Everal reports have been spread abroad of the Designs of the Turks upon Hungary, while at the same time the Letters we receive from those that ought to know best, do not speak of the Preparations they are making, so as to give us any cause to believe they intend a War. The Palatine of Hungary is still here, expecting the return of an Officer he lent to

Erancfort, April 9. The Duputies of the Empire have agreed on an Answer to the Proposals of the French Ambassadors, of the 5th of Fanuary last, the effect of which is, That the Princes their Masters are very much satisfied with the assurances his most Christian Majesty gives them of his sincere intentions to maintain the Peace; that they will not be wanting on their part in any thing that may tend to the establishing it; That in order thereunto, they doubt not but his most Christian Majesty will (according as his Ambassadors promised in their said Propofals) restore things to the state they were in at the time of his Ambassadors departure from Paris, and will cause all Proceedings concerning Dependenties to cease; which donesthey hope the Complaints of the States that have been aggreeved, will be taken into confideration, and fatisfaction given them; and declare, That they are willing to Treat upon thefe, and the other Points mentioned in the French

Liege, April ,. The two Obstacles that chiefly hindred the conclusion of the Treaty, between the Elector of Cologne and this City, which were, That these Magistrates refused to Disband the Troops they had raised, and to set at liberty the Prisoners they had taken, are now removed; for the Magi-Araces (finding the Commonalty would not contribute the Moneys necessary for the maintenan e of the f.id Troops) have resolved to do both; and belides, do not any longer oppo the railing of the 80th penny, which was the first occasion of these troubles, so that it is not doubted but that an accommodation will very speedily be made between his Electoral Highness and this City; and that thereby things will be restored to their former state and

tranquility.

Cologne, April 7. Two days fince Prince William of Furstemberg communicated to the Magistrates of this City, the following Declaration of the most Christian King, which he had received that day from the Court of France.

The King baving always bad a particular care to preferre a good Correspondence and Union with the States his Neighbors, and particularly those that depend of the Empire, and His Majesly being informed that tame of the same for the same of the sam Jome of those who for their particular Interests would

trouble the publick. Peace and Tranquility, bave spread abroad a report, that his Majesty has formed some Designe against the City of Cologne; his Majesty has empowered. Prince William of Furthemberg, to assure those of that City of the contrary, and of his sincere intention to contribute whatever depends on him for their good and additional to the contract of the tribute whatever depends on him for their good and advantage, whether in time of Peace or of War; provided the said Prince can likewise be Caution to His Majesty, that the said City shall observe such a Conduct, us may not give his Majesty any just cause to mistrust them. And his Majesty does likewise by these Presents, Authorise the said Prince of Furstemberg to give the said City all the securities they can desire for that purpose. Given at St. Germains in Laye, the 25th of March; 1682. Signed Louis, and lower Colbert.

Upon which our Magistrates, after long deliberation, have resqueed to write a Letter of Thanks to his most Christian Majesty. To Morrow or next day we expect here the 800 Men which our Elector the Bishop of Munster, to pray him to hasten the March of the 1000 Men, he has promised to assist them with. The States of West phalia Assembled at Duisberg, have not as yet taken any formal Refolutions about affifting this City; all they have hitherto done, being, that they have resolved to bring into the Field, without any delay, their Quota of the Army of the Empire, which is 4029 Men.

Hamburg, April 10. It is reported that the Princes of Saxony, Brunswick and Hesse, are resolved to have such Bodies on foor, that in case there be occasion, they will together be able to bring, besides their Quota's of the Atmy of the Empire, 40000

Men into the Field.

Hague, April 14 Prince Louis of Brandenburg having been here some days, returned again this Morning for Virecht, the place of his present Residence. Our Northern Letters continue to speak of an Alliance between France, Deumark, and Brandenburg and at the same time tell us, that the King of Sweden does very firmly adhere to the Interests of the Empire; and that a Defensive League is Treating between him and the Princes of Lunenburg. The French King has by his Minister at Ratisbonne acquainted the States Assembled there, That he had raised the Bloquade of Luxemburg.

Paris, April 18. In our last we told you of \$ Decree the Parliament here had made, concerning the Regulars; of which, and the occasion of it, we can now give you a more particular account. ther Felix de Buby, of the Convent of the Car-melites here at Paris, having in a Lecture of Divinity, maintained the Doctrines contained in the late Declaration of the Clergy, and notice having been given thereof at Rome; the Commissary General of that Order, did by a Mandate dated the 28th of February last, require the Prior of the said Convent, to Suspend the said Father from exera-cifing the Function of Divinity-Reader in that Co: 4

of which, Information having been given to the Parliament by the Attorney-General, the Parliament ordered the 14th Inflant, That the faid Prior should appear before them, to give an account of his Proceeding; that he should produce the Mandate he had received from the Commissary General, and that he should shew the Attorney-General the Register of the Convent, to the end he might take thereout such Extracts as he should think fit. To which Order of the Parliament the Prior yielding Obedience, and accordingly app aring, he was (two of the antientell Fathers of the Convent being prefent) very sharply reproved for his Disobedience to the Kings Orders, and commanded not to execute the Mandate of the Commissary General, on pain of being Exemplarily Punished. The Parliament farther Ordered, that the faid Father Felix de Buby, should continue his Function of Divinity-Reader, and that the other Religious give him no disturbance therein, and commanded the Prior to present the said Father, as well as the other Religious of his Convent, to the Arch-1 ishop of Paru, that he may give him such Employments within his Dioces, as he shall judg him capable of; and this on pain of forfeiting the Temporalities of the faid Convent, and the Priviledges that have been granted them by the King. The Court did farther Order, that the faid Letter or Mandate of the Commiliary General shall be suppressed, and raced out of the Register of the Convent: that this Decree of the Parliament shall be inserted on the side of it; and that notice shall be given thereof to all the Provincials of the Carmeli es in France. The Parliament has likewise forbid all the Religious of that Order, and all others, whose Superiors are not resident in France, to Execute, any Mandates, Letters, or Orders, of their Generals, which do not concern the internal and ordinary Discipline of their Convents.

The Humble Declaration of the Grand Jury, holden for the County of Cornwal, the 21 day of March, in the Four and Thirtieth Tear of Your Mujesties Reign.

May it please Your Majesty,

Though Divine Providence has placed us in the remotest Part of this Your Kingdom of England, yet none of all Your Subjects shall be nearer to Your Majesty than us, whenever the Insolency of the Seditious or Turbulent shall offer any Occasion. And to this we are bound by the double Obligations of Gratitude and Duty; for otherwise we should be exceedingly ungrateful, both to the Memory of the Royal Martyr, Your Majesties Father, this County being Obliged to him for peculiar Favours and Priviledges granted us by his Grace; and to Your own Sacred Person, being Indebted to Your Vigilancy and Protection (next under Heaven) for our Liberties, our Lives, our Religion, and all that is dear to us.

For this reason, we lay at Your Majesties Feet our Lives

For this reason, we lay at Your Majesties Feet our Lives and Fortunes, well knowing they are never later than when reposed there—And we humbly beg Your Majesty not to look on this Paper as a piece of Formality or common Ceremony, but as a real Protestation of our good Affection and Loyalty. What we tell Your Majesty in a Black Character, we shall be ready to confirm in a Red; and on all oc-

casions, the Strokes of our Swords shall be as Loyal as these of our Pen.

For a fuller Demonstration yet of our Zeal to Your Majelt,, and for the Establish'd Laws, and this Ancient Monarchy, we detest the horrid Confederacy of the Assention, and abhor all such as either contrived it, or engaged in it, as Men of pernicious and most dangerous Principles. It be gins, we confels, with fair Pretences of Loyalty and Religion, to blind their seduced Proselytes, but it ends with evil intentions, and tatal Resolutions. It is a Black Spirit disguited in the Mantle of Sommel: It books fair and plausible in the Front, but in the Conclution, we discover the Clower foot of its which plainly shews that it was contrived by some Discontented Antimonarchical Fallen-Angel. It does not barely aim at Your Own Sacred Person, which is the lively Ressection of the Finglia Monarchy, which is the imitation of the Divine Regiment in Heaven. It wrests the Sword from the Hands of Your Majest, and places all Authority in the hands of a few disaffected Persons. So that for these Reasons, we look on this Cursed Model of the Assentiation, and has directed Your Majesty in thele Nice and Critical times. It had been a Wonder how Your Majesty has walked thus securely and evenly through all the Windings and Labyrinths of State, had not the Laws been Your Rule to Conduct You, and bad not Religion been the Standard of all Your Actions; that Religion in which Your Royal Father of ever Besseld Memory was doubly Baptized, both with Water and Blood. But as to this we only touch on it, for we intend no Panegyrick, knowing Your Majesty takes much greater Pleasure in doing Good, than in hearing the repeated Ecchoes of Your Royal Merits; and looking on Your great Virtues as a fitter Subject for the Records of Honour, in which Your Memory will smell sweet to all Eternity.
