To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

The loyal Address of the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, other Heretors, and Justices of the Peace of the County of Inverness, in a General Meeting at Inverness, the 5th day of July 1816 years.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, other Heretors, and Justices of the Peace of the County of Inverness, most humbly approach your Royal Highness with the offer of our most sincere congratulations on the late event, so interesting to every Briton, the marriage of the Princess Charlotte of Wales with the Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg.

In uniting Her Royal Highness with a Protestant Prince of so distinguished character and conduct, your Royal Highness has consulted both the happiness of your illustrious daughter and the best interest of His Majesty's subjects.

That your Royal Highness may be long preserved to reign over a grateful people whom the wisdom of your counsels, and the success of His Majesty's arms, have raised to the highest rank among nations, and may transmit a powerful and peaceful sceptre to a long line of Protestant successors, is our most sincere prayer.
