HIS Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant the dignity of a Baronet of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland to the following Gentlemen, and the respective heirs male of their bodies lawfully begotten, viz.

Sir Chaloner Ogle, Knt. Admiral of the Red Squadron of His Majesty's Fleet.

Banastre Tarleton, Esq. General in the Army, and Colonel of His Majesty's 21st Regiment of Light Dragoons.

John Floyd, Esq. General in the Army, and Colonel of His Majesty's 8th Regiment of Light Dragoons.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, acting in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, has been pleased to nominate and appoint Major-General Sir Hudson Lowe, Knt. Knight of the Imperial Russian Military Order of St. George of the 4th class, and of the Royal Prussian Order of Merit, Lieutenant-General in the island of St. Helena, and Governor of the same for the Honourable the East India Company, to be a Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.
