham Rhodes Cook, of St. James's-Walk, in the parish of Clerkenwell, Gentleman, only son of William Cook, of the same place, Gentleman, by Elizabeth his late wife, deceased, only issue of Abraham Rhodes, of the same place, and of Accasin Cott, in the township of Rawden, in the West Riding of the county of York, Gentleman, His royal licence and authority, that he may from henceforth assume and take the surname of Rhodes only, instead of that of Cook, pursuant to the desire and approbation of his said grandfather; provided this concession and declaration be recorded in His Majesty's College of Arms, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.
