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Strasbourg, May 22.

Prince William of Furstemburg, whom we already look upon as our new Bishop, knowing the French King has so design'd him, is expected here in few days. The Chapter is to meet the next week, and the Baron de Monclar, and the Sieur de la Grange, the French Intendant in Alsace, are to assist at the Election, as the Kings Commissioners. The Troops of the Kings Household march towards Lothrain, and we have Letters which say, that the King himself is expected at Nancy.

Brussels, June 2. To Morrow his Excellency the Marquis de Grada parts from Antwerp for Flanders, to visit the several Garisons in that Province, and it is believed, his Excellency will likewise take a turn through the other Provinces, before he comes back hither. His Excellency has ordered a second Months Pay to the Army, resolving to have the Troops paid very punctually. The Custom-house that was brought from Fort St. Mary, near this City, by order of the Prince of Parma, is by his Excellencies Command removed back to the place where it was before. His Excellency is likewise making some alteration in the Duties that are paid, which will be a great ease to the People. On Monday Mr. Howard, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had his Audience of his Excellency at Antwerp, by whom he was received with great Kindness and Respect.

Brussels, June 9. According to what we told you in our last, the Marquis de Grada parted two days since from Antwerp, to visit the Garisons of Flanders. We hear that the French Troops in the new Conquests are marching, being to Encamp in two Bodies, the one between Cambrai and Bouchain, and the other near Aire. Our Letters from Germany tell us, that the Emperor had ordered his Ambassadors at Frankfurt to insist upon a Resolution of what the most Christian King has possessed himself of since the departure of his Ambassadors from that hand, particularly of the City of Strasbourg: And this Morning arrived here an express from Vienna, who understanding his Excellency is in Flanders, made no stay here, but went on to deliver the Letters he is charged with, to his Excellency. He is said that among other things this Express brings an account that the Imperial Troops are marching towards the Rhine.

Haght, June 3. The Prince of Orange came to Town yesterday from Honflerdike, and was present in the Assembly of the States of Holland, who are at present taken up with the particular Affairs of the Province. The Heer Van Winterstein had this Week his first Audience of the States General, as Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden.

Marseilles, May 28. They are fitting out several Gallies with all imaginable diligence, and it is said they will be ready to Sail in five or six days. They are to join the Sieur de Quene, who is daily expected with the Ships under his Command, at Thoulon: the Duke de Mortemar, and several other Persons of Quality, intend to go as Volentiers, and Monsieur

de Navailles is to Command the Gallies: The Rendezvous is at Port Mahon, and it's not doubted but this Expedition is designed against the Algeries.

Paris, June 6. The King has given the Government of Languedoc, vacant by the Death of the Duke de Verneuil, (for whom the Court is now in Mourning) to the Duke de Maine, and has appointed the Duke de Noailles to have the Administration of it, and to act as Gouverneur during the Duke de Noailles Minority. Monsieur du Quesne's every day expected at Thoulon, where he will leave the Ships he brings with him from the Levant, and will immediately Sail again with five Men of War, that lie ready there, and fifteen Gallies for Argiers, and will join ten Men of War more, that are now remaining on those Coasts. The Sieur Centurion of Genoa, a Man of great Experience in Sea Affairs, with the Duke of Mortemar, and several other Persons of Quality, go as Volentiers in this Expedition. We are told of a new Brief that came the last week from Rome, directed to the King, in which it's said the Pope admonishes his Majesty to cause the Clergy of this Kingdom to change their Conduct, concluding that this is the last time he will write, and that their have not the effect, he hopes it will, he must think of applying what other Remedy he can. We formerly told you, that the first President accompanied with several Councellers, and the Attorney General, had caused the late Declaration of the Clergy concerning the Ecclesiastical Power, and the Kings Edicts, to be Registered in the Parliaments (as well as in the University, &c.) which it seems was done without any preceding Deliberation or Consent of the Doctors of that Faculty, who are therefore not well pleased, and in their Assembly on Monday last, after a warm Debate, they appointed a Committee to Examine what had passed in this Affair, and to make a Report.

strip of that Holy League which the French Papists heretofore framed against their King, and plunged that Nation into a Sea of Blood. This confirms to us what we have long believed, that *Eng. Ph*anatics are inspired by Popish Enslarities: And that these Enslarities to our Peace, can assume all shapes in order to our Ruine; which since open Plots and Conspiracies cannot compass, secret Machinations shall bring to pass; and doth fully convince us that the Church of *Eng. land* is the strongest Bullwark against Popery: And that the Loyal Obedient Sorts of it are the best Protestants; though by way of distinction they do not call themselves the only true ones. And since our Subject is of Association, we hope it may be allowed us to declare our Union, That we are fully resolved with our Lives and Fortunes to defend Your Majesties Sacred Person, and that we will never obey any Orders or Directions, but what Loyalty and the Laws of the Land oblige us to follow, from our Hearts abhorring the thoughts of submitting our selves to any Dictates which shall not be authorized by Royal Sanction. That God will long preserve Your Majesty to all our Comforts and Security, and continuing the Crown in its due Course of Succession, is the hearty Prayer of Your most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

We the *Mag. liffs*, High Steward, Justices of the Peace, Magistrates, Sheriff, Town-Clerk, and others of the said City and County of *Litchfield*, do unanimously Concur with the Grand Jury in this Address, and Humbly desire your Majesties Gracious Acceptance of the same; as Testimony whereof we have affixed our Common Seals, the Day and Year above written.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, having already presumed to present Your Majesty with our hearty Thanks for, and Acknowledgment of Your great Goodness to us, and other Your Loyal Subjects, expressed in Your late Gracious Declaration, of Your Princely Resolutions for the future Government of this Your Kingdom of England: And finding that some restless Spirits, ungrateful both to God and Your Majesty, for the Blessings they enjoy under Your Peaceable Reign, had thoughts of entering into an illegal and Abominable Association, a Draught whereof found amongst the *Earl of Shaftsbury's* Papers, Your Majesty hath been pleased to publish to the World; We think our selves Obligated both in Duty and Conscience to Testifie both to Your Majesty and the Nation our utter Dislike and Abhorrence of the same. Neither are we of Opinion, that any the most Studied Pretensions to Zeal and Duty, set forth in the Preamble, are specious enough to Sanctifie the unjustifiable and dangerous Conclusion. Some of us are old enough to remember in Your Blessed Fathers Reign, what Wonderful Propositions and Demands were offered in with professions of Zeal for Religion, and Care of his Royal Issue; the End whereof was the making him a Glorious King in Heaven, but a Miserable one on Earth: And we hope, SIR, that this Nation will be too Wise, to be drawn twice through the same Water by the very same Cat. In short, Great SIR, we from our Hearts disown any Thoughts but those of Obedience to our Sovereign, which is the Principle the true Protestant Religion teacheth, and whatsoever Preach or Practice any contrary Doctrine, may style themselves Sober Protestants, but can never prove themselves to be either true Christians, or good Subjects. God preserve Your Majesty in Health and Peace, continue the Crown in its Legal Descent, Defend You from the Loyalty of such as would Divert You of Your Authority for the security of Your Person; And may You at length be allowed the benefits of those Laws

which You are so Graciously pleased to give the full advantage of to Your People.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

WE Your Majesties Dutiful, Loyal, and most Obedient Subjects, the Mayor, Justices of the Peace, Aldermen, Common Council, Gentlemen, and other Inhabitants of your Majesties Ancient Burrough of *Leicester* in the County of *Leicester*, whose Names are hereunto Subscribed; in our Hearts utterly abominating, and detesting all Treasonable Practices, Confederacies, and Associations whatsoever, which have been, or by Wicked and dilloyal Persons, may be formed and contrived against Your Majesties Sacred Person or Government; Do most humbly crave leave of Your Majesty to Represent to Your Most Excellent Majesty and the whole World, this our Detestation of all such damnable Practices, especially at this time, when Men of Dilloyal Principles have lately been endeavouring to draw Your Majesties Subjects into such Devilish Associations, and Confederacies, as doth most plainly appear by that Association which was given in Evidence against the *Earl of Sh.
