*Carlton-House, October 2; 1816.*

**T**HIS day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, Sheriffs, Common Council, and Officers of the Corporation of the City of London, waited upon the Prince Regent with the following Address, which was read by Sir John Silvester, Bart. the Recorder:

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble, dutiful, and loyal Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, most humbly approach your Royal Highness for the purpose of tendering our heartfelt congratulations on occasion of the recent victory obtained by the fleet under the command of Admiral Lord Viscount Exmouth before Algiers, and upon the consequent conclusion of a treaty dictated by your Royal Highness, and manifesting a disinterested generosity peculiarly worthy of a British Prince.

Accustomed to contemplate and admire the vigour of British councils, and the victorious efforts of British heroism, in aid of the cause of justice and humanity; and of late years called to these reflections by the splendour of military triumph, we hail with the highest satisfaction the late convincing proof that the spirit which animated a Howe, a St. Vincent, a Duncan, and a Nelson, has descended to their successors; and that to her Navy—the peculiar defence of Britain—she may, under Providence, confide the protection of her rights, and the avengement of her wrongs.

In congratulating your Royal Highness on this great and glorious event, we, with the noble Commander of the expedition, desire to give the glory where it is pre-eminently due; and while we participate in the general joy occasioned by the

“ bringing to reason a ferocious Government, and destroying for ever the horrid system of Christian slavery,” to honour him and his companions in arms, as instruments in effecting the gracious purposes of that Almighty Power who hath taught their “ hands to war,” and their “ fingers to fight.”

We highly appreciate the justice of your Royal Highness in the promptitude with which you have conferred honourable distinctions on the noble Commander, and several of the Officers engaged in this most arduous service; in conduct so honourable to your Royal Highness, and in further rewarding such distinguished merit, your Royal Highness and the Legislature will, we are persuaded, be fulfilling the wishes of a loyal and a grateful people.

That under your Royal Highness and your descendants the blessings of our happy Constitution may, to the latest posterity, be continued to this kingdom, is the earnest prayer of His Majesty's faithful citizens of London.

“ I return you my warmest thanks for your congratulations on the signal and decisive success which has attended the operations of the fleet under the command of Admiral Lord Viscount Exmouth before Algiers.

“ In no instance have the judgment and heroism of a British Commander, and the undaunted spirit and determination of British Officers, seamen, and marines, been more eminently displayed.

“ The victory with which it pleased Almighty God to bless their exertions, and the conditions of the treaty of peace to which it instantly led, could not fail to be peculiarly grateful to the feelings of a brave, humane, and free people.

“ I have experienced the highest satisfaction in manifesting the just and deep sense which I entertain of the services rendered, not to this country

only, but to all the Christian nations of the world, on this ever-memorable occasion."

They were all very graciously received, and had the honour of kissing His Royal Highness's hand.

**T**HE following Address has been presented to His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester.

SIR,

WE, His Majesty's faithful subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the Borough of King's Lynn, in the County of Norfolk, in Council assembled, humbly beg leave to express the lively sense we entertain of the honour some years since conferred upon our ancient town, by the gracious permission of your Royal Highness to be recorded in the number of the Free Burghesses of Lynn. We cannot but be proud of the honour we received, and forward on all occasions to profess our attachment and gratitude. At this time we are peculiarly anxious to tender our congratulations on the recent auspicious nuptials of your Royal Highness with a Princess, the daughter of our revered Sovereign, and not more distinguished by her august rank than by the eminent graces and virtues of her royal character, so universally confessed and celebrated. That private and public happiness through life may attend upon your Royal Highness is our sincere and fervent wish, and as such, we trust, it is not unworthy of your acceptance.

Given under our common seal, at our Guildhall, the 29th day of August, in the year of our Lord 1816.

**A**T the Court at Carlton House, the 3d of August 1816,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

**W**HEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the twelfth day of February last, for prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom, or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, will expire on the thirteenth day of this instant August;

and whereas it is judged expedient, that the said prohibition, so far as applies to the countries hereinafter named, should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth, therefore, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the said thirteenth day of this instant August), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, for ports or places, in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall be construed to alter or repeal the Order in Council of the twentieth of May one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, for regulating the export of gunpowder and arms to the coast of Africa, under the conditions therein specified. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

the Prince Regent to deliver his letter of recall and Count Palmella, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the same Court, had audience of His Royal Highness to deliver his credentials, to which they were introduced by Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Robert Chester, Esq. Assistant-Master of the Ceremonies.

*Carlton-House, October 2, 1816.*

This day His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to invest Rear-Admiral Sir David Milne with the ensigns of a Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

By command of the Prince Regent, Rear-Admiral Sir David Milne was conducted, with the usual reverences, to His Royal Highness, preceded by Sir George Naylor, (the Officer of Arms, attendant upon the Knight Commander), bearing upon a crimson velvet cushion, the star, ribband, and badge of the second class of the Order.

The sword of state was thereupon delivered to the Prince Regent, and Sir David Milne, kneeling, was knighted therewith, after which he had the honour to kiss His Royal Highness's hand.

Then His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, having received from the Officer of Arms the ribband and badge of a Knight Commander, was pleased to invest Sir David Milne with the same: the Rear-Admiral, having again had the honour to kiss the Prince Regent's hand, and having received from His Royal Highness the star of a Knight Commander, retired.

*Whitehall, October 4, 1816.*

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to nominate and appoint the Baron Van de Capellen, Vice-Admiral of the Fleet of His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, to be an Honorary Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

*Carlton-House, September 23, 1816.*

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, was this day pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to confer the honour of Knighthood upon James Brisbane, Esq. Post Captain in the Royal Navy, Captain of His Majesty's ship Queen Charlotte, and a Companion of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

*War-Office, September 28, 1816.*

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to approve of permission being granted to the 6th Foot to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or

devices which may have been heretofore granted to the Regiment, the word "*Niagara*," in consideration of the distinguished services of that Regiment on the Niagara frontier during the year 1814.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of permission being granted to the 7th Foot, or Royal Fusiliers, to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the Regiment, the words "*Martinique*" and "*Albuera*," in consideration of the distinguished services of that Corps in the attack and reduction of Martinique in the month of February 1809, and in the battle of Albuera on the 16th May 1811.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of the 8th, or King's, Regiment of Foot being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the Regiment, the word "*Martinique*," in consideration of the distinguished services of that Corps in the attack and reduction of Martinique, in the month of February 1809.

*War-Office, September 30, 1816.*

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to command that the 9th, 12th, 16th, and 23d Regiments of Light Dragoons shall be armed and be equipped as Lancers.

*Commission in the East Norfolk Regiment of Militia, signed by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty.*

Serjeant-Major James Guthrie, of the Grenadier Regiment of Foot Guards, to be Adjutant, vice Junck, deceased. Dated July 26, 1816.

**I**N pursuance of the Act of the 55th year of His present Majesty, by which it is enacted that the out-pensioners of this Hospital shall in future be paid quarterly, in advance, instead of half-yearly, notice is hereby given, by order of the Right Honourable the Lords and others, Commissioners for Managing the Affairs of the said Hospital, that all the out-pensioners thereof, residing in London, or within the district of the bills of mortality, are required to appear personally and regimentally, with their instructions and certificates of admission, at the Secretary's Office in the said Hospital on the respective days, and in their different classes, according to their several rates of pension, as undermentioned, when attendance will be given from nine o'clock in the morning until three in the afternoon, for the payment of a quarter of a year's pension in advance, to the 24th of December next.

On Tuesday the 8th of October,

The pensioners at 5d. 6d. and 8d. per day, from the different regiments of cavalry, foot guards, and infantry, including those from the militia.

On Wednesday the 9th of October,

Those at 9d. per day, from the different regiments and corps, to the 30th of foot inclusive.

On Thursday the 10th of October,

Those at 9d. per day, from the 31st regiment of foot, and all the remaining regiments and corps, as also the militia at 10d. per day.

On Friday the 11th of October,

Those at 1s. per day, from the different regiments of cavalry, with the 1st and 2d regiments of foot guards.

On Saturday the 12th of October,

Those at 1s. per day, from the 3d regiment of foot guards, to the end of the numbered regiments at that rate.

On Monday the 14th of October,

Those at 1s. per day, from the Royal garrison-battalion, veteran battalions, and all the remaining regiments and corps, as all the pensioners at 1s. 0d. per day.

On Tuesday the 15th of October,

Those at 1s. 1d. 1s. 1½d. 1s. 2d. 1s. 2½d. and 1s. 3d. per day.

On Wednesday the 16th of October,

Those at 1s. 3d. 1s. 4d. 1s. 4½d. 1s. 5d. 1s. 5½d. 1s. 6d. and 1s. 6½d. per day.

On Thursday the 17th of October,

Those at 1s. 7d. per day and upwards.

On Friday the 18th of October,

Those pensioners from the several regiments and corps who have been admitted on account of blindness.

It is also ordered and directed, that all out-pensioners belonging to the said Hospital, do pay particular attention to their instructions, which they are required to produce at the time of payment, by which they are ordered to transmit to the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Land Forces in London, their affidavits as therein prescribed, on, or immediately after every quarter-day, without which their names will not be entered on the pay-lists for the subsequent quarter, and they are not afterwards to change their place of abode, as specified in their affidavits, without unavoidable necessity, and duly notifying the same.

And that if any pensioner shall fraudulently attempt to receive a double payment of his pension, either at Chelsea, or at different places, he shall be struck off the list, and forfeit all benefit arising from this Establishment.
