

belonging to that City, in their Passage through the Sound, being bound home from Portugal and France; at which, the Dukes of Lunenburg are much concerned, having promised to protect the City of Lubeck against the said Pretensions. The King of Denmark is fitting out a Squadron of Men of War with great Diligence, which gives some Jealousie to his Neighbours, and the rather, because of the Alliance which is said to have been lately concluded between him and France.

Brussels, April 28. The Count de Noyell is come from the Prince of Orange, to Complement the Marquis de Grana; and Monsieur Dyckvelt will in few days be here on the same Errand from the States. His Excellency has appointed Commissioners for the Trial of the Sieur Prado, who meet every day to receive Complaints against him, some of which are of a high nature; to wit, For procuring Orders from the Prince of Parma, to obstruct Justice; the like is objected against his Nephew the Sieur Aesferden. His Excellency has received Letters by an Express from Monsieur Delval at Paris, giving an account, that the French King upon his Excellencies Letter, has given orders for the Releasing the Prisoners taken by the French, when they last fell into Flanders; of which his Excellency has given notice to the States of Flanders, that Monies may be sent to Cambray, to discharge their Expences. Monsieur Delval gives likewise hopes that the Confiscations in the new Conquests, will be taken off, which will be very welcome to the Nobility and Gentry, who now suffer very much thereby.

Hague, May 1. This Morning the Burghers, according to custom, set up several May-poles before the Apartments of the States-General, the Prince and Princess of Orange, &c. Prince Louis of Brandenburg is come hither again, and will stay here during the Fair. The King of Denmark has seized several Ships belonging to Lubeck, which we are here somewhat concerned at.

Paris, May 2. In our last we told you, that the Kings Edict upon the late Declaration of the Clergy, had been received and Registered by the University: This day the first President, and the Attorney General, were at the Sarbonne, to cause the like to be done there. From Francfort we have an account, that the French Ambassadors had received an Answer to their Proposals, but that they were not at all satisfied with it.

Windfor, April 23. This day the Mayor, Aldermen, Stewards, Bailiffs, &c. of this place, attended His Majesty, and (in a Speech made by the Steward) expressed the great Joy His Majesties Royal Presence gave them, and returned His Majesty their most humble Thanks for the Benefit and Advantages they receive thereby; after which, the Mayor presented the following Address to His Majesty, which His Majesty was pleased very graciously to accept of, and to return them his Thanks. The same day the Mayor, Aldermen, and the rest, waited upon his Royal Highness; and the Steward, in the Name of this Burrough, Congratulated His Royal Highness safe and happy Return into this Kingdom. His Royal Highness was pleased to receive them very favourably, and to assure them of his readiness to do this Burrough all the kindness that lay in him to do.

Bailiffs, Dungeesses, and others the Inhabitants of the Burrough of New-Windfor, seriously Reflecting upon the sad and dismal Calamities that beset the People of this Realm, by the Alteration and Change of the ancient and well Established Government of this Kingdom, in the time of the late Rebellion; and considering that there have been, of late, Attempts made, by evil-meaning People, and disaffected to the present Government, to effect and accomplish the like; and we being fully convinced, That what shall be Done, Contrived, or Intended by any Person or Persons whatsoever, to the Prejudice, Subversion, or Destruction of Your Majesties Sacred Person or Government now Established by Law, ought to be Rejected and Prevented by all Good People; Do therefore, in Testimony of our Loyalty unto Your Majesty, hereby declare our utter Dislike, Detestation, and Abhorrence of the late designed Diabolical and Treasonable Association, beginning under a specious pretence of the Preservation of Religion, and ending, most impiously and wickedly, with the total Extermination of King and Government, and tending not only to the Destruction of the undoubted Right of your Majesties lawful Successors, but of the ancient Monarchical Government of this Nation; In Defence whereof, and of your Majesties Sacred and Royal Person, and the Protestant Religion as it is now Established, we all resolve to hazard our Lives and Fortunes, and all that is near and dear unto us. And shall likewise continue our Prayers, to Almighty God for the Preservation of your Majesties Sacred Person, and long and prosperous Reign; That all the Machinations and Devices of Wicked and Impious Men, against your Majesty, and your Government, may be Confounded and Annihilated; That your Majesties Crown may Flourish, and that we may Peaceably acquiesce in all the Acts of your Majesties Royal Government; and (as in Duty bound) ever continue to be
