A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS the Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the second day of November next: And whereas by Our Order in Council of the nineteenth of this instant October, it was ordered, that the said Parliament should be prorogued on the said second day of November to Thursday the first day of February next; and that the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Great Britain, should prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And whereas by Our Proclamation of the said nineteenth of this instant October, We did, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, publish and declare, that the said Parliament should, on the said first day of February next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And whereas We, taking the premises into Our consideration, have, for divers reasons, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, ordered and declared, that the aforesaid Order in Council and Proclamation should be discharged and recalled, and that the said Parliament be prorogued from the said Thursday the second day of November to Wednesday the seventeenth day of January next; We do therefore hereby publish and declare, that the said Order in Council and Proclamation are discharged and recalled accordingly.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the thirty-first day of October one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, in the fifty-sixth year of His Majesty's reign.

FIVE HUNDRED GUINEAS REWARD.

Whereas it has been humbly represented unto His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that, about midnight of the 18th of this month, the brig Renown, George Moor's Cleigh, owner, laying moored at the gates of Messrs. Laing's dock, in South Shields, was discovered to be on fire, and was very materially damaged; and whereas there is strong ground for suspecting that the said fire was wilfully and maliciously occasioned by some person or persons unknown;
