Edenburg, May 4.

AN Officer who is raising Men here, to recruit the Scotch Regiment in *Holland*, having Listed a Soldier, and given him Moneys to buy himself necessaries, sent him with a Guard to the rest of his Soldiers at *Leith*; but the Fellow as he went along, cried out, That they were forcing him away: Upon which, some of the ordinary sort got together, and rescued him. But the Magistrates having notice thereof, caused eight of the principal that made the Rescue, to be secured, and proceeded against for a Riot; of which they were found Guilty, and Fined, and put in Prison till they should pay their Fine. This coming to the Ears of the Apprentices, (he that had Listed himself, being likewise an Apprentice) a great number of them got together on Tuesday, about Eleven at Night, forced the City-Guards, seized their Arms, possest themselves of the Ports of the City, and demanded the Prisoners, which the Magistrates thought fit at that time to release; but the next Morning they caused 15 of the chief Promoters of this Disturbance, to be apprehended, and put into the Toll-booth; and the Council being met, issued a Proclamation, to prevent any new Disorder, and commanded the Prisoners to be delivered to three Companies of the Earl of *Murrs* Regiment, and to be carried to the *Cannongate* Toll-booth.

At three a Clock the Prisoners were accordingly delivered to the said Companies, who coming down the Street with them, were set upon by the Rabble, that would have rescued them, and for that purpose assaulted the Soldiers with Stones, Glass-Bottles, and such like stuff, and had closed the Gate through which they were to pass: The Soldiers at first Fired only with Powder, to fright them; but seeing that did no good, and that the Rabble prest the harder upon them, they were at last forced to Fire in earnest, and killed seven persons, and wounded several others, four of those that were killed being Women, for the greatest part of the Rabble were of that Sex, who thereupon dispersed and run away, and the Soldiers carried away their Prisoners, who will be Punished according to their Demerit. Four Companies of the Trained Bands were in Arms, but there was no need of their Assistance, and all is now perfectly quiet again, as if there had not been the least disorder.

Dublin, May 2. Information having been given to our Lord Deputy, the Earl of *Arran*, that the Apprentices of this City intended to rise in great numbers, on *May-day*, to destroy the French Protestants that had taken shelter here, his Lordship sent to acquaint the Lord Mayor therewith; upon which, he Issued his Orders to the Constables of every Ward to be very careful upon their Watches, as also to the Tradesmen, to keep their Apprentices at home; and at the same time the Lord Deputy being also by a Commission of an antienter Date

Governor of this City) gave such Orders as he thought fit on the Military part: But notwithstanding all the Caution used, about three hundred Apprentices of the out-Liberties got together in a Body, yesterday Morning, about a quarter of a Mile from the Town; My Lord Mayor went out to them with his Constables and Civil Authority, assisted with a Squadron of the Kings Guards; but his Lordship not prevailing with them to separate, the Horse fell upon them, and forced them to disperse, and without killing any, took 10 or 12, who are now in my Lord Mayors hands, to be Proceeded against according to Law.

Hague, May 15. Yesterday the Prince of *Orange*, and the Marquis *de Grana*, had an Interview at a small place between *Antwerp* and *Breda*, his Excellency parting from *Antwerp* yesterday Morning early, as our Letters from thence tell us, for that purpose. The Elector of *Trier* has absolutely rejected the Proposals made to him by the French Envoy, the Sieur *Tambonneau*; and at the same time calls upon this State to satisfie him for the Arrears of Subsidies which remain due to him, that he may be able to provide the City of *Coblentz*, and the Fortres of *Erenbretstein*, with all things necessary for their Defence; and the States General have accordingly very earnestly recommended it to the Provinces, who have not yet paid the said Arrears, to do it forthwith.

Paris, May 16. We are expecting, with much earnestness, what the late Meetings of the Clergy will produce: It is certain, they have several matters of the greatest Importance before them, that seem to tend to the making the *Gablican Church* distinct and independent of that of *Rome*, which the Pope appears very sensible of, and is much troubled at. Moneys have been distributed to the Officers that are employed in the new Levies of Horse, in which a great distinction is made between the Old and New Officers, the first having considerably more allowed them than the other. From *Marseilles* we have an account, that the Chevalier *de Lery*, sailed from *Thoulon* the 4th Instant, with three of the Kings Ships for *Argiers*; and at *Brest*, five other Frigats are fitting out, which will part from thence very speedily, and are to joyn the said Chevalier *de Lery*.

manner of this late Rebellious Contrivance, wherein we find particularly this Traiterous Passage following, to the horror and amazement of all good Christians, and Subjects, viz.

We will follow such Orders as we shall from time to time receive from this present Parliament, whilst it shall be sitting, or the Major part of the Members of both Houses subscribing this Association, when it shall be Prorogued or Dissolved, and obey such Officers as shall be by them set over us in the several Countreys, Cities, and Burroughs, until the next meeting of this or another Parliament, and will then shew the same Obedience and Submission unto it, and those who shall be of it.

May God Almighty preserve his sacred Majesty in his Person and Authority from the Malice of this Hellish Conspiracy, and of all the Abettors thereof, and Grant him a long and prosperous Reign over a loyal and Dutiful People.

Blindwich, May 7. Yesterday His Majesties Ship the *Dove*, arrived here from *Ireland*, and this Day sailed again for the *Dome*.

Portsmouth, May 9. Yesterday in the Evening sailed from *Spithead* His Majesties Ship the *Dragon*, Captain *Hamilton* Commanding for *Blindwich*.

Windsor, May 7. This day the Count de *Reviers*, Ambassador Extraordinary from his Royal Highness the Duke of *Savoy*, had his Audiences of Leave of their Majesties, in order to his return home.

London, May 30. This day the Ambassador from the King of *Bantam*, in the *East-Indies*, made his publick Entry, having been received and Committed at *Greenwich* by the Right Honourable the Lord *Mordaunt*, and Sir *Charles Carteret*, Master of the Ceremonies, and brought thence by Water in his Majesties Barge to *Tower Wherry*, where, at his Landing, he was saluted with the Great Guns, and from thence was conducted in his Majesties Coach, followed with a numerous Train of Coaches with six Horses a-piece, (some of which were by Apprentices, being in all about 33 Persons) to the House prepared for him, at *Charing-Cross*.

where he was again Complimented in their Majesties Name, and is attended by His Majesties Servants.

Hull, May 8. By a Vessel which came in here Yesterday, we received the ill news of the loss of His Majesties Ship the *Glocester*, which came on Ground on the *Lemon and Ore Sand*, on Friday last, at 10 a Clock at Night, and sunk down about 6 the next Morning. God be thanked, his Royal Highness is well, (as we hope all his Retinue are) he went on board His Majesties Yatch, and continued His Voyage, attended by the other Frigats. This Vessel parted from them yesterday Morning, and they had then so fair a Wind, that it is believed his Royal Highness was last Night in *Scotland*. We have of late had very Stormy and Rainy Weather, by which the Country suffers very much.

Windjor, May 9. By an Express arrived just now from *Hull* we have an account, that on Friday last about 19 a Clock at Night the *Glocester* Frigate, in which was his Royal Highness, ran upon the Sand called the *Lemon and Ore*, about 16 Leagues from the Mouth of *Humber*, where she was lost, but continued above Water till six the next Morning. His Royal Highness, God be Praised, is well, and went on Board one of His Majesties Yachts that attended him; and about 10 a Clock on Saturday Morning continued his Voyage for *Scotland*. It is hoped most of the Passengers that were on Board the said Frigate are safe, though some are said to be Drowned, but are not named.

Whitehal, May 10. This Evening his Grace the Duke of *Ormond*, Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*, came to Town, accompanied with a great many Persons of Quality.
