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Vienna, May 19.

THE last Week arrived here an Envoy from the Kam of Tartary; He has had Audience of the President of the Council of War, and we cannot hear that he has any other business than to assure the Emperor of the Friendship of the Kam, and of his desire to contribute his Endeavours for the preserving the Peace between the Emperor and the Grand Signior. Some days since a great Council of War was held at Laxemburg, where, as we are told, it was resolved, besides the Levies that are now in hand, to give out Commissions for the raising 20000 Men more. Three days since, the Bishop of *Eschapania* was dispatched to the Court of *Bavaria*, but we know not upon what Errand, his Commission being kept very secret. The Count *d'Albensi*, the Emperors Ambassador to the King of *Sweden*, parted from hence yesterday. There are Letters from *Hungary* which say, that the Rebels begin to mistrust the Turks, and therefore are the more inclined to make their Peace with the Emperor.

Genova, May 20. Yesterday morning came to an Anchor in this Road the *Smirna* Merchant, Laden with Oyls: And four days since, arrived here the French Resident with his Family.

Francfort, May 22. The Imperial Ambassadors, and the Deputies of the Princes of the Empire are expecting directions from their respective Masters upon the late Reply of the French Ambassadors, who continue to press for a positive Answer to their Propositions, and seem to intimate, That if they receive it not very Speedily, the King their Master will not think their longer stay here necessary, as not expecting any fruit from these Conferences. On the other side, the Imperial Ambassadors, and the Deputies of the Empire, do declare, That the Emperor and the Empire are very desirous of Peace, but that they will not purchase it at the rate the French propose. In the mean time the several Circles are providing the Troops which they are to furnish to the Army of the Empire, and it's believed they will in a short time be joyned in a Body.

Brussels, May 29. On Wednesday last arrived here *Thomas Howard* Elq; being sent by His Majesty of *Great Britain*, in quality of Envoy Extraordinary, to Compliment the *Marquis de Grana* upon his coming to this Government: His Excellency is at present at *Antwerp*, and we know not yet when to expect him back here; but by his sending for his Varchts Yesterday, we may believe his return will be very sudden. Yesterday arrived the Spanish Ordinary, which brought his Excellency some Monneys, with the welcome News that the Queen of *Spain*, as they have great ground to hope, is with Child. The Command of *Marchal de Camp* General of these Countries is not yet disposed of. We have an account from *Luxemburg*, That the four Italian Colonels in that Garrison have quitted

their Commands, refusing to be Commanded by the Prince de *Chimay*, (who is Governor of that City and Province) because he is not a General of *Battalia*. From *Germany* they write, That the French are assembling their Troops about *Strasburg*.

Paris, June 3. The *Sieur du Quesne* who is expected from the *Levans*, is to joyn with a Squadron of Gallies now sitting out at *Marsilles*, and then to stand over for *Argiers*, to make some attempt upon those Corsairs. The Court continues to take the diversions of the season at *Versailles*.

Windsor, May 27. The Counties of *Dublin, Clare, Kilkenny, Roscommon, Kings County, Longford, Louth, Carberlogh, and Wexford*, and the City of *Waterford*, the Town of *Drogheda*, and the Corporations of *Kildare* and *Irish-Town*, in *Ireland*, have made humble Addresss to His Majesty, declaring their Abhorrence of the late intended Traiterous Association, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

We therefore humbly Declare to Your Majesty and the World, our Detestation and deep-est Abhorrence of that Wicked and Rebellious Project of Association, and do solemnly manifest our settled Resolutions, That we will to the utmost of our Powers vigorously resist all such pernicious Associations and Associators, and all other Enemies of Your Majesties Government, the Legal Succession of the Crown, and the Laws now Established both in Church and State. Great SIR, we beg leave to tender Your Majesty our most humble and unfeigned Thanks for Your Wisdom and Care of Your ancient Kingdom of *Scotland*, by Cloathing Your Royal Brother, our late Lord Warden, with the Charge of High Commissioner for that Kingdom; whose Princely Goodness, and great Prudence, so admirably tempered, have settled that lately disturbed Kingdom in Peace and Tranquility.

The Most humble Address of His Majesties Justices of the Peace, and of the Gentlemen of the Grand Inqueys for the County of Westmorland, at the General Quarter-Sessions of the Peace holden & by Adjournment for the said County, at Kendal, the 28th day of April, Anno Domini 1682.

Great Sir,

WHE Your Sacred Majesties most Loyal and most Obedient Subjects, being very sensible of the great happiness which we and all Your Subjects have enjoyed ever since Your Majesties most joyful and most wonderful Restauration, by which our Religion, Laws, Liberties, and Properties were miraculously rescued from the great Prophaneness, Violence and Oppression of such Persons who pretending indeed Zeal and Tenderness of Conscience, pulled down some Churches, turn'd others into Prisons and Stables, Fought against, Imprisoned, and at last most barbarously Murdered their Sovereign Lord, Your Majesties Father of Blessed Memory, Murdered, Sequestred, Decimated, and killed many of their Fellow-Subjects, contrary to the known Laws of God and this Kingdom; and we having too much reason to suspect that divers restless wicked men are still endeavouring to Ruine the Established Governanc in Church and State, by instilling into the minds of many, Principles of Rebellion, and leading them into Plots and Treacherous Conspiracies, as appears by the subtil insinuations of the late most seditious ASSOCIATION, are overjoyed that Your Majesty is so well informed of their Designs and Actions; which we hope will render ineffectual all their Rebellious and Fanatical Contrivances.

And for the discharging of our Consciences, and encouraging of other Loyal Persons, we presume to assure Your Majesty that we will always bear Faith and true Allegiance to Your Majesty, to Your Heirs and Lawful Successors, and will ever heartily defend Your Majesty and them, together with the Religion and Government as by Law established, to the utmost of our Powers, against all Traiterous and Seditious Plots, ASSOCIATIONS, Leagues, Coverants, Engagements, Conspiracies, and Attempts whatsoever; Deceiving and Abhorring from our hearts whatever shall hurt or violate Your Majesties Royal Person, State or Government. And we the Inhabitants of this County do earnestly desire and cheerfully hope, That our being thus how in Declaring according to our Duty, shall be excused; we being so remote, and having no Lent-Alliges, and likewise conscious of our having been ever truly Loyal to the King and Church of England, since very few or no Gentlemen among us were engaged for the Rebels in the late War.

And since, by the Blessing of God, we live under the Monarchy, the best of Governments; are Ruled by a Prince, the best of Kings; and enjoy our Religion and Liberties so fully, that none can justly complain of being deny'd any their Legal Rights and Priviledges; and all this through Your Majesties most tender Care, and constant Protection, of which we crave leave with all Joy and Thankfulness to take Notice, and of the late great Instance, in Your Majesties giving so effectual a check to the appointing of Publick Faiths and Thankgivings without Your Majesties Authority; in which we cannot tell whether more to abhor the Malice or Imprudence of the Contrivers, there being so many of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects yet alive, who can remember Sermons to have been grossly abused as Prologues to Villanous Conspirats, and particularly Haberdalhers-Hall, the place where many of them were forced to appear at the huihot of the late Usurpers, to their great Cost and Charges.

For this being so seasonably prevented, and for all other the Instances of Your Majesties Latent Vigilance for the Publick Welfare, we shall ever most heartily Pray for the Preservation of Your Majesties most Sacred Person and Governanc, and for the continuance of the Established Religion, and of the due Succession and Decent of the Imperial Crown of this Realm, and of all other, Your Majesties Dominions and Countreys.

Falmouth, May 22. On Thursday last the Wind coming up at N. E. the Merchant Ships in this Port, bound for Jamaica, Barbadoes, &c. put to Sea, but the Wind did not hold long fair, for on Saturday the Wind came about to the S. and S. W. so it's

believed they are not far off, but it being fair weather, they keep at Sea.

Whitehall, May 27. This Morning about Nine a Clock His Majesty passed by here in his Barge, going down the River to meet their Royal Highnesses. About Noon, His Majesty returned hither, and did my Lord Chamberlain the Honour to Dine with the Queen at Arlington-House.

Their Royal Highnesses, with the Lady Ann, came up with the Flood, being met by a great number of the Nobility and other Persons of Quality, and saluted as they passed with the Guns from the Ships, and those from the Tower. They arrived here about three in the Afternoon, and went directly to Arlington-House, where their Majesties received them with great Affection and Joy for their safe Arrival: From thence their Royal Highnesses went to St. James's, and their Majesties returned to Windsor. At night, here were Bonfires, with Ringing of Bells, and other Publick Expressions of Joy for their Royal Highnesses safe and happy Return into this Kingdom.
