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Venice, July 1. Our bre Letters received from the Armata, both by the way of Rome, and by a Tartan fent exprelly from Candia, of the 2. of Func, inform ut, that the Tarks have lately laid a close fiege to the City of Candia, battering it at the same time in four places, but that the Vifier had firk commanded the Town of Candia Nuova, (formerly built by the Turks themselves) to be demolisht; which they is effectually obeyed. that they lest nothing standing of the whole Town, but only one M fque , two things more especially mooving the Visier to this resolution, fift, that the Materials of that place might be of ule to them in rayling their works, and building them convenient Hutts before the Town, which he is resolved to take in, or else to hazard all his A my in the attempt: and fecond'y, that he might take from his foldiers all hopes of a retreat, which they usually made to that place, and upon that account they mighe be more desperately engaged in the fiege, which was the Substance of his Speech to them at their fitting down before it, where thewing them the City of Candia, he farther told them that he had now destroyed the new Town; and therefore desired them as valiant men to go and take their quarters in the old. The Pofts againft which he makes his Batterles are, Bethlem, Sabionera, Jesus, and Sr. Demetrius; the number of the Men employed in it above 40000, besides 12000 Pioneers, whereof a great number of them flaves taken out of the Gallies; Our Soldiers in Gandia are full of courage and refolution, all parts of the Town bring excellently fortified, and well flored, the Town full of old Soldiers and Excellent Officers, who let flip no opportunities of avoiding the Enemy, and providing for their defence ; nor are they a little encouraged by the late arrival of the Convoys under the command of the Commiffary of Provisions Giuffiniano, who has put into the Town, befi les other neceffaries, the fum of 70000 Ducatts to be employed in the service of that place, having with him 75000 Ducats more, which were fent to the Captain Gineral to be employed for the ule of the Armata.

The Plague continues still very het in Canca : fome Veffel's arriving for . Zante and Corfu have much leffened our feares for the Convoy of Peraches, that was to pals that way, they not having heard any thing of late, of any Corfayres upon thole Seas. Some of our Auxiliary Galeys have patied by Zante for the affiftance of our Fleet , but thofe of Niples and Sicily are recalled, by reafon of the late ruprure with the

French.

Our new Leevies go on vigoroully of 600 Foor, under the command of Collonel Turieti; 400 are already embarqued , with two Compenies, under the Command of Collonel de Nobie. The Dake of Savoy, who arrived in thefe parts, to give a vifit to the Duke of Baviere, is now here in cognito, spending some time in vificing the Curiofities of this

The Turks of Dulcigno with their Flutes infest thefe Coafts 3 they lately put tome men afh, ar upon he Rivers of Stegnari and Veruda in Ifiria, where they took fome booty and returned with some flaves, but our Armed Barks are now let out in pursuit of them.

The Turks in Albania are got into a Body, and fill give out that their defign is to attempt Cattaro, or Ragult , they are now encamped near Caffelnuovo, where they odge under their Tents which they have there fer up in great numbers, but Victualls are very fcarce amongit them.

Cattaro is new rebuil, and reftored to its former beauty and strength; at Ragusa all hands are at work, which some few

weeks will probably finish.

Madrid, July 1. The order for fending out to Seanine Men of War of the Armada is recalled, and orders given out for the fitting up and haftning out the rest of them, that they may all put to Sea together. T'e Quickfilver Fleet is near ready, and may put to Sea for New Spain in twenty

Our Forces have larely made an Incurfion into Portugal by the way of Serpa and Mora cretying off with them about 15000 head of Cattel. The Ho e.a e again marched into the Country, with an intention (if poffibe) to divere them from their defign upon Gallieis. Order is taken for a Donative to be demanded throughout the Kingdom for the defence of Flanders against the French Invasion, which 'tis supposed will rile to a vast sum.

From Malaga they tell us, that by the strival there of a Saylia from Tangier, they are advised that Gayland was closely befreged in Argilla by Taffaletta, which it was thought could not long hold out by reason of their want of Corn.

Don Juan of Auftria, continues his refidence with his Family at Buon Retiro, and is frequently at the Council. Vifits bave mutually paffed between him and his Excellency the Earl of Sandwich, to the latisfaction of both.
Genout, July 5. The 29 past arrived this States Con-

voy in fourty dayes from Smyrna, off of Morea they met the Venetian Fleet, between whole General, and the Ambaffador of this State paffed many Saluter, with extraor inary civility. Our Ships return not fo richly fraught as expected, the voyage having falles fornewhat fho tof our expect in : Yet more Ships will be fuddenly laid in here for Smyrna, and a Conful is to be fent to recide at Alexandria for the encouragement of this Trade.

Signior Gio Agoftino Durazza returned from his Embeffy in the Ottom in Court, feemes infinitely fatisfi d with his entertainment there, and with the honour and rich prefents corferred on him by the G and S ignior : He is chlige', as coming from infected parts, to make his Quarantine, and the Ships are laid up and well guarded in the new Mole, till the

time of it be over.

Paris, July 16. Our late Letters from Rochell inform ut, that the Sieu Coibert de Teron is returned thitter with his two Men of War , and the 700 men he had aboard him, being prevented in his defign for the furprizal of Fontarabie, which he had long defigned by the means of a contrivance carried on with the Abbot of S . Martin.

The King has given order for the dispatch of Commissions for the raifing of 100 Troops of Horfe, and 200 Companies of Foot , Monfieu. Colbert being bufie here in taking order

for the moneys requifite for that purpofe.

The Marefchat d' Aumont, with the addition of 6 200 men drawn out of the Army, bath invefted Courtray, and the tenth and eleventh instant opened his trenches with very little lofs, and hath great hopes of the speedy taking in of that place, the Kings Army in the mean time is quartered at Arleux : the King himself is at Complegne, where he has given Audi-

ence to the Venetian Ambassador, intending on Monday next

Bafle, fune 22. The City of Geneus continues fill its preparations for the War, with greater vigour and courage then ever, being affared of the affiftance of some or most of the Cantons: There has this last week fallen great quantity of Snow about Zurich ; and at Schaffhausen there happened fo grest an Earthquake, that the walls of that place are thrown down, befiges a fire accidentally taking hold of their houses, has ruin'd a confiderable part of the Town.

Vienna, June 28. The 24 instant arrived here a Cour-rier from Madrid, with Letters from the Quen-Regent to the Emperour, giving him an account of west the bad already done in order to an amicable comp fure of the differences with France, by a reference of those pretentions to fome unbyzifed Princes : but this Proposition we hear finds at prefent bat little asceptance , the French making every day far-

ther progrets with their Armies.

Charles Count Wal'enfieln having bren fent into Poland to condole tiere for the death of the late Queen, with order to have attended that King through Silefia and Bohemia to Charles-Batt, in which jouiney he was to have defraged all the expences thereof upon the Emperous secount, is by an Expreis yestersay disparched from bence, remanded, upon information (as 'cis fald) that the King had altered his refo-

lurion as to that Intended voyage.

The Vilier of Buda has dispatched another Chiaus to this Court, who has brought with him some Hussars prisoners, complaining of the infolency of those Horsemen , who are continuly robbing upon the frontiers , and that these prifore s had been taken in the fact cut of a party, that by an incu fin into the Turkish Quarters had taken away with them above 200 head of Cittle , and neer as many Horfes, defiring that exemplary Justice might be done on them; and accordingly order is given for the speedy framing of their Process, that execution mey be done on them in presence of the Chiaus, who for the future prevention of the like thefts, has proposed to the Emperout, that he would please to pronibit all Butchers from buying of any Gattle of any of the Huffers, but to trade only with the Countrymen, which will be a means to make the Markets eafter, and prevent diforders.

The Lutherans in Upper Hungary , with the reft of the Reformed Religion , have lately refolved upon the building a Colledge ar Epperies for the education of their Children, out of good Husband y, to fave the great expences they are unally at in fending them should into forreign parts for education; and accordingly they have invited feveral P ofeffors of all Faculties to that place, which design of theirs is ill resented by his Imperial Majesty, as being contrary to the resolution of their last Die ; Order is therefore issued out for furnmoning the Migift ates of Epperies to this Court.

Hague, July 15. On Tu flavlatt fix great Men of Wart Holland bound for the Fleet, to be added to de Ruyters

The 13 h in the Evening arrived here the Count d' Effrades, and Monfieur Beverning, with the two Planipotentinries of the Sates. The Envoye frem the French Am-bail.dor is gone by the way of Zealand and Dunkirke, to communica e the Articles agreed to by the Commissioners at Breds, to his M jefty of France.

Yefterday the States had a Conference with the Count de Conns, but the Iffue of that Negotiation is not yet known.

Bruges July 17. Since the taking of Douay we have had great apprehensions least this place might be next attempted by the French. Several hundreds of the affrighte ! Country People have thelired themselves here, with their wives, children and goods, the fircers being fill'd with their Waggons: We have even now received news, that the French lave the laft night tak n leven Billanders out of Neuport Harbour. Douay as well as Tournay is much blamed for too hafty a furrander, shough the small number of souldiers in Douay might feem in fome meafure to excule them ; the fouldiers that marched cut upon the furren ler being not above 250 men , and those but meanly provided for lervice. They have also a report that the Baron de Limbeck being tent cu. with a party of 500 horse to intercept a party of 100 French , he accordingly defeated them; but he was afterwards let upon by a greater party of neer 1000 horse, and routed with much los, himielf

with great iffa u'ty escaping.
