## A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

THEREAS a great number of disorderly persons have, during the three last days, publicly assembled themselves together in a riotous and tumultuous manner, and have been guilty of many violent and criminal acts and proceedings, having attacked the persons and houses of many of His Majesty's loyal subjects in several parts of the city of Westminster and county of Middlesex, and especially in the evenings and during the nights of the said three days; We, therefore, taking the same into Our most serious consideration, and being fully determined on Our part to use all means in Our power to protect the lives and properties of His Majesty's loyal subjects, to preserve the public peace, and to bring to condign punishment the authors of such violences, have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, it is enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any

to issue this Proclamation, and thereby strictly to exhort, charge, and command all His Majesty's loyal subjects to give their assistance in discountenancing and suppressing all such criminal acts and proceedings, and to give all information to the Magistrates, by which the disturbers of His Majesty's peace may be brought to punishment: and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other His Majesty's loving subjects, to be aiding and assisting to the utmost of their power, in suppressing such criminal acts and proceedings, and in detecting, apprehending, and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the same : and for the better detection of any person or persons who were or may be concerned in any such criminal acts and proceedings, We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any person shall discover any other person or persons who, directly or indirectly, was or were, or may be concerned therein, so as that the person or persons discovered may be prosecuted for the same, such discoverer shall have and receive as a reward, upon conviction of such offender or offenders, the sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, and also His Majesty's gracious pardon for the said offence, in case the person making such discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, this ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, in the fifty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign.
