Vienna, May 17

The Imperial Court will continue at *Lomburg* till towards the end of the Month, and the Duke and Dutty of *Newburg* will remain there during the time. We are here informed that the Duke of *Lorraine*, who mends a Servant belonging to the Young Duke has been, within two or three days, imprisoned upon Suspicion that he would have Poisoned the young Prince. From *Hungary* we have an Account, That Count *Teckley* was returned from the Conference he had with the *Bassa of Offen*; and it is said that the said *Bassa* told him, That the Grand Signior could not enter into a War this Year, but that he should have the assistance of the *Transilvians*; however that the Port left it to himself to make Peace, or continue the War with the Emperor, as he thought fit, which we look upon here as an Argument that the Turks do not design a War; for if they did, they would not suffer Count *Teckley* to make his Peace.

Strasburg, May 22. Our Letters from *Lorraine* tell us, That the French are bringing an Army together near *Nancy*, which will consist chiefly of the Troops of the Kings Household. We are expecting here Prince *William of Furstemberg*, who it's generally believed will succeed his Brother in this Bishoprick.

Cologne, May 26. The Emperor has written to our Magistrates, to require them to restore the Burgermaster *Krebs* to his former place, which they have communicated to the Commons of this City, who seem somewhat disturbed thereat. The Affairs of *Liege* cannot be yet composed, by reason of the several Factions in that City, who hinder the resolutions that would otherwise be taken for the putting an end to these differences between their Elector and them, which have been the occasion of so much Prejudice and Disturbance to that City.

Hamburg, May 26. We have Letters from *Copenhagen* which tell us of the Kings departure from thence for *Holstein*; and here is a report that there is to be an Interview between His Majesty and the Elector of *Brandenburg* to morrow, at a place call'd *Izeho*. From *Stockholm* they write, That the King did hasten out the Squadron of Men of war he intends to have at Sea this Summer.

Hague, May 29. The Treaty of Commerce concluded between this State and the King of *Denmark*, in 1643. for 40 years, is going to expire: Among other the advantages the Subjects of these Countreys obtained by it, this was one, That their Ships passing the Sound paid only so much per Tun, according to their Burden, whatever their Lading was, which was not so be examined. The States would renew this Treaty, but it's said the King of *Denmark* will not, and that he pretends the Dutch

Ships Trading to those parts shall for the future only carry such Goods as are the growth or Manufacture of these Countreys, and particularly that they shall not Lade French Wines. The Prince of *Orange* returned hither the 23 instant, and the next day the Princess's the 25th their Highnesses parted again for *Honslaerdike*, with intention to pass this Season there. The 27th the States of *Holland* met again, and the Prince of *Orange* came purposely to Town to assist in their Assembly, and having so done, returned again to *Honslaerdike*.

Paris, May 30. There is some stop put to the Levies of Horse, and several Officers that were to have had Commissions are sent back to the Garrisons from whence they came, the King allowing them 25 Crowns for the Charge of their Journeys; for which several Reasons are given, but the most probable seem to be, That these Levies of Horse, might not hinder those of the Foot, which the King will have made first, the raising of Horse being much the easier of the two. The Provincial Treasurers for the Extraordinaries of the War, which are now Prisoners at *Arras*, are going to be Tried, the King having sent Commissioners thither for that purpose. The 28th Instant dyed *Henry de Bourbon, Duke de Verneuil*, Natural Son to *Henry the Fourth*, and Governor of *Languedoc*, in the 81 Year of his Age. From *Provence* they write, That the Cardinal de *Grimaldi* lay very ill, without any hopes of his Recovery.

Windsor, May 23. Besides the Addresses which follow, there have been others Presented to His Majesty from the Justices of the Peace, and the Gentlemen of the Grand Inquest for the County of *Westmorland*, at the General Quarter-Sessions of the Peace holden for the said County at *Kendal*, the 28th of April 1682. as likewise from the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Corporation of *Kendal*; and the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Common-Council, and other Members of the Burrough of *Appleby*, in the said County of *Westmorland*; all which His Majesty was pleased to receive very Graciously.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of the Benchers, Barristers, and Gentlemen of the Inner-Temple, London.

Dread Sovereign,

As we did with great Regret and Sorrow of Heart take notice of the late renewed, malicious, and wicked Attempts of the old Phanatick Enemies of the Crown, (who by false and Seditious Pamphlets, Cabals, and Discourses, and not without secret Conspiracies, have of late Aspersed, Libell'd, and beset the best and most Loyal of Your Majesties Protestant Subjects, not sparing even Your own most Sacred Person) so we cannot but with great Joy call to mind, and gratefully acknowledge Your Majesties great Wisdom and steady Justice in all things throughout the whole Course of Your Reign, and especially Your Majesties firm Resolution of making the Law the Rule of Your Government, and of Rescuing Your Loyal Subjects from all Arbitrary Power and Tyranny that may be attempted and usurped over them by their Fellow Subjects.

We Thank Almighty God for putting it into Your Majesties Heart to exert Your Authority in Vindicating Your Prerogative and Your Peoples Rights: and also for putting it into the Hearts of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects to Publish to all the World their Abhorrence of all Illegal and Violent Practices, and to assert their and our true Liberties and Birth-rights.

Great SIR, the Privileges, true Liberty and Property of the Subject, can never be defended without the mainfaining Your Majesties just Prerogative, which ill-principled Men have of late endeavoured so boldly to invade and Cry down. The pure Protestant Religion, as now Established by Law, without the base Alloy or Mixture of Popery or Phanaticism, is that which is most near and dear unto us; and we shall, in our several Places and Callings, (under Your Majesty and Your Royal Successor in the Right Line) constantly and zealously embrace, and to the utmost hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, maintain and defend the same: And we shall continue our utmost Endeavours (as much as in us lies) to vindicate and Maintain Your Majesties just Prerogative, and the good Laws of the Land, with which this Nation hath been happy and flourish'd for so many Ages, to the Envy and Admiration of all the World; and therefore we cannot but declare our utmost Detestation of that most Treasonable Paper of *Affeciation*, lately proved to be found in the Closer of the Earl of *Shaftsbury*, which plainly contains matter of High Treason, directly tending to the Destruction of Your Majesties Person and Government: And humbly pray, That as Your Majesty hath, through Your great Wisdom and Vigilance, made a timely Discovery of that horrid Conspiracy and *Affice*, so You will (notwithstanding all the Arts and Shifts that have been used by the Conspirators and their Adherents) proceed to remove all those Obstructions that have or may prevent the bringing disaffected and evil Men to suffer that Exemplary Justice they have most notoriously deserved: And herein, and in all further Acts of Religion, Justice, and Loyalty, we shall always endeavour to approve our selves

To the Kings Most Excellent Majesty.

WE Your Majesties most Obedient Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Bayliffs, and Capital Citizens of Your Majesties ancient City of Carlisle, taking Notice of divers late Disloyal Practices and Attempts, by Libels and otherwise, to scandalize and Defame Your Majesties most Gracious Government, and to withdraw Your Majesties good Subjects from the Duty and Allegiance which they owe to Your Majesty, your Heirs and Successors, do think our selves Obliged hereby to declare our Detestation and utter Dislike of all Associations which do or may tend to the Disturbance of the Government in Church or State, or to the interruption of the Decree of the Crown, as now by Law Established: And we do Resolve; whenever it shall please Your Majesty to call a Parliament, That in all Elections to be made of any Members or Representatives for this Corporation, to make choice of such Persons as have ever been truly Loyal, and as we hope by their Actions shall demonstrate the Truth of what we here Profess. And we do further declare, That we will upon all occasions be ready to express the utmost of our Duty and true Allegiance that may become the most Obliged Subjects, and that we shall ever Pray that Your Majesties Reign may be long and prosperous. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto put our hands, and caused our Common Seal of the said City to be Affixed, the 27th day of April, in the 34th Year of Your Majesties most happy Reign over England, &c. Annoq; Dom. 1682.

Falmouth, May 18. The 15 instant came in here the *Concord*, and the *Hare*, both of London, bound home from the *Barbadoes*, which Island they left about six weeks since, in a very Thriving and Peaceable Condition. Yesterday the said Ships put to Sea again.

Plimouth, May 19. The 17th Instant came in here the *Francis*, and the *John and Mary*, both of London, the first bound for *Jamaica*, and the other for *Tangier*. The *Phoenix*, Captain *Blague*, is still here.

Westminster, May 24. Yesterday a Tryal was had at the *Kings-Bench*, upon an Indictment of Mr. *Wilmore*, For *Spiriting or Stealing away a Young Boy*, and sending him to *Jamaica*; of which the Jury (the thing upon a full and positive Evidence appearing very foul) found him Guilty. But it seems Mr. *Wilmore* has absented himself, and a *Writ de Homine Replegiando* having been before Issued against him, a *Capias in Withernam* is Issued to take his Body.

The Highway-man that shot, was a thin pale Man, with short light Hair, and a grey Close-bodied Coat, and was mounted on a Bay Horse, about 14 hands high, a white Face, and some white Feet: the other was a lusty Man with yellow hair, and a loose dark Serge Coat, mounted on a dark brown Horse, with a Star in his Forehead, about 14 hands and a half high: The third, on Foot, was a middle-sized Man, with a short brown Perrwig. Whoever discovers any of these persons to Captain Richardson, Keeper of Newgate, so as they be apprehended, shall have Ten Pounds Reward paid them by the said Captain Richardson.
