AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 18th of April 1815,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the trade between the subjects of His Majesty's colonies and plantations in North America and in the West India Islands and the countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from time to time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under His sign manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the time being, to authorise, in case of necessity, the importation into Newfoundland of bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing season only; provided always, that such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such rules, regulations, and restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law:

And whereas it is expedient and necessary, that provision be made for fully supplying the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season, with bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent doth thereupon, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the supply of

the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season only, bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, may be imported into the said island from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law, and which within the space of nine months previous to the time of such importation, have cleared out from some port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, or other His Majesty's dominions in Europe, for which purpose a licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other person or persons who may be duly authorised in that kingdom respectively, in the manner and form herein-after mentioned; which licence shall continue and be in force for nine calendar months from the day of the date upon which such licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such licence as aforesaid, granted after the thirtieth day of September next, shall be of any force or effect: and His Royal Highness is hereby further pleased to order, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the master or person having the charge or command of any ship or vessel to whom such licence shall be granted, shall, upon the arrival of the said ship or vessel at the port, harbour, or place in the said Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the back of such licence the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, under the penalty of the forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a certificate to the master or person having the charge or command of such ship or vessel, of his having received the said licence so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same

to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland; or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively; by whom such licence was granted. *Chetwynd.*

FORM OF LICENCE.

By the Commissioners for managing and causing to be levied and collected His Majesty's Customs, Subsidies, and other Duties in [where]

WHEREAS [name of the person] one of His Majesty's subjects, residing at [place where] hath given notice to us the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs [in Great Britain, or Revenue in Ireland] that he intends to lade at [some port of the United States of America] and import into [some port of Newfoundland] in the [ship's name] being a British-built ship [describing the tonnage and what sort of vessel] navigated according to law, whereof [master's name] is master, bound to [where]; and it appearing by the register of the said ship [ship's name] whereof [master's name] is master, that the said ship the [ship's name] was built at [place where] and owned by [owner's name] residing at [place where] all His Majesty's British subjects; and that no foreigner, directly or indirectly, hath any share, part, or interest therein.

Now be it known, that the said [person's name] hath a licence to lade on board the said ship, [ship's name] at and from any port or place belonging to the United States of America, bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, or live stock, the produce of the said United States, and no other article whatever; and to carry the said bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and live stock, to some port or place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the arrival of the said ship at any port, harbour, or place of discharge in Newfoundland, the master or person having the charge or command of the said ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the back thereof the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, pease, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, and shall thereupon receive a certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

This licence to continue in force for calendar months from the date hereof.

PROCLAMATION

FOR

PARDONING DESERTERS

FROM

HIS MAJESTY'S REGULAR LAND FORCES.

War-Office, May 20, 1815.

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that there are, at this time, several deserters from the different regular corps in His Majesty's land service, who might be induced to return to their duty, by an offer of His Royal Highness's gracious pardon, and, that such an instance of His Royal Highness's clemency might have a due influence upon their future behaviour; His Royal Highness has been graciously pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant His free pardon to all deserters from His Majesty's regular land forces, who, not having been previously apprehended, shall surrender themselves on or before the 20th day of July next, to the Commanding Officer of any regiment, or to any of the Inspecting Field-Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose stations are men-

tioned in the margin hereof, or, to the Commandant of Albany Barracks in the Isle of Wight, or, to any of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Great Britain.

Such deserters, if able-bodied men, and fit for service, shall be sent to the regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to such regiments in the United Kingdom as

His Royal Highness may be pleased to command; and when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other corps, to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said deserters may have enlisted into other regular corps, and are now serving therein, His Royal Highness is graciously pleased to extend to such deserters the benefit of this pardon; and to direct, that they shall continue to serve in the corps wherein they now are, upon declaring themselves to their respective Command-

ing Officers on or before the said 20th day of July next, and, after having so declared themselves, they shall not be liable, at any future time, to be claimed by the regiments from which they had formerly deserted.

The Magistrate, to whom any deserter from His Majesty's regular forces shall surrender himself, is authorised and required to certify the day on which such deserter surrendered; which certificate is to be delivered to the deserter, to continue in force until the arrival of the deserter at the head-quarters of the nearest military post, provided he proceed at the rate of ten miles a day, unless prevented by sickness, such sickness to be certified by some medical practitioner, on the back of the Magistrate's certificate, or, to be otherwise proved, to the satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such military post.

And His Royal Highness having further commanded, that the greatest exertions shall be used, for the future apprehension of all deserters, every soldier now serving ought to be deeply impressed with a sense of the danger to which he will expose himself, if he should be guilty of the crime of desertion; and all those, who have already committed that offence, ought to feel, that they will render themselves liable to the severest punishment if they do not immediately avail themselves of the pardon held out in this Royal Highness's most gracious Proclamation.

Any soldier who may desert after these His Royal Highness's gracious intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost severity.

WIDOWS' PENSIONS.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the fortieth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for making wet docks, basons, cuts, and other works, for the greater accommodation and security of shipping, commerce, and revenue, within the port of London," it was enacted; that it should and might be lawful for the Directors of the London Dock Company, or any thirteen or more of them, from time to time, either absolutely to sell and dispose of, or to let out and demise on lease, or at rack rent, or in any other manner that should be thought advisable; all or any of the freehold or leasehold estates, lands, houses, and wharfs, docks, works, hereditaments, and premises thereby vested in the said Directors, and which should thereafter be conveyed to them in pursuance of that Act, in such manner, and upon such terms; and for such considerations as the said Directors should from time to time judge proper and think most advantageous to the interest of the said Company, provided the said freehold and leasehold estates, lands, houses, wharfs, docks, works, hereditaments, and premises were first offered for such sale, letting, or demising to the respective person or persons, upon the terms and conditions aforesaid; of or from whom the premises respectively were purchased by or on behalf of the said Company: And whereas by an Act, made and passed in the forty-ninth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to alter and amend several Acts, passed in the fortieth, forty-fourth, forty-fifth, forty-sixth, and forty-seventh years of His present Majesty, for making wet docks, basons, cuts, and other works, for the greater accommodation of shipping, commerce, and revenue, within the port of London, and for the purposes therein mentioned relating thereto; and to enlarge the powers and authorities by the said Acts granted to the London Dock Company," after reciting (inter alia) to the effect above recited, and also reciting, that, by reason of the great alteration occasioned by the taking of streets and taking down houses and other buildings within the limits of the said first recited Act, and the length of time which had elapsed since the passing of the said first recited Act, and of deaths, removals, and other circumstances, great difficulties had arisen in
