THE Members of the Highland Society of Lon-  
don have unanimously thought it their duty to ex-  
press, by a Deputation from their Body, the deep  
sense which they entertain of your Royal High-  
ness's gracious condescension, in affording them  
your Royal countenance and support, by placing  
yourself at their head.

The objects which the Society endeavours to  
accomplish are, the preservation of the language  
and antiquities of the Caledonians, and of the re-  
mains of Celtic Poetry and Literature; the estab-  
lishment and support of Gaelic Schools in the  
Highlands of Scotland; the relieving of distressed  
Highlanders at a distance from their homes, and  
promoting the improvement and general welfare of  
the northern parts of the kingdom. They have al-  
so in view the preservation of such of the habits  
and principles of their ancestors as must be benefi-  
cial to the community in all times, and under all  
circumstances. They hope, Sir, by their efforts to  
encourage and maintain a spirit of industry, accom-  
panied by probity of enterprise, controlled by pru-  
dence, a firm adherence to the law and constitution  
of the realm, a love of order, morality, and reli-  
gion, and that zeal for their Sovereign, for which  
they have ever been distinguished, and which has  
even characterised their errors.

They also conceive, Sir, that they cannot more  
effectually promote the military ardour of their

countrymen, than by diffusing among them the  
means of well understanding that wholesome con-
