

growth, produce, or manufacture of any country declared to be liable to infection; or if any goods of the first class taken into such ship or vessel at such port or place not declared liable to infection, shall be of the growth, produce, or manufacture of any country declared liable to infection; then, provided proof shall be given, according to the provisions of the forty-third section of His Majesty's said Order in Council of the fifth of April one thousand eight hundred and five, that such goods have performed quarantine, either at Malta, Ancona, Venice, Messina, Leghorn, Genoa, or Marseilles.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the time being of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The humble, dutiful, and loyal Address of the Governor and Council, the Mayor and Aldermen, the European and Native Freeholders, and the other Inhabitants of His Majesty's Colony of Sierra Leone.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Governor and Council, the Mayor and Aldermen, the European and Native Freeholders, and the other Inhabitants of the Colony of Sierra Leone, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with our humble, dutiful, and loyal address, on the occasion of the happy union of Her Royal Highness your august daughter, the Princess Charlotte, with His Serene Highness Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg, and to add the congratulations of this His Majesty's colony on the auspicious event, which has fulfilled the hopes and wishes of the British empire.

It is with heartfelt pleasure we anticipate the mutual happiness which must result from the union of such excellent and virtuous qualities as they possess, an union which, under the blessings of Divine Providence, will, we confidently hope, promote the felicity of the Royal Pair, and preserve to the British empire the blessings of our happy Constitution.

Though inconsiderable amongst His Majesty's colonial possessions, our loyalty as subjects, and our attachment (from affection) to the Royal Family, cannot be exceeded by the richest or proudest dependency of the British empire. This infant colony with joy recognises its future kind protectors and benefactors in their Royal and Serene Highnesses; and, in Sierra Leone, a colony devoted to the cause of freedom, from their past sufferings in unjust and unnatural slavery, the grateful natives of Africa, freed from their fetters by British benevolence and fellow-feeling, exultingly claim their right to admission as adopted sons and subjects, of the British empire, proud of their privileges, and
