A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS a Treaty of Peace and Friendship, between His Majesty and the United States of America, hath been concluded at Ghent on the twenty-fourth day of December last, and the ratifications thereof have been duly exchanged: in conformity thereunto, We have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, hereby to command, that the same be published throughout all His Majesty's dominions: And We do declare to all His Majesty's loving subjects Our will and pleasure, that the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably as well by sea as land, and in all places whatsoever; strictly charging and commanding all His Majesty's loving subjects to take notice thereof, and to conform themselves thereto accordingly.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the seventeenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, in the fifty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign.

A PROCLAMATION.

Declaring the Cessation of Arms, as well by Sea as Land, agreed upon between His Majesty and the United States of America, and enjoining the observance thereof.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS a Treaty of Peace and Amity, between His Majesty and the United States of America, was signed at Ghent on the twenty-

fourth day of December last, by the Plenipotentiaries of His Majesty and the Plenipotentiaries of the United States: And whereas, for the putting an end to the calamities of war, as soon, and as far as may be possible, it hath been agreed between His Majesty and the said United States as follows; that is to say, that immediately after the ratifications of the said Treaty, friendship should be established between His Majesty and the said United States, by sea and land, in all parts of the world; and, in order to prevent all causes of complaint and dispute which might arise with respect to prizes that might be taken at sea after the said ratifications of the said Treaty, it has also been reciprocally agreed, that all vessels and effects which may be taken after the space of twelve days from the said ratifications, upon all parts of the coasts of North America from the latitude of twenty-three degrees north to the latitude of fifty degrees north, and as far eastward in the Atlantic Ocean as the thirty-sixth degree of west longitude from the meridian of Greenwich, shall be restored on each side; that the time shall be thirty days in all other parts of the Atlantic Ocean north of the Equinoctial Line or Equator, and the same time for the British and Irish Channels, for the Gulf of Mexico, and all parts of the West Indies; forty days for the North Seas, for the Baltic, and for all parts of the Mediterranean; sixty days for the Atlantic Ocean south of the Equator, as far as the latitude of the Cape of Good Hope; ninety days for every other part of the world south of the Equator; and one hundred and twenty days for all other parts of the world without exception: And whereas the ratifications of the said Treaty were exchanged on the seventeenth day of last month, from which day the several terms abovementioned of twelve days, thirty days, forty days, sixty days, ninety days, and one hundred and twenty days, are to be computed; now, in order that the several epochs fixed as aforesaid, between His Majesty and the said United States, should be generally known and observed, We have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to notify the same to His Majesty's loving subjects; and We do hereby, in

the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, strictly charge and command all His Majesty's Officers both at sea and land, and all other His Majesty's subjects whatsoever, that they forbear all acts of hostility, either by sea or land, against the United States of America, or the citizens thereof, under the penalty of incurring His Majesty's highest displeasure.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the seventeenth day of March, in the fifty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign, and in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS a great number of disorderly persons have, during the three last days, publicly assembled themselves together in a riotous and tumultuous manner, and have been guilty of many violent and criminal acts and proceedings, having attacked the persons and houses of many of His Majesty's loyal subjects in several parts of the city of Westminster and county of Middlesex, and especially in the evenings and during the nights of the said three days; We, therefore, taking the same into Our most serious consideration, and being fully determined on Our part to use all means in Our power to protect the lives and properties of His Majesty's loyal subjects, to preserve the public peace, and to bring to condign punishment the authors of such violences, have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation, and thereby strictly to

exhort, charge, and command all His Majesty's loyal subjects to give their assistance in discountenancing and suppressing all such criminal acts and proceedings, and to give all information to the Magistrates, by which the disturbers of His Majesty's peace may be brought to punishment: and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other His Majesty's loving subjects, to be aiding and assisting to the utmost of their power, in suppressing such criminal acts and proceedings, and in detecting, apprehending, and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the same: and for the better detection of any person or persons who were or may be concerned in any such criminal acts and proceedings, We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any person shall discover any other person or persons who, directly or indirectly, was or were, or may be concerned therein, so as that the person or persons discovered may be prosecuted for the same, such discoverer shall have and receive as a reward, upon conviction of such offender or offenders, the sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, and also His Majesty's gracious pardon for the said offence, in case the person making such discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 155, it is enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any private person or persons to import any goods, wares, or merchandise, from any port or place within the limits of the East India Company's charter, except only into such ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as shall be provided with warehouses, together with wet docks or basins, or such other securities as shall, in the judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them, in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, be fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon, and shall have been duly declared so to be, by the Order of His Majesty in Council, in Great Britain, or by the Order of the Lord Lieutenant in Council, in Ireland: and whereas the ports of Greenock and port Glasgow have been deemed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in Great Britain to be fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as

for the collection of all duties payable thereon; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the ports of Greenock and port Glasgow are ports fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to continue and amend an Act, passed in the forty-eighth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intitled "An Act for empowering the Governor and Company of the Bank of England to advance the sum of three millions towards the supply for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and eight."

An Act to settle, and secure an annuity on Lord Walsingham, in consideration of his services as Chairman of the Committees of the House of Lords.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, until the fifth day of April one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, additional duties of Excise in Great Britain, on sweets, tobacco, snuff, and Excise licences.

An Act to continue, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, certain additional duties of Excise in Great Britain.

An Act to repeal the duties of Customs payable on the importation of tobacco; and to grant other duties in lieu thereof.

An Act to grant certain duties of Excise upon licences for the sale of spirituous and other liquors by retail and upon licences to persons dealing in exciseable commodities, in Ireland, in lieu of the stamp duties payable upon such licences; and to secure the payment of such Excise duties; and to regulate the issuing of such licences; and to discourage the immoderate use of spirituous liquors in Ireland.

An Act to amend an Act, made in the fifty-second year of His present Majesty, for making provision for the better support of His Majesty's

household during the continuance of His Majesty's indisposition.

An Act to grant duties of Customs on the exportation of certain goods, wares, and merchandise from Ireland, in lieu of the duties of Customs heretofore payable on such exportation.

An Act for further continuing, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, an Act of the forty-fourth of His present Majesty, to continue the restrictions contained in the several Acts of His present Majesty on payments of cash by the Bank of England.

An Act for the better regulation of the manufacture of brown linens in Ireland.

An Act to repeal the duties of Customs upon the importation of citrat of lime; and to grant other duties in lieu thereof.

An Act for punishing mutiny and desertion, and for the better payment of the army and their quarters.

An Act for the regulating of His Majesty's royal marine forces while on shore.

An Act to amend the laws now in force for regulating the importation of corn.

An Act to regulate the trade between Malta and its dependencies and His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America; and also between Malta and the United Kingdom.

An Act to indemnify such persons in the United Kingdom as have omitted to qualify themselves for offices and employments, and for extending the times limited for those purposes respectively until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and sixteen; and to permit such persons in Great Britain as have omitted to make and file affidavits of the execution of indentures of clerks to attorneys and solicitors to make and file the same on or before the first day of Hilary Term one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

An Act to amend the several Acts passed for making wet docks, basins, cuts, and other works for the greater accommodation and security of shipping, commerce, and revenue within the port of London; and for raising a further sum of money for the completion of the said works.

An Act to enable the Company of Proprietors of the Wilts and Berks Canal Navigation to raise money for discharging the debts of the said Company.

An Act for paving the footways and cross paths, and lighting, watching, cleansing, widening, and otherwise improving the streets, lanes, and other public passages and places in the town of Basingstoke, in the county of Southampton.

An Act for enlarging the powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing or rebuilding the parish church of Stockport, in the county palatine of Chester.

An Act for erecting a shire hall, court of justice, and other buildings for public purposes; and for providing suitable accommodations for His Majesty's Justices of Assize in and for the county of Hereford.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of several Acts of His late and present Majesty, for repairing the roads from Epsom, through Ewell to Tooting, and from Ewell to Kingston-upon-Thames and Thames Ditton, and across Ewell com-

mon fields to the Ryegate turnpike-road on Borough Heath, all in the county of Surrey.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from Dunchurch to Southam, in the county of Warwick.

An Act to continue the term, and amend and enlarge the powers, of several Acts, passed for repairing the road from Cirencester to Saint John's-Bridge, in the county of Gloucester, and certain other roads therein mentioned.

An Act to continue the term, and to amend and enlarge the powers of several Acts, passed for repairing the road from Cirencester, in the county of Gloucester, to Birdlip-Hill, in the said county.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from Buryford, in the county of Durham, to Alston, in the county of Cumberland; and from Alston aforesaid, by the Dyke, to Burnstones, in the county of Northumberland.

An Act for repairing the road from the town of Stanhope, by Edmondbyers, in the county of Durham, to the Corbridge turnpike road, near Greenhead, in the parish of Shotley, in the county of Northumberland.

An Act for repairing and improving the roads leading to and from the city of Exeter, and for keeping in repair Exe-Bridge and Countess Wear-Bridge.

An Act for making and maintaining a road from Elland-Bridge, in the parish of Halifax, to join the Dewsbury and Elland turnpike road at or near to a certain obelisk belonging to Sir George Armitage, Bart. in the parish of Dewsbury, all in the West-Riding of the county of York.

An Act for repairing the road from Haslingden, through New Church and Bacup, to Todmorden, and for making and maintaining several branches therefrom, all in the county palatine of Lancaster.

Carlton-House, March 23, 1815.

THIS day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, Sheriffs, Common Council, and Officers of the Corporation of London, waited upon His Royal Highness the Prince Regent with the following Address and Petition, which was read by Sir John Silvester, Bart. the Recorder.

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble, dutiful, and loyal Address and Petition of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, most humbly approach your Royal Highness with no less grief than astonishment at the late proceedings in Parliament, relative to a bill for laying further restrictions on the importation of corn.

We have seen that, notwithstanding the voice of the country has been constitutionally and most decidedly declared against that measure by petitions, which in point of number, and the number and respectability of the signatures thereto, had not been exceeded in the history of these realms, the House of Commons has passed the said bill, and that its proceedings therein have been marked with a precipitancy and pertinacious adherence to the most obnoxious features thereof, which plainly evinces an utter disregard of public feeling, and of that public opinion, whose organ it ought to be.

We have observed in the other House of Parliament the same precipitancy, and the same determination to resist further enquiry, unto such evidence, notwithstanding a Committee of that Right Honourable House had stated in their report during the last sessions, that the investigation was not complete, and that further enquiry would be necessary, before any alteration took place in the laws affecting the interests of the growers and consumers of corn.

We have observed the Ministers of the Crown, with the same disregard of the general voice of the country, and whose especial duty it was to watch over the interests, not merely of the land owners, but of the community at large, lend their sanction of their authority to the support of a measure, which, in its operation, cannot fail of proving most seriously injurious to the manufacturing and commercial interests of the kingdom, in a very high degree oppressive to the poor, and dangerous to the tranquillity and safety of the empire.

That thus deprived of that protection which we might reasonably have expected from the Representatives of the People and the hereditary Legislators of the Country, we are compelled humbly to lay our complaints before your Royal Highness, as the only constitutional resource we have now remaining.

We beg most earnestly to impress upon your Royal Highness, that the two Houses of Parliament being composed of landed proprietors, that having examined such persons only as were land agents, and otherwise connected with land, and having instituted no enquiry into the truth of the allegations of the numerous petitions against the said bill, nor any witnesses having been examined on their behalf, appears most partial and unjust, and highly irritating to the feelings of those classes

who have suffered such privations and made such unexampled sacrifices.

That during a period of unexampled difficulty and excessive dearness of every article of consumption, your Royal Highness cannot but have perceived that the war, which was the occasion of distress to the industrious and laborious classes of the people, has, by causing a progressive rise in the rent of land, been a source of emolument to the landed proprietors.

That it is, therefore, with concern and disappointment we have observed, at a moment when the people were anxiously expecting the blessings of peace, a diminution of their burthens and the cheapness of food, the land owners, not content with the advantages they had thus derived, not content with having escaped those losses and misfortunes which had involved thousands of other classes of the community in ruin, not content with being relieved from the property tax, have sought by the said bill to protect their property from those changes and fluctuations to which all other property is liable, and to secure to themselves, in time of peace, a continuance of those benefits which have arisen out of the war and distress of the times.

Your Royal Highness must be duly sensible that this country has risen to its pre-eminent rank among nations by its manufactures and commerce; it is by that it has acquired its wealth, which has raised and supported its navy, and promoted the greatness and glory of the British empire.

That by the improvements in various branches of manufactures in other countries, and by the introduction of machinery, we have already formidable competition to encounter; and that this measure, by keeping up the price of food, will cause the emigration of our manufacturers and artisans, and tend to transfer the skill, industry, and capital of this kingdom to other nations.

We therefore humbly implore your Royal Highness to extend your royal protection to interests so closely connected with the prosperity of these realms, by with-holding, on the behalf of His Majesty, your royal assent to the said bill; and we further pray your Royal Highness to dissolve the Commons House of Parliament, who have furnished the most conclusive evidence that they do not support the interests, nor represent the feelings or opinions of the people.

To which Address and Petition His Royal Highness was graciously pleased to return the following Answer:

" I have heard, with the greatest concern, the sentiments contained in this your Address and Petition.

" I shall ever be desirous of paying to the representations of any part of His Majesty's subjects all the attention which may be consistent with the duty imposed upon Me, by the sacred trust committed to My charge.

" But I feel that it would be a dereliction of that duty if, in compliance with the wishes which you have thought proper to express, I

were to with-hold the royal sanction from the important measure which now awaits it, and so to exercise the King's prerogative as to indicate a want of confidence in a Parliament which, under difficulties the most trying, has, by the wisdom, vigour, and firmness of its conduct, invariably upheld the honour of His Majesty's Crown, and promoted the best interests of His people."
