May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Inhabitants of the Borough of Derby, respectfully approach your Royal Highness with feelings of the most loyal and dutiful attachment; we deeply deplore the fact, that an atrocious insult has been offered to your Royal Highness, whilst in the exercise of one of the most important functions of your high authority, and we most cordially congratulate your Royal Highness on your escape from an outrage as disgraceful as it is repugnant to the habits and principles of Britons; our concern on the present occasion is increased, because we consider the Constitution itself insulted by the recent attack on your Royal Highness's Person, but we are gratified with the opportunity it affords us of expressing our steady attachment to your Royal Highness, our devotedness to the great principles of our inestimable Constitution, as by law established, and our readiness to co-operate with your Royal Highness's Government, in supporting the due dignity and honour of the Crown, and in preserving inviolate the dearest interests of our country.

We most sincerely congratulate your Royal Highness, on the providential escape from the traitorous and malicious attempts of wicked conspirators, and we fervently hope that the loyalty and patriotism of the subjects of the United Empire, will be so eminently conspicuous and universally manifested, as to prevent any repetition of so daring an outrage; and we beg permission to add, that nothing shall be wanting on our part as Magistrates, (supported as we feel ourselves by a large majority of the principal and respectable inhabitants,) to preserve, on all occasions, the peace and tranquillity of this Borough, to evince our steady, loyal and firm attachment to your Royal House and Person, our determination to support the honour and dignity of the Crown, and to defend the dearest interests of our country, its laws and Constitution.
