

Whitehall, November 2, 1815.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Richard Astley the younger, of Odstone-Hall, in the county of Lancaster, Esq. His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he may assume and take the surname and also bear the arms of Gough, pursuant to the request of his godfather John Gough, of Perry-Hall, in the county of Stafford, Esq.; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise His Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect.

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

Whitehall, November 12, 1815.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant unto Daniel Jacob, of the Commercial-Road, in the parish of St. George in the East, in the county of Middlesex, Merchant, second son of John Jacob, late of Ratcliffe-Highway, in the said county, Merchant, deceased, by Rebecca his wife, only child and heir of Abraham Jackson, formerly of Ratcliffe, in the said county of Middlesex, Gentleman, also deceased, His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he and his issue may, from affectionate regard to the memory of his said late honoured mother, take and use the surname of Jackson in lieu of that of Jacob.

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of none effect.

Whitehall, November 13, 1815.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant unto Sir Edward Blakeney, Knight, Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, Colonel in the Army, and Lieutenant-Colonel of the 7th Regiment of Foot, (or Royal Fusiliers), His Majesty's royal licence and permission, that he may accept and bear the insignia of a Knight of the Royal Portuguese Military Order of the Tower and Sword; with which His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of Portugal hath been pleased to honour him, in testimony of the high sense which that Prince entertains of the distinguished courage and intrepidity displayed by that Officer in several actions with the enemy in the Peninsula:

And His Royal Highness hath been further pleased to command, that the said royal concession and declaration, together with the relative documents, be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

Whitehall, November 3, 1815.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of

His Majesty, to grant unto Sir Samuel Ford Whittingham, Knight, Colonel in the Army, and Aide-de-Camp to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, and Lieutenant-General of the Spanish Army, and Knight of the Royal Spanish Military Order of San Fernando, His Majesty's royal licence and permission, that he may accept and wear the Grand Cross of the aforesaid Royal Spanish Military Order of San Fernando, with which His Majesty Ferdinand the Seventh, King of Spain, hath been pleased to honour him, as a signal testimony of His Catholic Majesty's approbation of the distinguished services rendered by that Officer in the field of battle during the Peninsular war.

And His Royal Highness hath been further pleased to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered, together with the relative documents, in His Majesty's College of Arms.

Whitehall, November 27, 1815.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented unto His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that an anonymous letter was some time ago received by Mr. Henry Luffe, of Benhall, near Saxmundham, threatening his life and to set his stacks on fire: And whereas it hath been further represented to His Royal Highness, that between the hours of nine and ten in the evening of Monday the 13th instant, a barn situate in Benhall aforesaid, containing a considerable quantity of corn, belonging to the said Henry Luffe, was maliciously set on fire and consumed;

His Royal Highness, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felonious act aforesaid, is hereby pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually sent the letter aforesaid, and the person who set on fire the above barn), who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of FIFTY POUNDS is hereby offered to any person (except as is before excepted) who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof, or to any person or persons who shall apprehend and bring the said offenders, or any of them, to conviction, or cause them, or any of them, so to be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid; such reward to be paid by the said Henry Luffe.
