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Westminster, July 1, 1816.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for further securing the duties on paper and pasteboard, and for repealing the countervailing duty upon pasteboard imported from Ireland, and the drawback upon pasteboard exported; and granting other countervailing duties and drawbacks in lieu thereof.

An Act for making provision to defray the annual charge of any loan of this session of Parliament.

An Act to unite and consolidate into one fund all the public revenues of Great Britain and Ireland; and to provide for the application thereof to the general service of the United Kingdom.

An Act to amend and continue, until the end of the next session of Parliament, an Act of the fifty-fourth year of His present Majesty, for regulating the trade in spirits between Great Britain and Ireland reciprocally; and to grant and allow new countervailing duties and drawbacks on spirits imported and exported between England and Scotland and Ireland respectively.

An Act to repeal the duties payable in Scotland upon wash and spirits, and distillers licences; to grant other duties in lieu thereof; and to establish further regulations for the distillation of spirits from corn for home consumption in Scotland, until the tenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighteen.

An Act to amend an Act of the last session of Parliament relating to stamp duties in Great Britain, so far as relates to inventories to be exhibited and recorded in any Commissary Court in Scotland.

An Act for ratifying the purchase of the Claremont estate, and for settling the same as a residence for Her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte Augusta and His Serene Highness Leopold George Frederick, Prince of Cobourg of Saalfeld.

An Act to repeal certain drawbacks and countervailing duties of Excise on beer and malt; to alter the drawbacks on plate glass, and to prevent frauds therein.

An Act to continue, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, an Act of the forty-sixth year of His present Majesty, for granting an additional bounty on the exportation of the silk manufactures of Great Britain.

An Act for repealing the duties payable for licences for retailing beer, ale, cyder, perry, or spirits in Great Britain, and for imposing other duties in lieu thereof.

An Act for more effectually securing the liberty of the subject.

An Act for the further regulation of the trades of tanners and curriers.

An Act to repeal part of the duty on spirits distilled in Ireland, to reduce the drawback on such spirits exported to foreign parts, and to make further regulations for the collection of the said duties, and the duties on licences for retailing spirituous and other liquors in Ireland.

An Act to make certain provisions for modifying the several Acts for imposing and levying of fines, in respect of unlawful distillation of spirits in Ireland.

An Act for allowing a drawback of the duty on coals consumed in lead mines in Cornwall.

An Act to regulate the conveyance of passengers from the United Kingdom to the United States of America in British vessels.

An Act for the making more effectual provision for the prevention of smuggling, and rewarding officers and persons making seizures and capturing smuggling vessels; for licensing luggers employed in the north sea fishery, and obliging exporters of

exerciseable goods on drawback to give notice of shipment.

An Act to vest the Elgin collection of ancient marbles and sculpture in the Trustees of the British Museum, for the use of the public.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the fifty-fifth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the abolition of gaol and other fees connected with the gaols in England."

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the thirty-ninth and fortieth year of the reign of His present Majesty, for the safe custody of insane persons charged with offences.

An Act for admitting oil and hlybber from the British colonies in North America, upon payment of the like duty as oil and hlybber from Newfoundland.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the present session of Parliament, for punishing mutiny and desertion, in relation to the transportation of offenders.

An Act for enabling the officers in His Majesty's navy, and their representatives, to draw for and receive their half-pay, and for transferring the duty of making certain payments from the clerks of the cheque at His Majesty's dock yards to the clerks of the Treasurer of the Navy at the same yards.

An Act to procure annual returns of persons committed, tried, and convicted for criminal offences and misdemeanours in Ireland.

An Act for defraying, until the twenty-fifth day of June one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, the charge of the pay and cloathing of the militia of Ireland, and for making allowances, in certain cases, to subaltern officers of the said militia during peace.

An Act to make provision for securing, for a time to be limited, the profits of the office of Clerk of the Pleas of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer in Ireland.

An Act to continue, until the fifth day of April one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, an Act of the fifty-fourth year of His present Majesty, for explaining and amending several Acts relating to spiritual persons holding of farms, and for enforcing the residence of such persons on their benefices, in England.

An Act to continue, until the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, two Acts of the fiftieth and forty-fifth years of His present Majesty, for allowing the bringing of coals, culmy and cinders to London and Westminster.

An Act for the more effectual punishment of persons riotously destroying or damaging buildings, engines, and machinery used in and about collieries, and other mines, waggon-ways, bridges, and other works used in conveying and shipping coals and other minerals; and for enabling the owners of such property to recover damages for the injury sustained.

An Act to amend an Act of the fifty-third year of His present Majesty, for the relief of Insolvent Debtors in Ireland.

An Act to amend the Act of the fifty-third year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the relief of Insolvent Debtors in England;" and to

give further powers to the Court appointed by the said Act.

An Act to reduce the duty on the exportation from Great Britain of small coals of a certain description.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments escheated and devolved to His Majesty by the dissolution of Hertford College, in the University of Oxford, and the site of the said college and buildings thereon, to the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the said University, in trust for the Principal and other Members of Magdalen Hall, for the purpose of their removing to such site; and to enable the said Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the said University, and the President and Scholars of Saint Mary Magdalen College, to do all necessary acts for such removal.

An Act for the more effectual security and improvement of the harbour of New Shoreham, in the county of Sussex.

An Act to amend two Acts, made in the fifty-third year of the reign of His present Majesty, for opening a more convenient communication from Mary-le-Bone-Park to Charing-Cross, and for paving the streets to be made in Mary-le-Bone-Park; and to enable His Majesty to grant small portions of land as sites for public buildings, or to be used as cemeteries, within the bills of mortality.

An Act to repeal certain provisions in Local Acts for the maintenance and management of the poor.

An Act for enlarging the time for making the award respecting His Majesty's allotments under an Act of the fifty-third year of His present Majesty, for inclosing Windsor Forest; and for extending the provisions of the said Act.

An Act to repeal an Act, made in the thirty-ninth and fortieth years of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to extend the provisions of an Act, made in the seventeenth year of the reign of King George the Second, intituled "An Act to amend and make more effectual the laws relating to rogues, vagabonds, and other idle and disorderly persons, and to houses of correction;" and to make other provisions in lieu thereof.

An Act for authorising the Barons of the Court of Exchequer in Scotland to order the payment of a certain sum of money, to be applied in completing the Crinan Canal.

An Act to revive and continue, until the fifteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, an Act of the fifty-second year of His present Majesty, for the more effectual preservation of the peace, by enforcing the duties of watching and warding.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the fifty-fourth year of His present Majesty, for paving, lighting, watching, and otherwise improving the several streets and other public places upon certain lands near Battle-Bridge, in the parish of Saint Pancras, in the county of Middlesex.

An Act for improving the road from the city of Glasgow to the city of Carlisle.

And one private Act.

St. James's, July 2, 1816.

THIS day His Royal Highness the Prince Regent proceeded in state from St. James's Palace to the House of Lords, where he arrived at two o'clock; and, having alighted from the state coach, he was received at the portico by the Great Officers and others, and proceeded to the robing room in the usual manner; His Royal Highness was there robed, his hat on his head, and the procession moved into the house in the following order:

His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT**.

His Royal Highness being seated on the throne, the Great Officers and others standing on the right and left, Sir Thomas Tyrwhitt, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message from His Royal Highness to the House of Commons, commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, was pleased to give the Royal assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain sum out of the Consolidated Fund of Great Britain, and for applying certain monies therein mentioned for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen; and for further appropriating the supplies granted in this session of Parliament.

An Act to extend the provisions of an Act, of the first year of the reign of King James the First, intituled "An Act for the better relief of the creditors against such as shall become bankrupts."

An Act to abolish the punishment of the pillory, except in certain cases.

An Act to regulate the binding of parish apprentices.

An Act for establishing the use of an hydrometer, called Sikes's hydrometer, in ascertaining the strength of spirits, instead of Clarke's hydrometer.

An Act for erecting buildings for the accommodation of the Court of Chancery.

An Act for enabling ecclesiastical corporate bodies, under certain circumstances, to alienate lands for enlarging cemeteries or church-yards.

An Act for altering and amending an Act, made in the fifty-second year of His present Majesty, for making a canal from the Grand Junction Canal, in the parish of Paddington, to the River Thames, in the parish of Limehouse.

An Act to alter and enlarge the powers of several Acts, passed in the Parliament of Ireland, for repairing and improving the roads leading from the city of Dublin to Ratoath and Curragh.

An Act to alter and enlarge the powers of two Acts of His present Majesty, for granting certain powers to the Gas Light and Coke Company.

And five private Acts.

After which His Royal Highness delivered the following most gracious speech to both Houses of Parliament:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I CANNOT close this session of Parliament without again expressing My deep regret at the continuance of His Majesty's lamented indisposition.

The cordial interest which you have manifested in the happy event of the marriage of My daughter the Princess Charlotte with the Prince of Saxe Cobourg, and the liberal provision which you have made for their establishment, afford an additional proof of your affectionate attachment to His Majesty's person and family, and demand My warmest acknowledgments.

I have the pleasure to acquaint you, that I have given the royal consent to a marriage between His Majesty's daughter the Princess Mary and the Duke of Gloucester; and I am persuaded that this event will be highly gratifying to all His Majesty's subjects.

The assurances which I have received of the pacific and friendly disposition of the Powers engaged in the late war, and of their resolution to execute inviolably the terms of the treaties which I announced to you at the opening of the session, promise the continuance of that peace so essential to the interests of all the nations of the world.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the supplies which you have granted for the service of the year; and I am sensible of the beneficial effects which may be expected to result from the salutary system of making

provision for them in a way calculated to uphold public credit.

The arrangements which you have adopted for discharging the incumbrances of the Civil List, and for rendering its future income adequate to its expenditure, by relieving it from a part of the charge to which it was subject, are in the highest degree gratifying and satisfactory to Me; and you may be assured that nothing shall be wanting on My part to give full effect to those arrangements.

The provision you have made for consolidating the revenues of Great Britain and Ireland, will, I doubt not, be productive of the happiest consequences in cementing and advancing the interests of the United Kingdom; and must afford an additional proof of the constant disposition of Parliament to relieve the difficulties and promote the welfare of Ireland.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The measures to which I have been under the necessity of resorting, for the suppression of those tumults and disorders which had unfortunately occurred in some parts of the kingdom, have been productive of the most salutary effects.

I deeply lament the continuance of that pressure and distress which the circumstances of the country, at the close of so long a war, have unavoidably entailed on many classes of His Majesty's subjects.

I feel fully persuaded, however, that after the many severe trials which they have undergone in the course of the arduous contest in which We have been engaged, and the ultimate success which has attended their glorious and persevering exertions, I may rely with perfect confidence on their public spirit and fortitude in sustaining those difficulties, which will, I trust, be found to have arisen from causes of a temporary nature, and which cannot fail to be materially relieved by the progressive improvement of public credit, and by the reduction which has already taken place in the burthens of the people.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by the Prince Regent's command, said;

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

It is the will and pleasure of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, acting in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, that this Parliament be prorogued to Saturday the 24th day of August next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is

accordingly prorogued to Saturday the 24th day of August next.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present session of Parliament, cap. 64, intituled "An Act to repeal several Acts relating to the militia of Great Britain, and to amend other Acts relating thereto," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of Great Britain in the present year, for the purpose of being trained and exercised, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia shall take place in the present year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts relating to the militia, to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas it is deemed expedient that such training and exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of Great Britain in the present year, for the purpose of being trained and exercised, be suspended, and that no training or exercising of the militia do take place in the present year.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present session of Parliament, cap. 38, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place; but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such Order of Council, and from time to time by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension so long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas it is deemed expedient that such ballot and enrolment should be suspended for the space of one year; it is ordered by His Royal Highness

the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place from and after the date of this Order for the space of one year, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia do remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from the date of this Order.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing date the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and one, did, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, amongst other things, appoint and declare that, with the arms or ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, there should be borne, on an escocheon of pretence, the arms of His Majesty's dominions in Germany, ensigned with the electoral bonnet; and that the standard of the said United Kingdom should be the same quarterings as were therein declared to be the arms or ensigns armorial of the said United Kingdom, with the escocheon of pretence thereon, therein before described; and that the arms or ensigns armorial aforesaid should be used thenceforth, as far as conveniently might be, on all occasions wherein His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial ought to be used: and whereas His Majesty having substituted to His antient title of Elector of the Holy Roman Empire, the title of King of Hanover, it is fit that an alteration should be made in His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, We have therefore thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to appoint and declare that, instead of the arms of His Majesty's dominions in Germany, ensigned with the electoral bonnet, as directed by His Majesty's Proclamation above mentioned, there shall henceforth be used and borne with the arms or ensigns armorial of His Majesty's said United Kingdom, on an escocheon of pretence, the arms of His Majesty's dominions in Germany, ensigned with the Hanoverian royal crown; and that the standard of the said United Kingdom shall be the same quarterings as by His Majesty's said Proclamation were declared to be the arms or ensigns armorial of the said United Kingdom, with the escocheon of pretence, ensigned with the said Hanoverian royal crown, instead of the electoral bonnet: but, nevertheless, it is Our will and pleasure, that all such gold, silver, and copper monies, as on the day before this eighth day of this instant June were current and lawful monies of Great Britain, and all such gold, silver, and copper monies, as shall on or after this day be coined by Our authority with the like impressions, until Our will and pleasure shall be otherwise declared, shall be deemed

and taken to be current and lawful monies of the said United Kingdom in Great Britain; and that all such gold, silver, and copper monies, as on the day before this eighth day of this instant June were current and lawful monies of Ireland, and all such gold and silver, and copper monies, as shall on or after this day be coined by Our authority with the like impressions, until Our will and pleasure shall be otherwise declared, shall be deemed and taken to be current and lawful monies of the said United Kingdom in Ireland; and all such monies as shall have been coined for and issued in any of the dominions of the said United Kingdom, and declared by Our Proclamation to be current and lawful money of such dominions respectively, bearing His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, or any part or parts thereof; and all monies which shall hereafter be coined and issued according to such Proclamation, shall continue to be lawful and current money of such dominions respectively, notwithstanding such change in His Majesty's arms or armorial bearings respectively as aforesaid, until Our pleasure shall be further declared thereupon; and all and every such monies as aforesaid shall be received and taken in payment in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, and in the dominions thereunto belonging, after the date of this Proclamation, in such manner and as of the like value and denomination as the same were received and taken before the date hereof: and it is also Our will and pleasure that the several dies and marks which have been used to denote the stamp duties, and all other stamps and marks and instruments, which before the issuing of this Proclamation shall have been in actual use for any public purpose, and in which His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, or any parts or part thereof respectively may be expressed, shall not, by reason of this Proclamation or any thing therein contained, be changed or altered, until the same may be conveniently so changed or altered, or until Our pleasure shall be further declared thereon; but that all such dies, stamps, marks, and instruments respectively, bearing His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, used before this eighth day of June instant, or any parts or part of such arms or ensigns armorial, shall have the like force and effect, as the same had before the said eighth day of June instant.
