His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, has been pleased to approve of the 50th Regiment, and the 1st Battalion of the 71st Regiment, being permitted to bear on their colours and appointments (in addition to any badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to those regiments), the word *Almaraz*, in commemoration of the gallantry and good conduct evinced by that corps at the storming of Almaraz, in Spain, on the 19th May 1812.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has also been pleased to approve of the 3d Regiment of Hussars of the King's German Legion being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments (in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to that regiment), the word *Peninsula*, in consideration of the services of that corps in Portugal and Spain, during the years 1808 and 1809.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to approve of the 49th (or the Hertfordshire) Regiment, being in future styled the 49th (or Princess Charlotte of Wales's Regiment) retaining its County Title; and of the Regiment being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments (in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the Regiment) the word "*Queenstown*," in commemoration of the very distinguished gallantry displayed by the flank companies of that Regiment, at Queenstown, in Upper Canada, on 13th October 1812, under the command of the late Major-General Sir Isaac Brock, who fell on that occasion.
