Unto Her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte Augusta of Wales, and His Serene Highness Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg.

WE, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Perth, in a general meeting assembled, humbly beg leave to approach your Royal and Serene Highnesses with our most sincere and cordial congratulations, upon the auspicious alliance which has lately taken place, so peculiarly gratifying to His Majesty's faithful subjects; and which promises so much benefit to the nation and so much domestic felicity to your Royal and Serene Highnesses.

That your Royal and Serene Highnesses may long live with increasing mutual affections, and enjoy the attachment of a loyal and grateful people, is our most earnest prayer.

Carlton-House, August 13, 1816.

This day, Baron de Jacobi Kloest, Envoy Extraordinary, and Minister Plenipotentiary from His Majesty the King of Prussia, had audience of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, to deliver his letter of recall, to which he was introduced by Lord Viscount Castlereagh, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Robert Chester, Esq. Assistant-Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, August 14, 1816.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland unto Algernon Percy, Esq. (commonly called Lord Al-

gernon Percy) and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Prudhoe, of Prudhoe Castle, in the County of Northumberland.

Carlton-House, August 13, 1816.

This day His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to confer the honour of Knighthood upon William Cox, Esq. Lieutenant-Colonel in the Army, Major-General in the Portuguese Service, and Knight of the Royal Portuguese Military Order of the Tower and Sword.

Foreign-Office, August 17, 1816.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to appoint Gilbert Robertson, Esq. to be His Majesty's Consul at Philadelphia.

St. James's-Palace, August 13, 1816.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland has been pleased to appoint John Augustus Knipe, Esq. (Staff-Surgeon to the Forces) to be Surgeon to His Royal Highness's Household.
