WE, the Minister, Churchwardens, and Parish-ioners of the Parish of St. Michael's, in the City of Dublin, duly assembled, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, in order to express our un-leigned gratitude to Divine Providence for protecting your Royal Highness from the late assault upon your Royal Person, by a depraved and infuriate rabble ; an act of treasonable violence outraging at once all laws human and divine, and hostile equally. to the Majesty of the Throne, the principles of the Constitution, and the welfare of the State. We cannot reflect on this outrage without the consol-ing conviction, that it must be regarded with the same abhorrence which we ourselves feel by all our fellow subjects, however otherwise differing in religious or political opinions, except only those malignant agitators who seek their own exaltation in public confusion and calamity, and those blind dupes to their insidious arts; who are taught, whatever be the cause of public distress, whether it be the scourge of war or the severity of the seasons, the hand of man or the visitation of God, to charge that distress as a crime on their governors ; but we trust all such delusions must speedily be dissipated, by that anxious vigilance with which your Royal Highness labours to alleviate the inevitable distresses of your people, and exhibit a bright example of that self-denial and liberality, which, if universally followed, must so materially lessen the present pressure on the lower orders : and we feel convinced that the powers vested in your Royal Highness at this dangerous crisis, by the wisdom of the Legislature, will be supported by the exer-tions of every loyal and public-spirited citizen, and will effectually maintain the public tranquillity.

We conclude with humbly entreating your Royal Highness to accept the assurance of our analterable attachment to your Royal Highness's Person and Government, and our unfeigned prayer that the same Providence which has hitherto so signally protected the British Empire, may still be extended to it under your Royal Highness and your Illustrious House, securing to us and our posterity the invaluable blessings of religion and liberty, of national prosperity and glory, and to your Royal Highness and your successors the approbation of applauses of mankind.

WE, the Grand Jury of the County of Clare, assembled at Ennis, at Spring Assizes 1817, humbly beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, to express our utter abhorrence of the late daring outrage against the representative of our beloved Sovereign ; fully convinced that the true interests of the Crown and the people are inseparably connected, and animated with the sincerest attachment to the Person and Government of your Royal Highness, we lament that any attempt should be made to interrupt the exercise of these important trusts, which the Constitution has committed to the Soyereign.

When we reflect on the late eventful scenes that have psssed on the continent of Europe, and the calamities from which these islands have, under your auspices, been happily exempt, we feel that we owe to the Supreme Being unbounded gratitude, and we have a decided conviction, that no efforts have been wanting on the part of your Royal Highness, to give full effect to those measures, which have essentially contributed to bring a long and arduous war to a glorious termination; and we entertain an ardent hope, that the same wisdom, which has been so emineutly displayed amidst the perils and difficulties of war, will be exerted in the hour of peace, to excite and to cherish a spirit of industry, to improve the national resources, and to extend and diffuse the blessings of agriculture and commerce, to the remotest parts of the British Empire.

The Laws and Constitution of our country have taught us, that the welfare of every part of the community depends upon those laws being obeyed, the Throne held in reverence, and the Person of our Sovereign and of his representative respected.

By this daring outrage, therefore, offered against the laws and the dignity of the Crown, we feel ourselves to be injured, the Constitution of the country endangered, and our national interests and happiness attacked.

IS Royal Highness the Prince Regent having been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to appoint the Right Honourable Stapleton Lord Combermere, G. C. B: to be Captain-General and Governor in Chief in and over the island of Barbadoes, his Lordship this day took the usual oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of His Majesty's plantations.

Carlton-House, February 6, 1817.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was this day pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to confer the honour of Knighthood on Lieutenant Robert Steele, of the Corps of Royal Marines, a Lieutenant-Colonel in the Spanish service, and a Knight of the Royal Spanish Order of Charles the Third.

War-Office, March 29, 1817.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalt of His Majesty, to direct, that the 12th or Prince of Wales's Light Dragoons or Lancers, shall be in future styled, " the 12th or Prince of Wales's Royal Regiment of Lancers:" that the colour of the facing of the Regiment, which is at present yellow, shall be changed to scarlet, and that the lace, which is at present silver, shall be changed to gold.

The alteration in the clothing to take place from the 25th December next.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to approve of permission being granted to the 38th Regiment to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the Regiment, the words "Monte Video," "Salamanca," and "St. Sebastian," in commemoration of the very distinguished gallantry displayed by that Regiment in the capture of Monte Video, on the 3d February 1807; in the battle of Salamanca, on the 21st and 22d July 1812; and in the storming and capture of St. Sebastian, on the 31st August 1813.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of the 2d Battalion of the 84th Regiment being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments the word "Nive," in commemoration of the distinguished services of that Battalion in the battle of the Nive, on the 9th, 10th, and 11th December 1813.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of the 90th Regiment of Light Infantry, or Perthshire Volunteers, being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments the words "Mandora," "Martinique," and "Guadeloupe," in commemoration of the services of the Regiment when leading the right column of the Army in its advance for Mandora, on the 13th March 1801; in the capture of Martinique, on the 8th February 1809; and of Guadeloupe, on the 3d February 1810.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to grant" permission to the 2d Battalion of the 34th Regiment, to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the Regiment,

the word " Albuera," in commemoration of the services of the Battalion in the battle of Albuera, on the 16th May 1811.
