A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS a great number of disorderly persons have, during the three last days, publicly assembled themselves together in a riotous and tumultuous manner, and have been guilty of many violent and criminal acts and proceedings, having attacked the persons and houses of many of His Majesty's loyal subjects in several parts of the city of Westminster and county of Middlesex, and especially in the evenings and during the nights of the said three days; We, therefore, taking the same into Our most serious consideration, and being fully determined on Our part to use all means in Our power to protect the lives and properties of His Majesty's loyal subjects, to preserve the public peace, and to bring to condign punishment the authors of such violences, have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, and thereby strictly to exhort, charge, and command all His Majesty's loyal subjects to give their assistance in discountenancing and suppressing all such criminal acts and proceedings, and to give all information to the Magistrates, by which the disturbers of His Majesty's peace may be brought to punishment: and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other His Majesty's loving subjects, to be aid-

ing and assisting to the utmost of their power, in suppressing such criminal acts and proceedings, and in detecting, apprehending, and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the same: and for the better detection of any person or persons who were or may be concerned in any such criminal acts and proceedings, We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any person shall discover any other person or persons who, directly or indirectly, was or were, or may be concerned therein, so as that the person or persons discovered may be prosecuted for the same, such discoverer shall have and receive as a reward, upon conviction of such offender or offenders, the sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, and also His Majesty's gracious pardon for the said offence, in case the person making such discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, this ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, in the fifty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 155, it is enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any private person or persons to import any goods.

wares, or merchandise, from any port or place within the limits of the East India Company's charter, except only into such ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as shall be provided with warehouses, together with wet docks or basins, or such other securities as shall, in the judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them, in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, be fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon, and shall have been duly declared so to be, by the Order of His Majesty in Council, in Great Britain, or by the Order of the Lord Lieutenant in Council, in Ireland: and whereas the ports of Greenock and port Glasgow have been deemed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in Great Britain to be fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the ports of Greenock and port Glasgow are ports fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

VICE-ADMIRAL the Honourable Sir Alexander Cochrane has transmitted to John Wilson Croker, Esq. a letter from Captain Jackson, of His Majesty's ship *Lacedemonian*, stating, that, on the 5th of October, the boats of that ship having been dispatched, under the directions of Lieutenant Maw, in pursuit of an enemy's convoy discovered passing through Cumberland and Jeykell Islands, succeeded in capturing one gun-vessel, carrying five guns, and thirty or forty men, with four merchant vessels, one of which was burnt, having grounded. Lieutenant Howes, of the royal marines, Mr. Chichester, Midshipman, and two men, were wounded; the enemy had one killed, four wounded, and several driven overboard.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto William Barton Rayner, of the city of Lincoln, Esq. His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his issue, in compliance with the last will and testament of his cousin Robert Burton, late of the close of Lincoln, in the county of Lincoln, Esq. deceased, may assume and take the surname of Burton only, and also bear the arms of Burton; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to order, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the forty-sixth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for altering and enlarging the powers of an Act, made in the forty-third year of His present Majesty, for the further improvement of the port of London, by making docks and other works at Blackwall, for the accommodation of the East India shipping in the said port," it is (amongst other things) recited and enacted as follows:

"And whereas the said East India Dock Company have, in execution of the said Act, made in the forty-third year of the reign of His present Majesty, formed two docks at Blackwall aforesaid, called an outer and an inner dock: And whereas the quays or wharfs surrounding such outer dock are bounded on the north side by the wall which separates the same from the inner dock: on the south side by the River Thames; at the east end by the entrance bason and locks leading from the River Thames to the inward dock; and at the west end by the ship-builders yard, in the occupation of Messrs. Perry and Wells: And whereas it may not be necessary that such outer dock should be intirely surrounded by a high wall; be it therefore enacted, that when and as soon as it shall appear to the Lord High Treasurer, or any three or more of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, that such outer

dock is well and sufficiently inclosed and defended, although such outer dock shall not be intirely surrounded by a high wall or walls, then and in such case it shall and may be lawful for the Lord High Treasurer, or any three or more of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, to certify, by warrant under his hand or their hands, that such outer dock is well and sufficiently inclosed and defended, and upon such certificate being granted as aforesaid, the quays and wharfs which shall be built or made by the said Directors within or along the sides or banks of such outer dock, shall at all times, from and after the date of such certificate, be deemed and taken, and are hereby declared to be, to all intents and purposes whatsoever, legal quays and wharfs for lading and shipping of any goods, wares, or merchandise whatsoever within the port of London, save and except for the lading and shipping of such goods, wares, and merchandise as are or shall be subject or liable to any duty or duties of Excise, any law, statute, usage, or custom, or anything herein contained, to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding."

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do, in pursuance of the said Acts of Parliament, passed in the forty-third and forty-sixth years of His present Majesty's reign, certify, that the following works, made and erected by the East India Dock Company, under the authority of the said Acts of Parliament, are well and sufficiently inclosed and defended for the reception of ships, and for lading and shipping of goods, wares, and merchandise; that is to say,

The outer or export dock lying between the inner or import dock and the River Thames, at Blackwall aforesaid, with the quays or wharfs on the banks or sides of the said outer or export dock.
