Stockholm, March 13.

THE King has of late made a very remarkable Change with relation to the Senate, whose Power he has very much abridged; and whereas the Members thereof were heretofore called *Rycks-Rædis*, that is, Councillors of the Crown, they are for the future to be stiled, Councillors to the King. The Queen is very big, and expects to Lie-in about May. The King of Denmark is putting a Squadron of Men of War to Sea; and our King has thereupon likewise ordered a Squadron of 22 Ships to be fitted out with all speed.

Strasbourg, March 31. The Magistrates of this City have received a Command from the French King, to raise 200000 Crowns to be employed in the Fortifications that are making here; and this sum they are to furnish in four Payments: The said Fortifications, viz. the Cittadel, and the Fort of *Quayle* are so far advanced, that a Battalion will lodge the next week in each of them. Some days since one Doctor *Schmitz*, who had in a late Sermon given great offence to the French, was Arrested, and sent Prisoner to *Brillac*.

Cologne, April 3. The first Instant were exchanged the Ratifications of the Treaty concluded between our Elector and these Magistrates; by which his Electoral Highness has obliged himself to furnish in 15 days 800 Men for the service of this City; this Treaty was made with the approbation and consent of the Emperor. Monsieur *Tambonneau* the French Envoy continues still at *Coblentz*; and among other things we are told, he has proposed to that Elector, to receive French Garrisons into *Trier* and *Coblentz*. From *Frankfort* they write, that the Deputies of the Princes of the Empire, had after several Meetings agreed on an Answer to the Proposals of the French Ambassadors, which they intended in a day or two to put into the hands of the Emperors Ambassadors, to be communicated to those of France. The Bishop of *Strasbourg* (of whose death we gave you an Account in our last) dyed in the 56th year of his age, having the day before taken his leave by Letter of his Electoral Highness; he has by his Will, appointed his Nephew Prince *Egon of Furstemberg* his sole Heir, with condition, that he discharge the Legacies he has given, which are very many. The Affairs of *Liege* seem now to be in a fair way to an accommodation.

Brussels, April 10. Don Antonio de Leva, a person of the first quality here, parted last Saturday for England, being sent by his Excellency to make his complement to His Majesty and his Royal Highness upon his coming to this Government. His Excellency has ordered a Months pay for the whole Army; and for the future the Troops will be very punctually paid. Monsieur de Prado, the Prince of Parma's Secretary has been twice Examined in the Castle of *Filvord*, being accused of great corruptions in his Office, as well as of having misemployed the publick Moneys. His Excellency had given orders for the apprehending the Prevost of our Ladies Church at *Bruges*, who early related to Monsieur Prado, but he being received into the Colledge of the Carmelites, the Sum thereof has undertaken that he shall not depart without his Excellencies leave.

Argiers, April 7. From *Argiers* we have Advice, that the Government had Declared to the Dutch Consul that the Subjects of his State that are in Captivity were notwithstanding Ransomed, they would no longer maintain the Articles of Peace on

their side. The Elector of Brandenburg has caused a Bridge of Boats of a new Invention to be made at *Amsterdam*, which he intends to lay over the Rhine at *Wesel*. Our Letters from Germany tell us, that the Emperor intends to employ 12000 Men against the Hungarian Rebels; and to have an Army of 40000 Men for the service of the Empire.

Brague, April 4. Yesterday the States of Holland met again since their last recess; and on Monday next his Highness the Prince of Orange is expected here in Town. A Treaty of Guaranty having, as we formerly told you, been concluded between the Crown of Sweden and this State, for the maintaining the Peace of *Westphalia*, and of *Nimeguen*, the Emperor is since entered into the same; and this Week arrived here an Express from Vienna with his Imperial Majesties Ratifications of the said Treaty. And at the same time our Letters from *Germany* inform us that his Imperial Majesty intends to keep a Body of 12 or 14000 Men in Hungary, and to have an Army of 40000 Men on the Rhine this Summer, to act as the Service of the Empire shall require.

Paris, April 15. The King has given Monsieur de Lauzun 400 thousand Livres to recompence him for his place of Captain of the Guards du Corps; and 150 thousand to the Duke of Luxembourg. The Prior and Superiors of the Carmelites here at Paris having suspended one of their Members, in pursuance of a Decree of the Popes, for having maintained certain Theſes very offensive to the Court of Rome, the Parliament here has taken notice thereof, and has not only commanded the said Prior to take off the said suspension, but has laid an Injunction upon all the Regulars, not to receive and obey any Orders of the Court of Rome, without the Kings leave first obtained under the great Seal.

The following Addresses were presented to His Majesty at Newmarket, which His Majesty was pleased to receive with His accustomed Goodness.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

WE Your Majesties most Faithful and Obedient Subjects, the High Sheriff, a Lord-Lieutenant, Noble-men, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jury for the County of Leicestershire, at the Assizes there held, the threeth and twentieth day of March, in the Four and thirtieth year of Your Majesties Reign, having to our astonishment, understood of a most damnable and heinous practice, lately discovered by way of an Association, being a Paper found amongst the Writings of the Earl of Shaftesbury, introduced in Evidence when an Indictment of High Treason was preferred against him; as we cannot sufficiently admire the Divine Goodness of bringing to light such a work of darkness, of so dangerous a consequence, so we beg your Majesties leave, to protest here before your most utter Detestation of this execrable and wicked Designe, which would, not otherwise, or longer preclude our Obedience to your Majesty, than as you should submit your self to such Partisanary Votes, as tended to the exclusion of his Royal Highness, your Majesties only Brother, from all possibility of Succession to the Imperial Crown of this Realm, and thereby cause the descent of such an uncertainty, as might in all event, determine this most illustrious Monarchy: and upon your Majesties rejecting such Bills, you were to expect such measure, as those are threatened with, who oppose the Righteous ends of that Association, namely, to be subdued.

The Humble Address of Your Loyal Subjects, the Alderman, Recorder, Justices of Peace, Chief Burgesses, Town-Clerk, and the Burgesses of the Common-Council, of Your Majesties ancient Borough of Bury St. Edmund, in Your County of Suffolk.

Great SIR,

YOUR Gracious Acceptance of a late tender of our Duty and Loyalty, gives Encouragement; and since that, A happy Discovery of a Treasonable League and Association, against Your Sacred Person, and established Government, both in Church and State, (too well known, and therefore not to be repeated without Horror and Detestation) Administers a fresh occasion to us, to renew a Solemn Declaration of our continued Loyalty and Obedience to Your Sacred Person, and the established Government both in Church and State; All which (to our great grief) we find to be undermined and endangered by the wicked and destructive Principles of Jesuitism and Fanaticism, which reign too much in the Heads and Hearts of too many, who pretend themselves to be Religious, and Your Majesties Subjects, but indeed are the Subjects of him who is the known Enemy to all Religion and Goodness. And therefore amidst the disturbances which these destructive Principles have produced in this Nation, We humbly crave leave to Declare to Your Majesty that (Thanks be to God) none of us are infected therewith; and that from the bottom of our hearts, we do Renounce and Detest all Leagues, Covenants, and Associations, (and particularly that, which was lately discovered, being framed by ill-designing Men) against Your Sacred Person and Government, and the established Laws of this Land; And that as we are, so we shall continue to be true and faithful to Your Sacred Person (which God Almighty long preserve) and to Your Heirs and lawful Successors. And we do further Declare, That no Force, Fear, or cowardly Policy, shall (by God's assistance) withdraw us from this our just and solemn Resolution and Declaration. In Witness whereof we have hereunto set the Common Seal of the said Borough, the seven and twentieth day of March, in the Four and thirtieth year of Your Majesties Reign.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious and Dread Sovereign,

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Bury St. Edmund, calling to mind the many Miracles of the Divine Mercy, express in the multiply'd preservations of your Majesties Sacred Person from your restless and implacable Enemies; and out of a just hatred of both the Principles, and Practices of these Sons of Belial, who under the most specious pretences of Liberty of the subject, and Freedom of Conscience, endeavour to persuade the Ignorant and less discerning, that back the one and the other, are invaded by a just execution of your Majesties most equitable and pious Laws; and strive to rob your Majesty of the Hearts and dutiful Affections of many of your Loyal Subjects, and as far as in them lies, to cheer them into the most execrable of Treasons, by associating themselves into that Traitorous Bond, and Hypocritical Platitudes of a new Rebellion, which was produced at the proceedings against the Earl of Shaftesbury, at the Old Bailey; Or with our hearts and souls, Detest, Renounce and Abhor, that, and all other Associations, entered into without your Majesties allowance and direction; and do believe, that none of the abominable Leagues, Adjurations, Vows, or Covenants, imposed upon any of the Subjects of your Majesties Dominions; by whom your Majesties late Married Father of Glorious memory was murdered, can, or dare contain in its dangerous and destructive Treasons, than the said Association; And if

the said Association had not (by the Goodness of God, and your Majesties prudent Vigilance) been timely discovered, and its dire effects and progress prevented, but that your Majesties Subjects had been drawn into the snare, it would soon have proved the common Theme of Conventicles; where the zealous Believers, whole Trumpeters of Sedition and Rebellion, would have rendered it capable of as many constructions and interpretations as their Successes or Misfortunes had required or called for, (and Revelations could not have been wanting to confirm all) till at last they might as justly have distinguished between, and divided your Majesties Sacred Person from your Royal and Kingly Office of Government, fought against the one, under pretence of preserving the other, to the destruction of both together; cryed out against the Heretical Church of Rome, till they had destroyed the most Orthodox Church of England; beaten down all true Religion, and erected Atheism, as did their Fathers in this wicked Art, deal with the best of Men and Kings, your Royal Father, and with the best Monarchy and Church in the world, by virtue of the Text of, and their Comments upon the Solemn League and Covenant, and other their perfidious Vows. As as bound in Honor, Conscience, and Duty, we do resolve and assure your Majesty, that we will stand by your Sacred Majesty, in the Defence of your Royal Person and Government, your Majesties Heirs and Lineal Successors, and the Church of England, as it is by Law established, with our Lives and Fortunes, which we here humbly prostrate at your Royal Feet, to be employed at your pleasure, against all the contrary designs of Papists, Atheists, and Phanatics. And when your Majesty shall think fit to call a Parliament, we will make choice of such Representatives, as shall be grateful to your Majesty, and heartily endeavour to give your Majesty such Supports and Assistances, as shall be necessary for the quieting differences, and carrying on of your Majesties Affairs, according to your desires. We humbly beseech your Majesty Graciously to accept these our Sentiments, and Resolutions, from which, neither length, nor alterations of Times, Poverty, Riches, Power, Force or Fraud, shall ever make us recede.

Great SIR, that Gracious God by whom your Majesty Reigns, Bless and Preserve you with a long and prosperous Reign, settle you firmly in the hearty Affections of your People, weaken your Enemies, confound their Devices; and grant that Great Britains scepter may be swayed by the Royal family of the STUARTS, while the Sun and Moon endure.
