AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 1st of
August 1815,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in
Council.

A New Great Seal for the United Kingdom of
Great Britain and Ireland having been pre-
pared by His Majesty's Chief Engraver of Seals,
in pursuance of a warrant to him for that purpose
under His Majesty's royal signature, and the same
having been this day presented to His Royal High-
ness the Prince Regent in Council, and approved
by His Royal Highness, in the name and on the
behalf of His Majesty; and the old Great Seal
being delivered up to His Royal Highness by the
Right Honourable John Lord Eldon, Lord High
Chancellor of Great Britain, the same was defaced
in His Royal Highness's presence; and His Royal
Highness was thereupon pleased to deliver to his
Lordship the said new seal, and to direct, in the
name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that the
same shall be made use of for sealing all things
whatever which pass the Great Seal. *Chetwynd.*

AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 20th of
July 1815,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in
Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of
His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in
Council of the thirteenth day of February last, for
prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom,
or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt-petre,

or any sort of arms or ammunition, will ex-
pire on the thirteenth day of August next; and
whereas it is judged expedient for His Ma-
jesty's service, and the safety of this king-
dom, that the said prohibition should be con-
tinued for some time longer; His Royal Highness,
in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and
by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy
Council, doth, therefore, hereby order, require,
prohibit, and command, that no person or persons
whatsoever (except the Master-General of the
Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any
time during the space of six months (to com-
mence from the said thirteenth day of August next),
presume to transport into any parts out of this king-
dom, or carry coastwise, any gunpowder or salt-
petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, or ship
or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any
sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or
vessel, in order to transporting the same into any
parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same
coastwise, without leave or permission in that be-
half first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy
Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering
the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by
an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late
Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower
His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-
petre, and to enforce the law for empowering
His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-
powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition,
and also to enable His Majesty to restrain the
carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or
any sort of arms or ammunition:" But it is
His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing in this
Order contained shall prevent the exportation of
any of the articles, specified in the Order in Council
of the twentieth of May one thousand eight hun-
dred and thirteen, to the coast of Africa, under the
conditions contained in the said Order. And the
Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of
His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for
executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of
Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque
Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the
Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Ma-
