**N**OTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness the Prince Regent will hold a Levee at Carlton-House, on Wednesday next the 29th instant, at half past two o'clock.

*Westminster, May 21, 1816.*

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for raising the sum of two millions four hundred and seventy thousand pounds Irish currency by Treasury Bills, for the service of Ireland, for the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

An Act for raising the sum of one million seven hundred thousand pounds British currency by Treasury Bills, for the service of Ireland, for the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

An Act for further continuing, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, an Act of the forty-fourth year of His present Majesty, to continue the restrictions contained in the several Acts of His present Majesty on payments of cash by the Bank of England.

An Act to enable the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to issue Exchequer Bills on the credit of such aids or supplies as have been or shall be granted by Parliament, for the service of Great

Britain for the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

An Act to make perpetual certain temporary or war duties of Customs on the importation into Great Britain of goods, wares, and merchandise, and to repeal so much of several Acts, passed in the forty-seventh, forty-ninth, and fifty-first years of the reign of His present Majesty, as charge any loans, made for the service of the years one thousand eight hundred and seven, one thousand eight hundred and nine, and one thousand eight hundred and eleven, upon the war duties of Customs or Excise, and to charge such loans on the duties of Customs made perpetual.

An Act to charge an additional duty on corks ready made, imported into Great Britain.

An Act for indemnifying the Commissioners of Excise in Scotland, and all persons who may have acted under their authority, in relation to certain orders issued and things done relative to certain Acts regarding the distilleries in Scotland.

An Act for the more speedy and effectual collection of the tonnage duty upon ships inwards; for empowering the Lords of the Treasury to regulate the hours of officers attendance in the port of London; and for permitting ships to commence and compleat their loading of coals before the delivery of the fitters certificates.

An Act for transferring all contracts and securities entered into with or given to the Commissioners for Transports, to the Commissioners of the Navy and Victualling.

An Act to permit the importation of prunes, the produce of Germany.

An Act to repeal two Acts, passed in the reigns of King Edward the Fourth and King Richard the Third, which prohibit the importation of wrought goods, and certain other articles.

An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia.

An Act to reduce the number of days of muster or exercise of yeomanry and volunteer cavalry.

An Act to indemnify such persons in the United Kingdom as have omitted to qualify themselves for offices and employments, and for extending the time limited for those purposes respectively until

The twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and seventeen; and to permit such persons in Great Britain, as have omitted to make and file affidavits of the execution of indentures of clerks to attornies, and solicitors, to make and file the same on or before the first day of Hilary Term one thousand eight hundred and seventeen.

An Act for fixing the rates of subsistence to be paid to innkeepers and others, on quartering soldiers.

An Act for the incorporation of the Highland Society of London, for the better management of the funds of the society; and for rendering its exertions more extensive and beneficial to the public.

An Act for preventing frauds in the admeasurement and delivery of coals within the several parishes in the county of Middlesex lying between the parish of Saint Luke, Chelsea, and the mouth of the River Colne, near Staines, and also between Limehouse-Hole and the mouth of the River Lee, near Blackwall, and also within the several parishes in the counties of Middlesex and Essex adjoining to both banks of the River Lee, and the branches thereof, between the River Thames and Edmonton.

An Act for amending and enlarging the powers of two Acts of His present Majesty, for constructing an harbour at Porthleven, in Mount's-Bay, in the county of Cornwall.

An Act to enlarge, amend, and render more effectual the provisions of an Act of His present Majesty, for paying and lighting the city of Hereford, and removing nuisances therein; and for enabling the Corporation of the said city to sell and apply the produce of certain messuages and lands in establishing market-places, and otherwise improving the said city.

An Act for enlarging the term and powers of an Act of His present Majesty, for building a church in and for the parish of Newry, in the counties of Down and Armagh.

An Act for paying, lighting, cleansing, and otherwise improving the town of West Cowes, in the Isle of Wight, in the county of Southampton, and for establishing a market within the said town.

An Act for paving and improving the footways, and for cleansing, lighting, and watching the streets and other public passages and places in the town of Melksham, in the county of Wilts.

An Act to repeal a certain part of an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend an Act of His present Majesty, for establishing a ferry across the River Thames at Woolwich, in the county of Kent."

An Act for repairing and altering the parish church of Saint George the Martyr, in the county of Middlesex; and for making further provision for the Rector of the said parish.

An Act for making and maintaining a railway or tram-road from Peak Forest to Beard, and from Peak Forest aforesaid to or near to Woodlands, all in the county of Derby.

An Act for making and maintaining a road from near Gattton-Lodge, in the county of Surrey, to Povey-Cross, in the said county.

An Act for continuing the term and altering and enlarging the powers of an Act of the fortieth year of His present Majesty, for improving the roads

leading from the town of Leominster, in the county of Hereford.

An Act for repairing and improving the road from the Lyme turnpike road, in the parish of Gittisham, to Sidmouth, in the county of Devon.

An Act to rectify a mistake in an Act of the fifty-third year of His present Majesty, for repairing the roads from Bowes, in the county of York, to join the Great North Road near Sunderland Bridge, in the county of Durham.

An Act for more effectually repairing the road leading from Farnborough, in the county of Kent, to Riverhill, in the parish of Sevenoaks, in the said county.

We rejoice that our Meeting is sanctioned by the presence of a Representative of our King, and that that Representative is a Nobleman, who is so peculiarly endeared to us by the zeal and ability with which he has repeatedly discharged the duties of the same high office; in whose indulgence we have long been accustomed to confide; whose character and virtues we have long revered.

We receive with gratitude and heartfelt joy, the approbation which your Royal Highness is pleased to express of the manner in which we have endeavoured to discharge the sacred duties of our calling, to meet the dangers which surrounded us, and the difficulties which, for a time, threatened the existence of all our establishments, civil and religious. While we feel the most sincere sorrow for the continued indisposition of our beloved and venerable Sovereign, and earnestly beseech the Almighty to look upon him in mercy, we are thankful to the Supreme Disposer of all events, that He has given us, in your Royal Highness, a Prince, so well fitted to conduct the Government, with the prudence, equity, and firmness, which are necessary for maintaining the honour and the prosperity of the empire.

Since we last had an opportunity of laying the dutiful expression of our homage before the Throne, we reflect, with profound gratitude to Him whose kingdom ruleth over all, on the signal favour which he hath manifested to our Country and to Europe, in shortening the calamities of war; and we regard with admiration the vigour and promptitude with which your Royal Highness, in conjunction with the allied Sovereigns, interposed to stop the career of the tyrant, who had again possessed himself of the government of France, and brought Europe into the hazard of encountering those difficulties a second time, which had already been so severely and extensively experienced.—We offer our most respectful congratulations to your Royal Highness, on the pre-eminent skill and bravery displayed by His Majesty's troops in the late short war—and on the fortunate and brilliant results in which it has terminated. As servants of the Prince of Peace, we gladly indulge the hope, that the pacification which has been concluded, will secure to the exhausted nations of Europe, a long respite from the horrors and burdens of war; and that that people, whose turbulence has so long proved the scourge of the civilized world, experiencing the advantages of order and tranquillity, will acquire a desire of cultivating the habits and virtues of peace, and of promoting that general improvement of human so-

society, which peace and industry and regular government are calculated to advance.

We humbly beg leave to lay before your Royal Highness, the dutiful expression of our high satisfaction, on account of that domestic event which has proved so gratifying to the British nation—the marriage of your august daughter the Princess Charlotte Augusta, with his Serene Highness Leopold George Frederick, Duke of Saxe and Prince of Cobourg, of Saalfeld. Then, by the Prince Regent's command, General His Serene Highness Prince Leopold George Frederick of Saxe-Cobourg was introduced into the presence between Sir George Beckwith and Lord Lynedoch, the two Junior Knights Grand Crosses present, preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Order.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York, Senior Knight Grand Cross, received, thereupon, the ribband and badge from the Genealogist, and presented them to the Prince Regent, who was pleased to put the same over the right shoulder of Prince Leopold; and, His Serene Highness rising, and having kissed the Prince Regent's hand, and received from His Royal Highness the star of the Order, withdrew.

Then Lieutenant-General the Honourable Sir John Abercromby was introduced with like ceremony; and, he kneeling, the sword of state was delivered to the Prince Regent by Viscount Keith, the Second Knight Grand Cross in seniority present; and His Royal Highness therewith conferred the honour of Knighthood upon the Lieutenant-General.

The Prince Regent was thereupon pleased to invest him with the ribband and badge; and Sir John Abercromby having kissed His Royal Highness's hand, and received the star of the Order from His Royal Highness, withdrew.

The Knights Grand Crosses being then called over by the Gentleman Usher, the procession returned in the order as before.

The Prince Regent and the Knights Companions being seated, the Chancellor, standing in his place on the left hand of His Royal Highness, acquainted His Royal Highness that the Dean of Windsor, the Honourable and Reverend Doctor Henry Lewis Hobart, attended at the door of the Chapter-Room, and humbly prayed admittance to take the oath of office of Register of the Most Noble Order.

Then, by command of His Royal Highness, the Register, in his mantle, was conducted by Black Rod into the presence; Black Rod bearing (in the absence of Garter) the Register's gold chain and badge and the book upon a crimson velvet cushion; and the Register kneeling near the Prince Regent, the oath was administered to him by the Chancellor; Black Rod holding the Gospels: whereupon Black Rod, kneeling, presented to His Royal Highness the gold chain and badge, which His Royal Highness was pleased to put over the Register's neck. Black Rod then presented also the book, which the Prince Regent delivered to the Register; and the latter, having kissed His Royal Highness's hand, withdrew to his place at the bottom of the table.

The Chancellor, then, by command of His Royal Highness, read a new statute, dispensing with existing statutes in as far as may be required for the especial purpose therein mentioned, and decreeing, ordaining, and enjoining that His Serene Highness Prince Leopold George Frederick of Saxe Cobourg, consort of Her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte Augusta, be declared elected a Knight of the said Most Noble Order.

The Chancellor, thereupon, declared to the Chapter, that the said illustrious Prince had been elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

His Serene Highness was then, by the command of the Prince Regent, conducted into the Chapter-Room between the Earl of Liverpool and Viscount Castlereagh, the two Junior Knights Companions present; preceded by Black Rod, bearing (in the absence of Garter) the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion.

His Serene Highness kneeling near the Prince Regent, and Black Rod presenting, on his knee, the Garter, His Royal Highness, assisted by their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of York and Clarence, the two Senior Knights Companions, buckled it on His Serene Highness's left leg; the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

Black Rod then presented the ribband with the George; and His Royal Highness, with the assistance of the said two Senior Knights Companions, put the same over His Serene Highness's left shoulder; the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

His Serene Highness having kissed the hand of

the Prince Regent, His Royal Highness gave him the accolade; and His Serene Highness, having severally saluted and received the congratulations of the Knights Companions, withdrew.
