To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, \&c. \&c. Sc.
Mary it please your Royal Highness,
WE, the Bishop of Bangor, the Dean, the Archdeacon of Merioneth, and the parochial Clergy of the Diocese of Bangor, beg leave humbly to approsch your Royal Highness with our siucere and dutiful expressions of concern and abhorrence at the late treasonable outrage committed on your royal person, in the very exercise of the most solemn function committed to your care.

Deeply impressed with gratitude for the many invaluable benefits which our Nation and Church have enjoyed for more than balf a century moder the pious and prudent rule of our beloved Monarch, and fully persuaded that your Royal Highness has been anxious to continue these benefits, in the exercise of the high authority committed to your trust, we feel all the revercnce and affection due to your person and office.

We have especially remarked your Royal Highness's zeal and Christian liberality, not only in sympathising with, but in relieving the distresses which, by God's permission, aftlice this nation; a conduct so princely and becoming, as should bind all the subjects of this realu to the supreme anthority by the closest ties of loyalty and attachnent.
