Stockholme, March 1g. GHB King has of late made a very remarkable Change with relation to the Senate, whole Power he has very much abridged; and whereas the Mem-bers thereof were heactefore called Aychi-Reedis, that is Councellors of the Crown, they are for the future to be fliled, Councellors to the King.
