HEREAS the time limited by the Order tof His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the twelfth day of February has for prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom, or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sout of arms or ammunition, will expire on the thirteenth day of this instant August; and Brassil, had audience of His Royal Highnist

and whereas it is judged expedient, that the said prohibition, so far as applies to the countries hereinafter named, should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth, therefore, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no personer persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) to, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the said thirteenth day of this instant August), presume to transport any gappowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port on place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, for ports or places, in His Majesty's territories of possessions on the Continent of North America Cor' in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or saft-pette; or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to tradsporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, unon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Milesty's reign, intituled "An Act to employed His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-lette, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying "coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort
