NOTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness the Prince Regent will hold a Levee at Carlton-House, on Thursday the 17th instant, at two o'clock.

THE following Addresses have been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Addresses His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese of Saint David's, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with the most heartfelt expression of congratulation on your providential escape from assassination, on your return from exercising one of the most important functions of the Royal Prerogative.

With indignation and abhorrence we have witnessed the daring attempts of treason and blasphemy to undermine the civil and religious constitution of the country; but we rejoice that the pestilent and disorganizing doctrines, which led to the late atrocious outrage, are proved not to be the sense of the nation, by the loyalty and patriotism of the addresses, which from all parts of the kingdom are laid at your Royal Highness's feet; and we trust, that the clamours of disaffection and sedition will be overwhelmed and silenced by the united and decisive declarations of attachment to your Royal Highness's Person and Government. Our earnest prayer shall be, that the same merciful Providence, which protected your Royal Highness from the murderous attempt of the assassin, will long preserve you to defend the Protestant Faith, to uphold the rights of the Church, and to maintain inviolate that invaluable Constitution, in Church

and State, which has enabled this favoured country to defeat all the efforts of foreign tyranny, and to restore the liberties and independence of Europe. And our utmost endeavours shall be employed in promoting, by our instruction, our example, and by all other means in our power, those operative sentiments of loyalty and religion which are due from a grateful people to their Sovereign, and to the constitutional establishments of their country.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Bishop, the Dean, and Prebendaries of the Cathedral Church, the Archdeacon, and Clergy of the Diocese of Rochester, beg leave to express to your Royal Highness our abhorrence and detestation of the late atrocious assault made upon your Royal Highness's person; and to assure your Royal Highness of our thankfulness to the Divine Providence for your preservation from the danger to which your Royal Highness was exposed; and of our fervent prayers, that the same merciful Providence may ever continue to protect your Royal Highness, and to bless your endeavours in the administration of the Government of this kingdom, to promote its safety, honour, and welfare.

We shall not fail to use our utmost endeavours to secure the obedience of the people committed to our charge, and to guard them against the delusions of factious and evil-minded men, by inculcating a conscientious submission to the laws, and to strengthen their attachment to our Constitution, by impressing upon their minds the inestimable value of those established institutions, civil and religious, which, under the blessing of Divine Providence, have so effectually promoted their best interests and happiness.
