**O**RDERS for the Court's going into mourning, on Thursday next the 25th instant, for the late Queen of Portugal, viz.

The Ladies to wear black silk, fringed or plain linen, white gloves, necklaces and ear-rings, black or white shoes, fans and tippets.

Undress—White or grey lustrings, tabbies or damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear black, full trimmed, fringed or plain linen, black swords and buckles.

Undress—Grey frocks.

The Court to change the mourning on Thursday the 1st of August next, viz.

The Ladies to wear black silk or velvet, coloured ribbons, fans and tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuffs, with black ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuff waiscoats, full trimmed, coloured swords and buckles.

And on Sunday the 4th of August next, the Court to go out of mourning.

**A**T the Court at Carlton-House, the 1st of July 1816,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the present session of Parliament, cap. 64, intituled "An Act to repeal several Acts relating to the militia of Great Britain, and to amend other Acts relating thereto," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of Great Britain in the present year, for the purpose of being trained and exercised, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia shall take

place in the present year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts relating to the militia, to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas it is deemed expedient that such training and exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of Great Britain in the present year, for the purpose of being trained and exercised, be suspended, and that no training or exercising of the militia do take place in the present year.
