France; at which, the Dukes of LunenLu g are much concerned, having premited to protect the City of Lubeck against the faid Pretensions. The King of Denmark is fitting out a Squadion of Men of War with great Diligence, which gives fome jealoufie to his Neighbours, and the rather, becaufe of the Alliance which is faid to have been lately concluded

between him and France. Bruffels, April 28. The Count de Noyell is come from the Prince of Orange, to Complement the Marquils de Grana; and Monficur Dyckvelt will in few days be here on the fame Brrand from the States. His Excellency has appointed Commiffioners for the Trial of the Sieur Prado, who meet every day to receive Complaints against him, fome of which are of a high mature; to will, For procuring Orders from the Prince of Parma, to obstruct Juflice; the like is objected against his Nephew the Sicur Aefferden. His Excellency has received Letters by an Express from Monsfeur Delval at Paris, giving an account, that the French King upon his Excellencies Letter, has given orders for the Releafing the Priloners taken by the French, when they last fell into Flanders; of which his Excellen-cy has given notice to the States of Flanders, that Moneys may be fent to Cambray, to discharge their Expences. Monficur Deival gives likewife hopes that the Confilcations in the new Conquests, will be taken off, which will be very welcome to the Nobility and Gentry, who how fuffer very much thereby.

Hague, May r. This Morning the Burghers, according to cuftom, fet up feveral May-polesb. fore the Apartments of the States-General, the Prince and Princels of Orange, &c. Prince Louis of Bran-denburg is come hither again, and will flay here du-ring the Fair. The King of Denmarke has feized feveral Ships belonging to Lubeck, which we are here fomewhat concerned at.

Paris, May 2. In our last we told you, that the Kings Edict upon the late Declaration of the Clergy, had been received and Registred by the Univerfity : Thisday the first Prefident, and the Atturney General, were at the Sarbonne, to caule the like to be done there. From Francfort we have an account, that the French Ambassadors had received an Answer to their Proposals, but that they were not at all fatisfied with it.

Windfor, April 23.
