WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the thirteenth day of February last, for prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom, or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, will expire on the thirteenth day of August next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth, therefore, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time, during the space of six months (to commence from the said thirteenth day of August next), presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom, or carry coastwise, any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same coastwise, without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering

the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to enable His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition." But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall prevent the exportation of any of the articles, specified in the Order in Council of the twentieth of May one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, to the coast of Africa, under the conditions contained in the said Order. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the thirteenth of February last, probi-

biting, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, the transporting into any parts out of this kingdom of any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sail-cloth, or canvas, or other naval stores (sheet-copper excepted), will expire on the thirteenth day of August next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whosoever do, at any time for the space of six months, to commence from the said thirteenth day of August next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom, any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores (sheet copper excepted), or do ship or lade any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores (sheet copper excepted), on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, without leave or permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council;" But it is nevertheless His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels or boats in the service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel during the course of her intended voyage, or by licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Ad-

miralty for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards or garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes of trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards and garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do first make oath of the true destination of the same to the places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security by bond (except as hereinafter excepted), to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the bond, of a certificate or certificates, in such form and manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards. But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, nevertheless, that the following articles, viz. bar iron, white and tarred rope, tallow or mill grease, tarpaulins for waggon covers, pitch, tar, and turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon payment of the proper duties, without bond being entered into by the merchant exporter, to any of the British plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's settlements in South America; provided the merchant exporter shall first verify, upon oath, that the articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the exportation of the said

articles shall in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, whether by one or more shipments, within the same season: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Chelwynd.*

REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness;

We, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars, of the University of Cambridge, humbly beg leave to offer to your Royal Highness our sincere and heartfelt congratulations, on the late splendid and decisive victory; which has been principally achieved by the valour of British soldiers, animated and directed by the consummate skill of Field Marshal the Duke of Wellington.

To this combination of transcendent military talent in our great commander, and of unexampled gallantry in our troops, aided and supported by

the brave Prussians, and their renowned leader, is to be ascribed the succession of glorious results, which have already followed the ever memorable battle of the 18th of June; and the confident expectation, at no distant period, of a peace equally honourable and advantageous to this country; and which will at the same time afford the best security for the future liberty and independence of Europe.

But while we yield the tribute of praise which is justly due to the eminent abilities of our General, and the invincible courage of the army placed under his command; while we thankfully own how much we stand indebted to the prudence and vigour of your Royal Highness's government at home, for the promptitude with which such ample means, for carrying on this just and necessary war, have been supplied: we cannot but direct our thoughts higher, to the source from whence all power and power are derived, and raise our hearts in grateful acknowledgements to Him "who is the only giver of victory." And although we reckon it among the chief subjects of our exultation and thankfulness, that the cause of civil freedom, the blessings of which we duly appreciate, will be promoted by the success of our arms; we feel it as a still higher claim on our gratitude, that the great interests of religion and morality will necessarily be advanced, by the triumph of loyalty and sound principle, over treason and perjury.

It could scarcely be expected, that a series of obstinately contested engagements, to the severity of which the records of history bear no parallel, could be brought to a successful termination, without a very serious loss on the part of the victors; and we have to lament, that the name of a member of Your Royal Highness's illustrious house appears at the head of the list of those who have fallen. We do not attempt to extenuate the greatness either of national or individual suffering; but it may afford some consolation to reflect, that by the costly sacrifice which has been made, we may eventually be spared a still greater effusion of blood; which, had a less effectual blow been given to the forces of our enemy, would probably be shed in the repeated conflicts of a more protracted warfare.

We are well aware, that neither the circumstances of our situation, nor the duties of our profession, allow us, in our own persons, to follow the brilliant example of those whose illustrious deeds we are proud to commemorate; but we can, with the greatest truth, assure Your Royal Highness, that, in zealous and devoted attachment to our excellent Constitution, both in Church and State, in dutiful affection to Your Royal Highness's person and government, in a readiness to make every sacrifice in our power for the promotion of the public good, we are surpassed by none; and that it is, and will continue to be, our first care, to instil into the minds of the youth committed to our charge, a conscientious regard to the great duties of religion, loyalty and patriotism; the faithful discharge of which, by numbers in every rank of society throughout the realm, has, we may humbly hope, drawn down a blessing upon this kingdom, and raised us to an eminence of national glory, which is the envy and admiration of the world.

To which Address, His Royal Highness was pleased to return the following Answer :

I receive, with the utmost satisfaction, this loyal and dutiful address.

The interposition of Divine Providence has been strikingly manifested in the unexampled success which, during the present campaign, has attended the arms of His Majesty and of His Allies ; and, more especially, in the signal and decisive victory of Waterloo, by which the military reputation of this country has been raised to the highest eminence, and the fairest prospect afforded of lasting tranquillity to Europe.

I partake strongly of your feelings, on the loss to their families and their country, of the many brave officers and soldiers who have fallen ; and I am particularly sensible of the regret with which you have parted to a distinguished member of the House of Brunswick, who perished gloriously on the late ever memorable occasion.

Upon the steady attachment of the University of Cambridge to our excellent Constitution, in Church and State, I place the firmest reliance ; and I am confident, that you will ever continue to regard it as your indispensable duty to impress on the minds of the youth entrusted to your care, those principles which are the most conducive to the welfare and happiness of society, and the best security for the maintenance of our national prosperity and power.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful subjects, the representatives of the Royal Boroughs of Scotland, met in our annual convention, beg leave humbly to approach the Throne with the expression of our warmest congratulations to Your Royal Highness, on the glorious events which have, of late, added so much lustre to Your Royal Highness's government and to the British name.

When the man, from whose insatiable ambition so many calamities and, so many crimes had formerly arisen, returned from the asylum which the generosity of his conquerors had assigned him, and, favoured by the French soldiery, who still nourished the desire of rapine and bloodshed, which they had acquired under his command, seized the government of France, we should have anticipated a renewal of the disasters which had lately agitated and afflicted the European Commonwealth, had not our confidence in Your Royal Highness and your illustrious Allies, entitled us to trust that measures, proportioned to the exigency of the occasion, would, without delay, be taken for opposing this unexpected and imminent danger.

That confidence has been most amply justified. In consequence of the prompt, adequate and decisive measures which were adopted to oppose the pretensions of the usurper, a victory over him has

been achieved, which, when we consider, on the one hand, the numbers, experience and perfect equipment of his forces, the desperate valour of their attack, and the great military reputation of the leader who directed their movements ; and, on the other, the complete destruction or disorganization of his army, the final ruin of his hopes, and resignation of his power, which instantly followed, and the immediately succeeding occupation of his capital by the victorious army, we may confidently pronounce to be unequalled in the history of the world.

We reflect, with exultation, on this splendid monument of the invincible spirit and intrepidity of our countrymen, and of the unrivalled military talents of the great commander who has so often led them to glory and victory : we contemplate with high satisfaction the destruction of that military despotism, incompatible with the safety of surrounding nations, which had been re-established in France, and, with perfect confidence in the wisdom and equity of Your Royal Highness and of the Sovereigns who are engaged with Your Royal Highness in the same great cause, we look forward to the re-establishment of peace, on terms which will long secure the independence, the prosperity and the happiness of the nations of Europe.

That Almighty God may long preserve Your Royal Highness to be a blessing to this empire, and that Princes of the illustrious House of Brunswick may, to the latest posterity, sway the British Sceptre, is the prayer of, may it please Your Royal Highness, your Royal Highness's most humble and most devoted servants, the Representatives of the Royal Boroughs of Scotland.

NEW STAMP DUTIES:

Stamp Office, London, July 20, 1815.

NOTICE is hereby given, that two Acts were passed in the late Session of Parliament, for repealing the Stamp Duties on Deeds, Law Proceedings, and other written or printed Instruments, and the Duties on Fire Insurances and on Legacies and Successions to personal Estate upon Intestacies, and also the Duties on Advertisements, Almanacks, Newspapers, Pamphlets, Gold and Silver Plate, Stage Coaches, and Licences for keeping Stage Coaches, now payable in Great Britain, and for granting new Duties in lieu thereof; and that the new Duties are to commence upon the 1st of September next; except the Duty on Fire Insurances, which is to commence on the 29th September; and the Duties on Stage Coaches and Stage Coach Licences, which are to commence on the 5th September.

A very general increase of the present duties is enacted; and some Instruments are subjected to *ad valorem* Duties which are not so at present, such as Deeds of Exchange and Partition, Leases, Settlements of Money and of Shares in the public Stocks or Funds, whether voluntary or upon Marriage, and Warrants of Attorney to confess Judgment.

ment, when given as a security for money instead of bonds or mortgages. And Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes at more than two months after date, or sixty days after sight, are charged with higher Duties than those payable at shorter periods.

The new Duties are contained in Schedules, in which the instruments and things charged are classed and alphabetically arranged, so as to afford a complete Table of Duties, in the most convenient and practical form, and to supersede any occasion for those compilations, published by private individuals, to which the profession of the law and the public have formerly found it convenient to resort. And as the Schedules will not admit of an abridgment that can be safely relied upon, the Commissioners recommend it to the profession and others not to trust to any thing else in matters of importance.

The Acts contain various provisions for securing the Duties, which are material to be attended to by those who wish to avoid penalties. And the provisions of former Acts are to be enforced, in regard to those Duties, concerning which no new provisions are enacted. With respect to the

RECEIPT DUTIES,

it is to be observed, that not only formal Receipts, but all Notes and Memorandums, whether signed or not, which shall import any acknowledgment, that a sum of £2, or upwards, has been paid, settled, balanced, or otherwise discharged or satisfied, are liable to these Duties; and that all persons paying money are intitled to have stamped Receipts; at the expence of the persons receiving it, and on tendering a proper Stamp, may insist on having a Receipt written thereon, and on being paid for the Stamp; and that all persons refusing to give such Receipt and pay for the Stamp, as well as all persons giving a Receipt, or any such Note or Memorandum as aforesaid, without a Stamp, or upon a Stamp of insufficient value, will incur a penalty of ten pounds for every offence, which will be strictly enforced on every occasion.
