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Vienna, May 16.

IT is said, That about the beginning of the next Month 14000 Men of the Emperors Troops will march towards the Rhine, under the Command of Count Leslie, as being the Emperors Quota of the Army of the Empire. We do not yet hear of Count Caprara's arrival at Constantinople. From Hungary they write, That Count Tzekeley was gone to confer with the Bassa of Ofen.

Hamburg, May 19. This City are very jealous of the designs of the King of Denmark, (who according to our last Letters from Copenhagen, intended to part from thence in few days, towards these parts) and therefore have resolved to raise immediately 500 Dragoons, and 1000 Foot; but their chief Reliance, in case of need, is in the assistance of the Princes of Lunenburg.

Brussels, May 19. Yesterday his Excellency the Marquis de Grana returned hither from Antwerp, and presently after his Arrival was to visit the Princess of Orange, who is Lodged at the House of Don Antonio d'Agurto; Her Highness has been to see all the Cloysters, and yesterday in the Evening she was at the Opera, and afterwards was entertained at Supper, and with a Ball by the Countess de Soissons.

Brussels, May 22. The 20th Instant in the Evening, the Marquis de Grana entertained her Highness the Princess of Orange at Supper in the Wilderness in the Park, which for security against the Weather, was covered with a Canopy fixed to the tops of the Trees, and the whole was so ordered, that nothing was wanting that could add to the splendor or pleasantness of the Entertainment. After which, his Excellency Presented her Highness with a Cabinet of Massy Silver, curiously wrought and Beautified, and filled with many Rarities; as likewise with 6 Silver Fillagreen Stands, made in the Indies, with Coco-nut Cups set in Fillagreen; and 400 Weight of Spanish Chocolat. Don Fuen Mayor, the King of Spain's Minister in Holland, did likewise Present her Highness with a Service of double Gilt Dressing-Plate, curiously wrought at Noremberg. Yesterday her Highness was at Engbick, where she was very nobly Entertained by the Princess de Ligne; and this Afternoon her Highness parted hence for Antwerp, whither his Excellency the Marquis de Grana likewise goes.

Hague, May 22. The Prince of Orange has had an Interview with the Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, at Westwiesel, and from thence his Highness is gone to visit the Garisons of Breda, Maasbricht, Bergen op Zoom, &c. The States of Holland meet again on Tuesday next.

Paris, May 23. The fourth Instant the Committee appointed to examine the affair of Tholouze and Pamiers made their Report in the Assembly of the Clergy, which was, That it was to have been wished that the late Bishop of Pamiers had been more prudent, more moderate, and more respectful to the King, and that without entering more particularly into the Pro-

ceedings before and since the Decease of the said Bishop, it was their Opinion that the Assembly ought to protest against the Briefs which had been Written by the Pope in that affair, and to Write to the Pope, to desire him, That such like Briefs may not be dispatched for the future; and that he will grant his Bulls to the Abbe of Bourlemont, named by the King, for the Bishoprick of Pamiers; to which the Assembly agreed. The next day the Committee for the Affair of the Religious of Charonne, Reported, That the Archbishop of Paris had done nothing with relation to that House, but what belonged to the Jurisdiction of the Ordinaries, which having been wounded in an unbecoming manner, by the Popes Briefs, written on that occasion, the Assembly was obliged to protest against the same, that they might not be drawn into Consequences; and by Letter to desire the Pope to abstain from the like for the future; which the Assembly likewise agreed to, and ordered, That Notice be given to all the Archbishops and Bishops of France, of what they have done in these matters; and that at the same time the circulary Letter, written by the Assembly in 1655, with the Articles drawn up by them, (which were not then Printed) concerning the Episcopal Jurisdiction, shall be sent to them.

On the sixth, the Letters to the Pope, and to the Bishops, pursuant to the said Resolutions, were Read in the Assembly, and Signed by the President.

The Ninth, the Archbishop of Paris acquainted the Assembly, That he had received a Brief from the Pope, in answer to the late Letter Written to him by the Assembly; That he had carried it to the King, and that his Majesty had Commanded him to deliver it to the Assembly, as he did; and it having been read, the Assembly appointed the Committee for the Regale carefully to peruse it, and to Report their thoughts upon it to the Assembly.

In our last we told you of an Earth-quake that had happened here the 12th Instant, about Two in the Morning; we have an account from Tonnerre, Orleans, Troyes, Provins, Sens, Châlons, Joinville, Rheims, Soissons, Lion, Nancy, and several other places, That this Earth-quake happened there at the same time: In some places it was so violent, that it very much shook the Houses and Churches, and threw down several Hills, the people that were in the Fields or the Streets, feeling a motion or agitation like that of the Sea, or great Rivers. The Baron Biecke, Ambassador of Sweden, has taken his leave of the King, in order to his return home.

Windsor, May 17. Besides the Addresses which follow, there have been others presented to his Majesty, from the County of Cumberland, and the City of Carlisle, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

King and Liberties we have hitherto had and enjoyed under Your Majesties most Auspicious and serene Government, have a second time thought it our Duties to Address our selves to Your most Sacred Majesty, to Testifie our Allegiance and Loyalty, in declaring our utter Detestation and Abhorrence of all Leagues, Covenants, and Associations whatsoever, against Your Majesties Sacred Person and Government; and particularly that most Malicious and Diabolical Confederacy and Association purposed in a Paper produced at the Earl of Shaftsbury's Tryal: The which, and all other Leagues and Combinations, coloured by whatsoever specious pretence, to decry the Vulgar, and stir up Rebellion amongst us, we do declare, with most unfeigned hearts, to Your Majesty and the whole World, that we do Abominate and Detest; resolving with expence of our Lives and Fortunes to stand by Your Majesty, Your Heirs, and Lawfull Successors, in supporting Your Royal Diadem, and Prerogative against all Invaders or Opposers of the same: Which, that Your Majesty, by a Prosperous and Glorious Reign, may long enjoy, and so Augment the number of the Elect, is and ever shall be the most sincere and hearty Prayers of, Great Sir, Your most Loyal and Obedient Subjects.

We the Nobility, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and others of the said County, do approve and freely assent and consent to this Address of the Grand Inquest, and do fully comply with the same, in every particular thereof.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

Dread Sovereign,

WE Your Majesties most Humble, most Loyal, and most Obedient Subjects, the Grand Inquest of this County Palatine of Durham and Debatable, being very sensible how much we owe the security of our Lives, Liberties, and Properties, together with the free exercise of our Religion, as it is Established by Law, to your most Wise and Gracious Government; and of the Assurance which Your Majesty hath been pleased to give us of the continuance of these Blessings to us by your Resolution to make your Laws the Rule of your Government; For which, we have in our former general Addresses exprest our humble and hearty Thanks, together with the Offer of our Lives and Fortunes, in Defence of Your Majesties Person and Government, against all Traiterous Conspiracies and Attempts of Your open and secret Enemies; Do humbly crave Your Majesties leave once more to declare how sensible we are of the miserable Condition to which we had been reduced by a wicked Contrivance of an ASSOCIATION, to subvert the Foundation of this ancient Monarchy, which the Law hath Established in Your Majesty and your Heirs, and to bring upon us all the Miseries of a Kingdom divided against it self, if Your Majesties great Will and Care had not foreseen and prevented it.

For which, if any thing could be added to the sincerity and zeal which we have professed in our former general Addresses, we should want words to exprest it; but we shall never want Hearts or Endeavours to embrace all occasions to do more than we can say, though we must acknowledge that all that we can say and do is too little to answer that Bond of Gratitude and Duty, in which we must ever acknowledge our selves obliged by all the Services which the best of Kings can expect or receive from the most humble, most faithful, and most obedient Subjects.

We His Majesties Justices of the Peace, at the General Quarter-Sessions held for the said County, the 26th of April, 1682. do unanimously concur with the said Grand Inquest.

Plimouth, May 12. On Wednesday last arrived here his Majesties Ship the *Dragon*, Captain Hamilton Commander, bound for the *Streights*.

Whitehall, May 16. By our Letters from Scotland dated the Ninth Instant we have an account, That his Royal Highness had the day before declared in Council, That His Majesty had thought fit to constitute the Laird of *Haddo* Lord President of the Sessions, Lord Chancellor of that Kingdom; The Earl of *Greenborough* Lord Treasurer, and the Earl of *Perth* Lord Justice General. That the *Kuby*, the *Pearl*, and the *Dartmouth* were arrived in *Leith* Roads, and that their Royal Highnesses intended to part from *Edenburgh*, as this day, in order to their return for *England*.

Windsor, May 16. On Sunday, after Morning Chappel, the Ambassador from the King of *Bantam* (who came from *London* the day before) was brought from the House where he had lodged, in

His Majesties Coach, followed with several other Coaches with six Horses apiece, to the Castle, (where the Guards were drawn out) and was conducted by the Right Honourable the Earl of *Berkley*, and Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies, to the Audience of their Majesties, in the Kings-Preference-Chamber, several of his Retinue carrying Launces, and two of them Umbrella's, besides two of his Masters Servants, who also carried two Umbrella's over his Letter of Credence and his Presents, such as use to be carried, by the same Persons, over the King himself, (which they look upon as a great piece of State.) Being come with the chief of his Attendants into the Presence, (the ordinary Servants, with their Launces, remaining in the Guard Chamber, and they that carried the two great Umbrella's having leave to come and stand within the Presence-door) they made their Obedience, as they approached His Majesties Throne, by bowing of their Heads, and the Ambassador having delivered his Letter; and a Present of Diamonds from the King of *Bantam*, to His Majesty, they sat down, after the manner of their Country, at His Majesties Feet, (being with them the most respectful posture) and made a short Speech to His Majesty, declaring the high Esteem the King of *Bantam* has of His Majesty, and how desirous he is of His Majesties Friendship, &c. To which, His Majesty having been pleased to return a very obliging Answer, the Ambassador retired, and was carried to the Dukes side, where a very splendid Dinner was provided for him. In the Evening he visited his Highness Prince *Rupert*, to whom he presented the two great Umbrella's, and the next day he returned to *London*, having seen *Hampton-Court*, and the Duke of *Lauderdale*s House at *Ham*, in his way.
