A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R. R.

WHEREAS divers Soldiers now serving in His Majesty's Army, under the provisions of the Mutiny Act, passed in the 46th year of His Majesty's Reign, Chapter 66, and of another Act passed in the 47th year of His Majesty's Reign, Chapter 32, and of another Act passed in the 48th year of His Majesty's Reign, Chapter 15, and of another Act passed in the 49th year of His Majesty's Reign, Chapter 12, and of another Act passed in the 50th year of His Majesty's Reign, Chapter 7, and of another Act passed in the 51st year of His Majesty's Reign, Chapter 8, and of another Act passed in the 52nd year of His Majesty's Reign, chap. 22, and of another Act passed in the 53rd year of His Majesty's Reign, chap. 17, and which said several Acts are severally and respectively entitled, "An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better payment of the army and their quarters," did, at the time of their respective enlistments, engage

to serve His Majesty for the limited periods therein respectively expressed; provided His Majesty should so long require the same, and for such further term, not exceeding three years, as should be directed by any Proclamation of His Majesty; provided always, that in case of such direction, the said additional period should determine, whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive Treaty, should have elapsed, subsequent to the expiration of such limited periods as aforesaid: And whereas the recommencement of hostilities renders it expedient to exercise the power vested in His Majesty, of enlarging such limited periods of service; we have therefore thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to publish this Proclamation; and we do hereby direct, that all soldiers now serving in His Majesty's army (the veteran battalions excepted), who have been enlisted for such limited periods as aforesaid, shall continue to serve therein for the term of three years, after the expiration of such limited periods respectively; provided always, that the said additional period shall determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive Treaty shall have elapsed, subsequent to the expiration of such limited periods respectively.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the second day of June one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, in the fifty-fifth year of His Majesty's reign.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R. R.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to repeal an Act of the last Session of Parliament, for establishing regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this kingdom, or resident therein; and to establish, for twelve months, other regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this kingdom, or residing therein, in certain cases;" It is enacted, that when and so often as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall think it necessary for the safety and tranquillity of the kingdom, by His or Their Proclamation, or Order in Council, to direct that Aliens of any description in the said Proclamation or Order mentioned, shall not be landed in this kingdom, except at such places and under such regulations as shall be in such Proclamation or Order expressed, then and in every such case, the master or commander of every ship or vessel, or boat having any such Alien or Aliens on board, shall not suffer any such Alien or Aliens to land within any part of this kingdom contrary to such Proclamation or Order in Council, unless by His Majesty's express permission, signified under the hand of one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and every such master or commander, wilfully neglecting to conform to any of the directions or regulations contained in such Proclamation or Order, shall forfeit Forty Pounds, for every Alien so landed, to be recovered as therein mentioned; and such ship or vessel, from on board of which any such Alien or Aliens shall so land, shall be detained till such penalty shall be paid; and every other vessel or boat used in landing such Alien or Aliens, shall and may be seized by the Inspector of Aliens, or by any officer or officers of the Customs or Excise, as the case may be; and the same respectively shall, on proof that such offence was wilfully committed, contrary to the provisions of this Act, be forfeited, together with all tackle, apparel, ammunition, and furniture thereunto respectively belonging: now We, being desirous of carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act in manner hereafter expressed, do, by this Our Proclamation, in the name and on the be-

half of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, order and direct, That from and after the publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, no Alien or Aliens on board of any ship or vessel, or boat, coming or arriving, directly or immediately from any port or place in France, or any port or place under the dominion of the persons exercising the powers of Government in France, or from any port or place of, or in, or belonging to any country or territory at war with Great Britain, shall (until Our Royal pleasure concerning such Aliens shall be further expressed) be landed or be suffered by the master or commander of any such ship, vessel, or boat, to land at any port or place within Great Britain, except at the ports of Harwich, Dover, Newhaven, Southampton, Falmouth, and at Gravesend, unless by Our express permission signified under the hand of one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State: And We do further order and direct, by and with the advice aforesaid, That notice of this Our Proclamation shall be printed in different languages, and shall be affixed in public places in the different ports of this kingdom, and shall also be delivered by the Custom-house officers to the master of every such ship, vessel, or boat arriving at any port or place in this Kingdom, except as aforesaid, and to all foreigners arriving in any such ship, vessel, or boat: provided always, that this Our Proclamation shall not extend to any Foreign Ambassador or other public Minister duly authorized, or the servants actually attendant upon any such Ambassador or public Minister, or any domestic servant of any of His Majesty's natural-born subjects, or of any subject to whom letters of denization have been, or shall be hereafter granted, or any domestic servant of any of His Majesty's subjects, who now are or shall hereafter be naturalized by Act of Parliament, such servants respectively being actually and *bona fide* employed in the service of their respective masters, and actually at the time attendant upon their respective masters; nor to any mariner actually engaged and employed in the navigation of any ship or vessel, during the time that such mariner shall remain so actually engaged and employed, and certified in the manner in the said Act mentioned to be such mariner, by the master or commander of such ship or vessel, upon his arrival in any such port or place as aforesaid. And We do hereby require and command the Lords, Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commis-

ers for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Fifty-fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "an Act to repeal an Act of the last Session of Parliament for establishing regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and to establish for twelve months other regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or residing therein, in certain cases;" His Majesty is authorised by His Royal Proclamation, from time to time, to require and command every Alien who now is in, or who shall hereafter come into Great Britain, except as therein excepted, to register himself or herself, and thereupon to obtain His Majesty's Royal Licence to reside within this Kingdom, as therein mentioned: Now We, being desirous of carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, do, by this our Proclamation, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, require and command every Alien who shall have arrived in this Kingdom, since the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, and shall be resident in this Kingdom, on the day of the date of this our Proclamation, except as hereinafter excepted, to register himself or herself, in the manner herein-after mentioned; that is to say,

All such Aliens residing in the City of London shall, within ten days from the publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with the Lord Mayor of the said City.

All such Aliens residing in the City and Liberties

of Westminster, or elsewhere within the Bills of Mortality (except the City of London), or residing within ten miles of the City of London, shall, within ten days from the publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with the Magistrates at one of the under-mentioned public offices, in the District of which office such Alien shall then reside; that is to say, the police office, Queen-square, Westminster, Great Marlbro'-street, Hatton Garden, Lambeth-street, Whitechapel, Worship-street, Shoreditch, High-street, Shadwell, and Union Hall, Southwark.

All such Aliens residing out of the districts aforesaid, and within any cities or corporate towns, or within the jurisdiction of the Magistrates of such cities or corporate towns respectively, shall, within fourteen days from the publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate of such cities or corporate towns respectively.

And all such Aliens residing in other places in Great Britain shall, within eighteen days from the publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with some Magistrate of the county or place where such Aliens respectively shall reside.

And we do further require and command all Aliens who shall come into Great Britain, after the publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, to register themselves in the manner herein-after mentioned, with the Lord Mayor, Mayors, or other Magistrates as aforesaid, within two days after every such Alien shall have arrived within any such city, town, district, or other place to which he shall be allowed to proceed, by passport granted for that purpose, except Aliens who are required by our Proclamation of this day's date, to land at no other port than the ports of Harwich, Dover, Newhaven, Southampton, Falmouth, and at Gravesend, whom We hereby require and command to register themselves in manner hereinafter mentioned; at the Alien Office, in Crown-Street, Westminster.

And We do further require and command every Alien, for the purpose of obtaining such licence as aforesaid, to deliver, or cause to be delivered, to the person or persons with whom such Alien is hereby required to register himself or herself as aforesaid, a full and true declaration or account in writing of his or her name, age, place of birth, rank, occupation, profession, the place of resi-

dence when last in his or her own country, together with the last and principal place of residence before his or her arrival in this kingdom, the name or names of some person or persons, in this country, to whom known, the reason or purpose for which he or she came to this kingdom, the time when and the place at which such Alien last arrived in Great Britain, and where his or her actual residence has been since such last arrival, and is at the time of giving in such declaration, which said declaration or account shall be signed by such Alien with his or her name or mark.

And We do hereby authorize and appoint the said Lord Mayor, Mayors, and other Magistrates as aforesaid respectively, to receive such accounts as aforesaid, and do require and command them respectively to cause the original account to be transmitted within two days to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for the purpose of such Alien obtaining His Majesty's Royal licence to reside within Great Britain from the said Secretary, whom We do hereby authorize and appoint to grant such licences, or from such other person or persons who now are, or who shall from time to time be authorized and appointed by Us to grant such licences.

And We do further authorize and require the said Lord Mayor, Mayors, and other Magistrates as aforesaid, to whom any such accounts shall be delivered as aforesaid, to grant under his hand and seal to the Alien delivering such account, a provisional licence to reside within Great Britain, under such restrictions as shall appear fit, during the time that shall be therein allowed to such Alien for obtaining His Majesty's Royal licence as aforesaid.

And We do further declare, that this Our Proclamation shall not extend to require any Alien to obtain such licence as aforesaid, who shall have obtained, under any former Act relating to Aliens, His Majesty's Royal licence to reside in any part of this kingdom.

And We do further direct, That every Alien who shall have obtained any licence under any former Act, the term of which licence has expired, shall transmit the same to the Alien office in Crown-street, Westminster, for the purpose of being renewed or exchanged for such other licence as may be granted by our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, or by such other person or persons appointed by us to grant the same.

And We do further direct, That every Alien upon every change of residence, shall give notice

thereof to the Alien office in Crown-street, Westminster.

And We do further declare, That no Foreign Ambassador, or other public Minister duly authorized, nor the domestic servants of any such Foreign Ambassador or public Minister, registered according to the directions of the laws in force for that purpose, and being actually attendant upon such Ambassador or Minister; nor any Alien not above the age of fourteen years, shall be deemed within the meaning and intent of this Proclamation.

And We do further declare, that all such licences, and provisional licences, as aforesaid, shall be given without fee or reward, and shall be subject to no duty or charge whatsoever.

And We do further declare and make known, that every Alien who shall be found at large in Great Britain after the time by this Our Proclamation limited, for registering and thereupon obtaining licences as aforesaid, such Aliens not having obtained such licence respectively, and not being exempted as aforesaid, will be liable on conviction to suffer imprisonment for any time not exceeding six months, according to the provisions of the said Act.

Madrid, May 17, 1815.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent having been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in and by a commission under the great seal of the Order, bearing date the 6th day of March last, to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Sir Henry Wellesley, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, one of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, to His Catholick Majesty; Sir Isaac Heard, Knight, Garter Principal King of Arms; and Sir Thomas Tyrwhitt, Knight, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to be the Sovereign's Plenipotentiaries for investing His Catholick Majesty with the ensigns and the whole habit of the said Most Noble Order: and His Royal Highness having been further pleased, by warrant under the signet of the Order, dated the 27th day of the same month, to dispense with the personal attendance of Garter King of Arms and Black Rod, two of the said Plenipotentiaries, and the discharge of the duties of their respective offices on this occasion; His Catholick Majesty was this day invested

with the ensigns and habit of the Most Noble Order of the Garter by His Excellency Sir Henry Wellesley, the Sovereign's first Plenipotentiary appointed by the said commission.

At twelve o'clock, Sir Henry Wellesley proceeded to the Royal Palace, where His Excellency was received by the Duke de San Carlos, Mayor-Domo Mayor of His Catholick Majesty, Grandee of Spain of the First Class, Knight of the Order of the Golden Fleece, of that of Charles the Third, and of several other Orders: and, soon after, a procession was made from the apartment called that of King Charles the Fourth, through the hall of the Ambassadors, to the apartments of His Majesty, in the order following:

Officers of the Household of His Catholick Majesty.

William Duff Gordon, Esq. Vice-Admiral Sir Harry M. P. Neale, Bart. M. P.

Sir John Hunter, Knight, His Majesty's Consul-General, bearing the surcoat and hood of the Order.

Colonel Charles William Doyle, a Lieutenant-General in the Spanish service, bearing the sword of the Order.

John Kennedy, Esq. attached to the British Embassy, bearing the cap and feathers.

Don Manuel de Centurion, Chamberlain of His Catholick Majesty, and Knight of the Order of Charles the Third, bearing, on a crimson velvet cushion, the great collar and the star of the Order.

The Marquis de Salas, Chamberlain of His Catholick Majesty, and Knight of the Order of St. James, bearing the mantle of the Order.

Henry Kilbee, Esq. attached to the British Embassy, bearing the book of the statutes of the Order.

James Pulman, Esq. Secretary to the Commission, bearing, on a crimson velvet cushion, the Garter and the Ribband and George.

Charles Richard Vaughan, Esq. Secretary of Embassy, carrying the Sovereign's commission, and the letters of credence.

His Excellency Sir Henry Wellesley, His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, and the Sovereign's first Plenipotentiary for the investiture of His Catholic Majesty.

Upon entering into the presence of His Majesty, with the usual forms, the several insignia of the Order were placed on a table: and Sir Henry Wellesley, after a short address, declaratory of the object of the commission, presented to His Catholick Majesty, first, the letters of credence, and, then, the commission, which His Majesty delivered, severally, into the hands of the Duke de San Carlos, who read the latter aloud.

His Excellency then presented to His Majesty the book of the statutes of the Order; and, thereupon, received from His Majesty a certificate, under His Royal sign manual and seal, signifying His acceptance of the Order under the usual reservations, and also an instrument containing His Majesty's

nomination of his proxy, in the event of an installation in the Royal Chapel of St. George, at Windsor.

His Excellency then buckled the Garter around the left leg of His Majesty, with the usual admonition.

His Majesty was next invested with the Ribband and George, with the usual admonition.

His Excellency thereupon invested His Majesty with the surcoat and the sword; receiving the sword, previously worn by the King, as the ancient fee appertaining to the office of Garter King of Arms.

His Majesty was then invested with the mantle, hood, and the great collar of the Order, severally, with the respective admonitions.

His Excellency lastly presented the cap and feathers: and, His Majesty being thus invested, a proclamation was made of the styles of His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Sovereign, and of His Catholick Majesty Ferdinand the Seventh, King of Spain and of the Indies, Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

His Excellency then delivered a congratulatory address to His Majesty, and withdrew.

The ceremony of investiture took place in the Audience Chamber of His Catholick Majesty, in the presence of their Royal Highnesses the Infante Don Carlos and the Infante Don Antonio; and was attended by several of the Great Officers of State, Grandees, and other Personages of Distinction.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant unto John Cameron, Esq. Colonel in the Army, and Lieutenant-Colonel of the 92d (Highland) Regiment of Foot, His Majesty's royal licence and permission, that he may accept and wear the insignia of a Knight of the Royal Portuguese Military Order of the Tower and Sword, with which His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of Portugal has been pleased to honour him, in testimony of the high sense which that Prince entertains of the great courage and intrepidity displayed by him in several actions with the enemy in the Peninsula; provided nevertheless, that His Majesty's said licence and permission doth not authorise, and shall not be deemed or construed to authorise, the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining unto a Knight Bachelor of these realms:

And the Prince Regent, being desirous of conferring upon the said Colonel Cameron such a mark of His Majesty's royal favour, as may in an especial manner evince the sense he entertains of the highly distinguished services of that Officer during the recent glorious and ever-memorable campaigns in Portugal, Spain, and France, and more particularly the signal intrepidity displayed by him in the action of Arroya de Moulino; in the defence of the Pass of Mayo; in the brilliant action near Bayonne; in crossing the River Garonne de Moulino at Arriverete; and in compelling a very superior force of the

enemy to abandon the town of Aire, hath been pleased to grant unto the said Colonel Cameron His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he and his descendants may bear the following crest of honourable augmentation, viz. "On a wreath, a demi Highlander of the 92d regiment, armed and accoutred, up to the middle in water, grasping in his dexter hand a broad sword, and in his sinister a banner inscribed 92d, within a wreath of laurel;" and in an escrol above "Arriverete," in allusion to the signal bravery displayed by him at that place; provided the same be first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office:

And His Royal Highness hath been further pleased to command, that the respective royal concessions and declarations be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant unto Sir Richard Lee, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, and Rear-Admiral of the White Squadron of His Majesty's Fleet, His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he may accept and wear the insignia of an Honorary Knight Commander of the Royal Portuguese Military Order of the Tower and Sword, with which His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of Portugal has been pleased to honour him, in testimony of the high sense that Prince entertains of his great merit, and of the services rendered by him to the kingdom of Portugal:

And His Royal Highness hath been further pleased to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered, together with the relative documents, in His Majesty's College of Arms.

PROCLAMATION

PARDONING DESERTERS

HIS MAJESTY'S REGULAR LAND FORCES.

War-Office, May 20, 1815.

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that there are, at this time, several deserters from the different regular corps in His Majesty's land service, who might be induced to return to their duty, by an offer of His Royal Highness's gracious pardon, and, that such an instance of His Royal Highness's clemency might have a due influence upon their future behaviour; His Royal Highness has been graciously pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant His free pardon to all deserters from His Majesty's regular land forces, who, not having been previously apprehended, shall surrender themselves on or before the 20th day of July next, to the Commanding Officer of any regiment, or to any of the Inspecting Field-Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose stations are men-

tioned in the margin hereof, or, to the Commandant of Albany Barracks in the Isle of Wight, or, to any of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Great Britain.

Such deserters, if able-bodied men, and fit for service, shall be sent to the regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to such regiments in the United Kingdom as

His Royal Highness may be pleased to command; and when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other corps, to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said deserters may have enlisted into other regular corps, and are now serving therein, His Royal Highness is graciously pleased to extend to such deserters the benefit of this pardon; and to direct, that they shall continue to serve in the corps wherein they now are, upon declaring themselves to their respective Commanding Officers on or before the said 20th day of July next, and, after having so declared themselves, they shall not be liable, at any future time, to be claimed by the regiments from which they had formerly deserted.

The Magistrate, to whom any deserter from His Majesty's regular forces shall surrender himself, is authorised and required to certify the day on which such deserter surrendered; which certificate is to be delivered to the deserter, to continue in force until the arrival of the deserter at the head-quarters of the nearest military post, provided he proceed at the rate of ten miles a day, unless prevented by sickness, such sickness to be certified by some medical practitioner, on the back of the Magistrate's certificate, or, to be otherwise proved, to the satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such military post.

And His Royal Highness having further commanded, that the greatest exertions shall be used, for the future apprehension of all deserters, every soldier now serving ought to be deeply impressed with a sense of the danger to which he will expose himself, if he should be guilty of the crime of desertion; and all those, who have already committed that offence, ought to feel, that they will render themselves liable to the severest punishment if they do not immediately avail themselves of the pardon held out in this Royal Highness's most gracious Proclamation.

Any soldier who may desert after these His Royal Highness's gracious intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost severity.
