

forty-two days before the drawing such lottery; and that the first numbers which should be drawn in such state lottery, be they either blank or prize, the numbers whereof should respectively correspond with any numbers of the tickets of the lottery authorised by the said Act should respectively be, and they were thereby declared to be, the prizes, in the order in which the prizes were arranged and allotted in the said schedule to the said Act annexed marked C;

And whereas by an Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for granting to His Majesty a sum of money to be raised by lotteries," the said Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or any three or more of them, were authorised to sell and dispose of any number of tickets, not exceeding sixty thousand, in one or more lotteries;

And whereas your Lordships, as Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, have sold and disposed of a certain number of tickets, in pursuance of the powers given in the said last mentioned Act, and a lottery of six thousand tickets is appointed to be drawn on the 31st day of October 1816;

Your memorialists, the assignees of the said bankrupt's estate above mentioned, in conformity to the provisions of the said in part recited Act, do hereby signify to your Lordships, that they have made choice of the said lottery of six thousand tickets, to be drawn on the 31st day of October next, for the drawing and determining of the prizes mentioned and described in the schedule marked C of the said Act herein first mentioned and in part recited;

Your memorialists, therefore, most humbly pray your Lordships, in pursuance of the powers vested in your Lordships, to approve of the prizes in the said schedule marked C of the said Act mentioned, being drawn and determined by the state lottery of six thousand tickets to be drawn on the 31st day of October 1816.
