Lyme, July 3.

Vessel newly arrived from the Islands of Guernsey and Fersey tell us, that they have been there frequently upon their Guards, several Fleets having appeared in their view, but that the condition of those places is such, by the Vigilancy and care of the Governor, as needs not seare any attempts: The French Fleet are for the greatest part returned to Kochelle, one squadron only plying upon the Coasts. Two or three considerable prizes have been lately brought in by the Privateers of those Islands, several Pickaroons have been also discovered upon their Coasts, but they heard of no prejudice received by them.

Alberaugh, July 4. Yekerday we discovered the Dutch Fleet under sail from Oasty-Bay, in their way three of them ran aground upon the sand called the Whiting, whereapon the rest of their Men of War came there to an Anchor, where they continued till the next Flood, when getting off, the whele Fleet came that night to an Anchor in this Bay, about two miles distant from us. In the morning a Galliot Hoy about Orford Light-house, put forty men into a boate, of whom they landed about ten of them, who only looking about them, ran again on board, and returned to sea. The last night and this morning we expected they would have attempted something upon us, the Country people coming in great numbers to entertain them, but they are now in motion about two Leagues off, sanding to the Southwards, either for the Gunfleet, or Buoy in the Nore.

Genoua, June 28. Two Courriers passed lately by this place from the Catholick Court at Madrid, one of them sent for Germany, the other to the Viceroy of Naples, with more then ordinary bast, which gives us reason to believe their business is of weight and concernment; they tell us that the Court and the Counsells there are fully employed, in considering and taking care for the preservation and desence of the Netherlands; they tell us forther that the Portugais have a very confiderable Army in readiness, and make frequent inroads into Gallicia, meeting with very little or no opposition. The 24 passed by several Courtiers from Romesent to Spain and France, with the News of the late Election of the new Pope, for which a Jubile is kept at Rome, with all the signs imaginable of publique joy, he being generally reputed a person of extraordinary merit, and advanced to the equal satisfaction of the schools.

From Milan we are advised, that the Governour Don Luys Peas de Leon is taking a review of all the Forces in that Durchy, having given order for the Mustering of Horse and Foot in several parts of his Government, of all which a list is to be brought to him, that he may the better judge of the true state of his Assairs. Eresh orders are also given out for the strengthning of all the Garrisons with Men, Ammunition and Provisions, and to perfect the Fortifications wheresoever they are sound defective a They also discourse of the speedy raising of sour Regiments of Foot, and a proportionable body of Horse, that shall be ready for service, to be employed as occasions may offer themselves.

Two French ships passed lately by this place to Legorne, from Cadia, being shed thence for least least they might otherwise have been sciled on by the Spaniards. The Convoy from this State arrived safely as Cadia the tenth Instant; four Galles are going out from hence, who are ordered to round Corfica, and clear the Ceast of the Tarkish Confaires, which instalt those parts.

Hambourg, July 3. The Swedes forces daily encrease several companies of Foot, and Troops of Horse being added to them out of Pomerania, where they are continually expecting the arrival of new forces from Swedeland, from whose Transportation the late Embargo was put upon all the Ports upon those seas, and many ships prefied for that service. The Army keeps quiet in their quarters, nor is it yet known what their design may be.

From Warfam we are told of the fresh irruption of the Tartars, who its hoped may for the suture find employment never home, it having been considertly reported, that the deposed Cham is now at the head of a very great & considerable Army, with which he intends to reenter upon his formerly enjoyed Dominions: of which the present professor has such apprehensions as oblige him to use all his Inserts for his defence; and that he has taken a Resolution to send an honourable Ambassa for to the Court of Poland to excuse the late inroades, as done without his knowledge or consent, and for the future to feate a firm Peace and Correspondency between them, to which end they have already began to prepare the way by returning several prisoners especially the principal parsons taken by them in the late Invasions.

Hamburgh, July 5. The 23, past arrived here the Princess Landgrave of Hesse, having conducted the Princess her daughter as fart as the East-sea, where she was received and espoused by his Royal Highness of Deamark. At her Entry here she was honorably received by the Senate, who made her a Present, and saluted by the Guns from the Wals. Yesterday she Embarqued for Stoads, where the Field Heer Wranges intends to receive her with all the Honors which can be expected. The 29 past dyed the Count de Oldenburg in the 83d year of his Age, and immediately upon the News, the Governor of Holstein, was by the King of Deamarks Order sent to take possession of the Country, who in the name of that King, gave the Oath of fidelity to the Inhabitants and Souldiers both of that and Delmenburs.

- Rome. June 25. By the indeavor of the Cardinals Barberino, Ottoboni, and Azzolino, was the Election of the new Pope carried on in fevor of Rofpigliofs, who being affured of the Majority of Votes required thereunto, they urged the concurrence of Cardinal Chigi, with his party, which being only 16. against 48. they in shew at least seemed willing to concurr: the French party after some opposition, agreed likewise with the rest, and now seem to have had their Ends in the Election.

Oa Monday an houre before Sun setting, the Cardinalls made their Adoration in the Cathadral of St Peters with the usual Cerimonies; His Haliness having taken the Name of Clement only (as he acquainted the Princess di Rosano) to tevive the glorious Memory of Clement the Eighth.

On Wednesday Father Celless was by order of his Holiness sent to Pistoya, to conduct himter, Don Gamillo, the Popes Brother, who at the arrival of the welcome news of his Election, gave liberty to all the Civil priloners there, discharging their Debts.

The same night the French Ambassador was introduced to his first Audience by Monfignere Altieri, who made his Complements of Congratulation, highly expressing the satisfa-

Elfenburg, June 25. About two dayes fince their Majeftles of Denmark returned to Copenhagen, from Newfladt, where they were present at the reception of the Princels of Heffe Caffel, who was there privately married to the Prince of Denmark, by the Bishop of that place, the great Ceremony being deferred till their arrival at Coppenhagen, where preparations are making for their Reception.

The Fleet is now rigged and fitted up, but they want Seamen, the greatest part of the men now aboard, being country men pickt up in Norway, unexperienced in Sta affairs; and thefe much diminished by a great fickness that still continues

amongit them. Yefterday arrived a Fleet of 60 fail of light Merchantmen from Holland, with one Man of War their Convoy, there lies ready the like number of laden filps in Helfinger Road, which 'cis believed may fet feil under the protection of the fame Men of War. The Swedes the every where fortifying their Franciers ; and 'cis faid are fending over 6000 Men into Pomerania.

Paris, July 13. The feventh inftant the King entred into Douay, the Government whereof is faid to be conferred upon the Prince d' Espinoy, both for the great courage he has shown upon all decasions, and for the zeal he has for the carrying on this War against the Spaniard. The Army is fince encomped at Arleux between Douay & Cambray, where in arties they make great spoil in the Corn, in all the neighbouring places belonging to the Spaniards. The Marquels de Bellefonds has now the Command given him of 6000 men, drawn out of the Army, with the Title of Lieutenant General : and the Sieu de Pequelin made Marefhall de Camp: hele Forces are faid to be intended to joyn with the Marefhal d' Aumont; and the Count de Grand Pre with his Forces, and another Regiment of Haie, which he is Commissioned to raile, to joyo with the Ma quis de Crequy.
