Strasburg, May 22. Our Letters from Lorrain tell us, That the French are bringing an Army together near Naney, which will confift chiefly of the Troops of the Kings Houlhold. We are expect-We are expecting here Prince William of Furstemberg, who it's generally believed will incceed his Brother in this Bifhoprick.

Cologne, May 26. The Emperor has written to our Magistrates, to require them to reftore the Burgermaster Krebs to his former place, which they have communicated to the Commons of this City, who feem fomewhat diffurbed thereat. The Affairs of Liege cannot be yet compoled, by reason of the several Factions in that City, who hinder the refolutions that would otherwise be taken for the putting an end to these differences between their Elector and them, which have been the occafion of fo much Prejudice and Diffurbance to that City.

Hamburg, May 26. We have Letters from Co. penhagen which tell us of the Kings departure from thence for Holflein; and here is a report that there is to be an Interview between His Majefty and the Elector of Brandenburg to morrow, at a place call'd Izeko. Paris, May 30. There is fome flop put to the Levics of Horfe, and feveral Officers that were to have had Commiffions are fent back to the Garifons from whence they came, the King allowing them 25 Crowns for the Charge of their Journeys; for which feveral Reafons are given, but the molt probable feem to be, That these Levies of Horse, might not hinder those of the Foot, which the King will have made first, the raising of Horie being much the caffer of the two. The Provincial Treasurers for the Extraordinaries of the War, which are now Prifoners at Arras, are going to be fit, which we look upon here as an Argument that the Turks do not defign a War; for if they did, ther for that purpole. The 28th Inflant dyed they would not fuffer Count Teckeley to make his Peace. in the 81 Year of his Age. From Provence they write, That the Cardinal de Grimaldi lay very ill, without any hopes of his Recovery.
