Edinburgh, June 25. His night two confiderable prizes came up to Leith-Road, laden with Sack, and fix m re are in view coming in, token, as is laid, by Cap ain Murrey. Sunderland, June 26. On Sunday last arrived here two priz s, which (with fix others) were the Sanday before taken by some of our Fregats upon the Caks of Norway, being both of them Vessels of 500 tuns,

is en with Deales and other Timber. We have fi re cerrain advice from Montrofs i Scotland , this great flore of Prizes are daily b ought to chither by the Stottifb Privateers ; and, that of late, fratce a day hath paft, la which there have not been two, three or four piz s lent in, inf much that that H rbour is fo full throng'd, that they are

force to fend ff everal of them to other places.

Legorne June 17. The 12 Infant arrived in this Port two Galleys, belonging to some private persons of Geneua; they came from Palerma, but touched at Naples by whom, as from feveral other Veffels from those pars, we are rold, that the great Dikes gallies riding about the Island Favo ino, ifed on a Co-fair Erigandine of the Turks, about whom they took levers prisoners: They tell us, that the Gilleys of Naples and Sicily, with those of the Pope, and the Knights of Mal Letters from other parts we are informed, that upon a late or-aer from his Catholique M j. Hy, those of Maples and Sicily were to re-u-n, and take in S uldie s in Italy, and other places of his Dominions, to tranip et them into spain.

Upon the arrival of the newes of the E ction of the new Pie, the great Duke dispetched away two Courriers, one to Pifteya to Bali Respigliof, a K ight of the Order of Saint Stephen, and brother to the new elected Pope; and another

to Rome to Congratulate this E ection.

Genova, June 21. This morning arrived here two Coutless from Madrid, the one bound for Vienna, the other for Naples, which tell us, that Don Juan of Auffria was by her Maje files order again returned to Mudrid, and that he was,to the great fa is ti n of the Court and People, admitted into the Council of State, where he prefides; and that they have great hopes that his prudence will have a strong influence upon that Monarchy, and produce good eff. ct. : He appeares or publickly in the Streets, but paffes alwayes privately in his

Chaire, to avoid all suspition of popularity.

Tis here reported that fix Algier men of War have fought with the Holland Convoy about Allicant, but with

what fuccels we yet know not.

This Merning the Dake and Senators of this City, in an unefual Sate, paffed with a Train of 6. Coach s from the Palace to Strada Balbi , to the Confecration of a new Church

built there by the Jefuites.

Several French Men of War are fately put to Sea from Thoulon : and others with their Gallies are fi ting up to follow. Tis faid the French have demanded pallage of the Dake of Savoye for 10000 Men through his Dominions ; but we hear not of any great preparations made at Milan to re-ceive them, should they March that way.

From Savoje we are told, the Duke Hill requires that the City of Geneva should fend their Deputies to Turin, to treat there with his Ministers, which they feem refolved not to comply with; and that the Duke is raifing new Forces, and particularly three new Regiments of Horse, one to be called the Regiment of Malsha, all whole Officers are to be Knights of that order, by whom great care is taken for the choice of fout Men, well horfed and clad, whole fervants are to make

up another Troop, all of them in rich Live ies ; the Regi ment is to be commanded by Signior / ada : a fecond is called the Prince of Piedmonts Regiment, to be Commanded by Don Gabriel de Savoy ; and the third the Regiment D' Effe

to be commanded by the Marqui- D' Efte.

Venice, June 24. From Confrantinop'e 'tis frid, that
the Grand Signior is much displeased that the Gran Visier had made no farther progress in the fieg of Candia, of which he being sensible, is resolved to attempt it with all torce he is able to make, for by our late advices from Candia, 'ris feid; he has already from his Batteries hegan to play upon their Fo ts, 5000 Men being ent enches before the Fort Demetrius, which expects a recruit of 8000 Men more from Morea.

From Zante and Corfu we are advised, That two Squadrens of the Gorsayres of Barbary, one of 7. men of Warr, the other or 6. are cruising up in those coasts; which gives us some apprehensions for our last Gonvoy of 6. Petaches, who

may probably run forte haz ard in their paffage that way.
We are not yet informed what the Defign may be of those Turkift Forces which are drawn together in Albanie; which keeps not only Ragufa and Cattaro. bur all our other places theresbouts upon their Guards. The Beffs of Bossims proffes one man out of each House in all the C untries about hims to ferve him in the Wars 3 only those of Licca and Corbaccia have refused, pretending that having been lately much impoverific by a Dearth and icarcity amongst them, they were unable to go to War, the Famine having been fo extieme, that a giest number of the Inhibitants have perifh: by it.

Cologne, June 28. From Berlin we are sold, that upon the late decease of the Blectress of Brandenburgh the 8th. Infant, his E ectoral Highnels fent sway feveral Gentlemen to all the neighbour Courts about him, to informe them of his lofs ; onely none was ordered to Caffell , Madam the Landgrave, with the Princess her daughter, being gone thence for cenmark: Collonel Bartlibs employed to Erfort to found the Intention of the Elector of Mayence, is retu ned with much feristaction, touching his inclination to follow the Interest of the E chor of Bandenbourg.

Monfieur Millet the French Envove, who was defigned to have commanded the Forces which the King his Mafter refolved to have fent into Poland, is, by the dive fion of that defign, inclined to flay fom: time at Berlin, till he can have farther O ders fent him from France.

Bruffe's, July 8. We are certainly informed that the French A my have made three affaults upon the Fort adjoyning to Doway, but have been each time besten ff with very great lofs of men, after which they railed a bar ery of five g etc Bun against the Tewn, which were di mounted by a Counterbattery of leven guns, and that 2000 wounded men were brought into Tournay, where there are 1000 Swiffes left in

Gerifon, for the fecuity of that Town.

Bruffels, July 9. We have had here a confilent Report, that \$ 200 men were lately put into Downy for its defence ; but we are rather induced to believe a later report of its furrender, after a fiege of near eight dates, and fev ral aff ults made upon ie. Count Marfin is dra ving his forces together, and 'cis believed will in few dates be at the head of a flying Army of abour 20000 men, which 'is bell-ved may pur fome ftop to the proceedings of the French. We are here virv ill farisfied of the misbebevior of the Town of Tourney, during the frege of that p'ace, which is in some m'afure evenged on them by the French themselves, by whom they are faid to be diform d and highly Taxe , notwithflanding their conditions upon their furrender.

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Hague, July 6. Great care is taken for the continual fupply of our Weet with all Neceffaries, 20 Firefips more being fitting up : and the Count de Hoorne with 2500 foot ordered to march to Helvoer Sluys, where they are to em-barque, and joyn with De Ruyter: I's confidently faid, that which 'cis believed will give the French a longer employment then they expected.

The Eftares are unwilling as yet to difmifs the fix great Men of War that were built at Amfterdam upon the French account; fome differences being rifen about the defraying the expenses of them, which they defire may be fully discharged

before they can be permitted to put to Sea.

We are still in doubt of the intentions of Swedeland, and continue our cares for the lecurity of our Frontiers. Monfieur Tongel is ordered Envoyé from that Crown to the Marquels de Gaftel Rodrigo at Bruffells , and after the dilpatch of his Affairs there, to pals forwards for Spain ; which, with fome other reasons gives feveral persons occasion to conjecture, that there is a good Correspondency between the King of Sweden and the House of Austria.

The Here de Schravenmoeur is fent by the States to bis Electoral Higner of Brandenburg, to condole with him for the death of the Electrice. The Count de Donna is returned to Breda, to fe there in the room of the deceased Monfieur Coyet, and to use his endeavours with Monsieur Fleming for the effectual carrying on the Treaty, in quality of Media-

Paris, July 9. Letters from before Deway of the fifth give this secount of the Siege, That the fecond inffent his Majefty having fent before him 2000 Horfe under the command of the Count de Duras to invest Doway, followed himfell in perion, and arrived at the Camp, before it the fecond laftant, when fo furious an Attempt was made by a party of horse, that they forced the Spaniards to retire within their Trenches : his Majefty immediately giving order for the Slege. The third inkan', the French opened their Trenches, though with much loss : and the next day several Volunteers Were hurt in vifiting the Works that were caft up before the Town, amongst others the Prince de Courtenay received a hurt in his fide by a bullet from a Falcon , and the Sieur de Noue, Captain of the Mavarre Regiment, loft one of his Feet by a great Shot : That afternoon the Cannon plaid hard upon the B:fiegers from the Town, especially at the relieving of the Guards, by which the Prince & Epinoy had his Arme broken; The Sieur de Briffac , was thot through the Thigh with a Falcon Buller , and the Count De Cambourg hurt also in the Thigh, with leveral men, and II horses kill'd. That evening were zwo affaults made upon two feveral parts of the the Town, wherein feveral confiderable persons were hurt, particularly the Marquis de Broutet, the Sieur Voubart Commander of the Regiment of Picardy, Mongiret Commander of the Regiment of Lionnois, with the Chevalier Maureou, the Sieurs Balzac, de la Magdelaine, and others. Since this they have made themselves mafters of the Counterscarp, and filled up the Trenches, hoping in few days to oblige the Town to a Surrender.

Since the former, we have now certain news of the furrender of Doway, and that after feveral Affaults given to it, in which, as also by their Cannons discharged from the Town, many persons of quality were herr, and many men flain, a Trumpet was fent to them to let them know, that if they did not immediately give up the place, no quarter should be given to any person. The Count de Gramons, with some few of his friends going with him, to affure them of the intentions of the King, and to perswade them to a surrender, which they upon Articles yeelded to, giving up the Town the next mornin"

Dublin, June 26. This City, and generally the whole Kingdom is in a quiet posture. His Grace the Lord Lieutenant and the Council are not wanting in contributing all they can to the petice and lafety of all parts. He has ordered a Trench to be drawn about the whole City and Suburbs, and ftrongly fortified the Harbor. Yefterday he took a view of that part of the Atmy which lies in theie parts, with the CityMilitia's both of horse and foot, which he finds in a very good equipape, being both ready and willing to engage them-felves in his Majesties service for the desence of their Country, and has befices ordered an Account to be given him of all persons in the City from 16 to 60 years of age.

Hull. June 29. On Wednelday laft was fent up the Hamber, a prize, taken off Scarborough, being a Dutch Caper of fix Guns and 30 Men, called the Sun of Middlebourgh; chace was also given to three others, but the weather being over-calme favoured them in getting away with their Ostes.

Newcafile, June 29. The Flying Greybound a Privateer, Caprain Hogg Commander, has fent into this Port a Durch Flyboat of 300 tuns, taken off the Scaw, and bound for Norway. This place is by the care and diligence of the Enla of Ogle and Carlifle pur into fo good a poffure, that we feat not any thing that can be attempted on us ; As are likewie the reft of the Ports upon the Sea-coafts , where any danger might otherwise be apprehended.
Plymouth, June 30. This morning was brought in hither

a Flyboat of S. Malees of 90 tunns, 6 gunns, and 11 men, bound for Newfound-land, and from thence to ply about the Streights, being a Veffel commiffiched by the Duke de Beaufort. Two other fmall Veffels were chafed, but efcaped. About 50 leagues to the Wellward of Scilly, were discovered two great Frenchmen of war, being high carved fbips, and judged

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to carry about 60 guns apiece.

Whitehall, July 3. By leveral Letters arrived from the Coates, we have this account of the motion of the Dutch Fleet. The z. inftant, about 80 Sall of them with 9 Flegships came to an anchor near night in the Bay near Alberough within two miles of the fhore, where it was expected they would have made fome attempt the next morning, and accordingly the place was provided for their reception : But about the break of day, the Dutch weighing, at the first frod nearer in to the shore; but in a little time, for the space of an hour failed Noathwards, after which they all tackt and food again to the Southwards, close by the Light-house at Oxford, and shout 7. that morning past the Nesse towards Harwich. The same day about 1. of the clock, their Flore confishing of 47 Sail with their Attenders, flood within half cannon-fbot of the fhore, towards Felften-Cliffe, but out of reach of Land. guard Fort, leaving 5 of their number at the Sledway; and then manning out their Boats, landed about 3000 men at the Cliffe, with a great fland of Pikes. Near 2000 of them marched up, and made two Affaults upon Landguard Ports where they were fourly entertain'd, and after three quarters of an hours dispute in the fir affault, and about a quarter of an hours only in the fecond, they were forced to retire in fuch hatte, that they left their ladders all of them behind thems scarcely being able to carry of their Dead, which is judged to be about 150 at the leaft.

Whilft these affaults were making upon the Fort, about 1 200 that were lest behind near the Cliffe to secure their retreat , were encountered by the Trained Bands, under the Command of the Earl of Suffelk, and a fmart skiemish begap between them, which continued till to in the evening; when it was renewed by the return of the beaten Companies from the Fort, who by the lowners of the Ebb were hindered at the prefent from returning to their Boats : at which times party of 500 Foot were drawn out, under the Command of Major Legge, to fall upon the Enemy in the Reare; whole luccels we must exped at the arrival of the next Pof. In this dayes Service we loft only three or four Men, and as many hur, with Captain Darrel, who has received a wound in the

fnoulder. They have not as yet made any attempt upon the Town, being resolved fir ft to try their fortunes upon the Fort, to which ('cis believed) they have not the courage left them to return.
