And we beg leave to assure your Royal Highness, that we reflect with the utmost pleasure on an alliance with a Protestant Prince of his illustrious race; an alliance which must not only promote the domestic happiness of your Royal Highness, but also add further stability to your august house and our unrivalled constitution.

In testimony whereof we have caused the common seal of said City to be hereto affixed, the 13th day of May 1816.

That the Almighty may continue to prosper the government of your Royal Highness, and bless your Royal person and family, is our earnest prayer.

We humbly beg leave to solicit the continuance of your gracious favour and protection for our Churches, the most ancient foreign Protestant in the United Kingdom.
