most expedient and salutary; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is thereupon pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the date of this Order, until six weeks after the commencement of the next session of Parliament, there shall be paid on the importation into this kingdom from the territories of the United States of America, in vessels of the said States, of any goods, wares, or merchandise, being of the growth, production, or manufacture of the said territories, the same duties of Customs that are by them payable on such goods, wares, or merchandise when imported from the United States in British vessels, and no other or higher duties of Customs; and it is hereby further ordered, that on the exportation of any goods, wares, or merchandise, the growth, production, or manufacture of His Majesty's territories in Europe from this kingdom to the territories of the United States, in vessels of the said States, there shall be paid the same duties as are by law payable on such goods, wares, or merchandise when exported to the said States in British vessels, and none other or higher duties; and it is hereby further ordered, that, on the exportation from this kingdom to the United States, of any goods, wares, or merchandise, of the growth, production, or manufacture of His Majesty's territories in Europe, in vessels of the said States, there shall be paid and allowed the same bounties as are paid and allowed on such goods, wares, and merchandise when exported to the said States in British vessels: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. *Chetwynd.*

His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the bond, of a certificate or certificates, in such form and manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards.
