Vienna, May 31.

Count *Lobcowitz* has Orders to return forthwith to the Court of *Bavaria*, to take care of the Emperors Interest there; and we are assured that Directions have been sent to the Imperial Ambassadors at *Francfort*, to declare to those of *France*, that his Imperial Majesty cannot consent to the Dismembering of the Empire, and that he looks upon himself as obliged to endeavour the Restitution of *Strasburg*, and other Places which the *French* have possessed themselves of since the Peace of *Nimeguen*. We are certainly informed, that the Imperial Troops are on their March towards the *Rhine*, making a Body of about 16000 Men. Count *Waldeck*, General of the Forces of the Empire, is on his departure from hence for *Germany*, as is likewise General *Lessie*. It is said, that Commissions will be given out in few days, for the Raising four Regiments of Foot more, two of Dragoons, and two of Croats. We have advice of Count *Caprara's* arrival at *Constantinople*, but that he had not yet seen the Grand Vizier.

Strasburg, June 5. Prince *William of Furtemberg* arrived here two days since; and on Teulday next the Chapter is to meet, in order to the Election of a Bishop, at which the Baron *de Monclar*, the French Kings Lieutenant General in *Alsace*, is to assist. The *French* intend to have a Camp near *Hagenaw*, and another on the other side of the *Rhine*, near *Fribourg*; and their Troops are accordingly on their March.

Cologne, June 5. Monsieur *Tambonneau*, the French Envoy, having by a Memorial, desired of our Magistrates, that they would direct their Deputy at *Francfort*, to give his Vote for the accepting the Proposition made there by the Ambassadors of *France*; they have answered, That they will have all possible regard to the desires of his Most Christian Majesty, if it may be without offending the Emperor, in whose Interests they are resolved to remain firm for the future, as they have been for the time past. Our Letters from *Lorraine*, of the 1st Instant, tell us, That the French Troops are on their March, in order to the forming a Body of 20000 Men, in the Neighborhood of *Meitz*. And from *Francfort*, they tell us, That the Emperor had resolved to put strong Garrisons into the four Forest-Towns; and that in order thereunto, the Imperial Troops were on their March.

Cologne, June 9. We are every day expecting the arrival of the Troops of *Westphalia*, for whom our Magistrates have provided Quarters. We have advice, that the *French* are passing the *Meuse* at *Dinant*, and that they are to March towards the *Rhine*. Monsieur *Tambonneau*, not being satisfied with the Answer of our Magistrates, is it's said, about leaving this Place, having already disposed of some of his Ho. fcs.

Hamburg, June 9. What was reported on Sunday last, of the King of *Denmark's* arrival at *Altena*, was a mistake, his Majesty is as yet at *Itzeboe*, whether he went the last Week from *Gluckstadt*, but it is believed that his Majesty will be at *Altena* in few days, to meet the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who, according to our advices, will be at *Bergerdorf* on Friday next, and thither our Magistrates have resolved to send Deputies to Complement his Electoral Highness, upon his Arrival in these parts.

Brussels, June 12. Two days since arrived here Monsieur *de Bois David*, being sent by the Duke of *Zell*, to the Marquis *de Grana*; he made no stay here, but went forward with Prince *Vaudemont*, to find his Excellency in *Flanders*, who is expected back here to Morrow, or on Sunday at farthest. Yesterday arrived the Spanish Ordinary, by which, and the former, his Excellency has received Four hundred thousand Crowns, with a promise of a far greater Supply, upon the arrival of the Gallions. Our Letters from *Vienna*, give an account, that the Emperors Troops are more numerous, and in a better Condition than they have been for many Years past; that part of them are upon their March towards the *Rhine*; and that the Duke of *Lorraine* was so well recovered, that he intended to follow the Army in 10 or 12 days.

Hague, June 12. The 10th Instant, the Deputies of the States of *Holland*, and the Sieur *Van Sommerdyke*, and the Sieur *Cabeljauw*, had a long Conference concerning the Island of *Tobago*, upon the Proposals that have been made for the settling of that Colony. Our Northern Letters tell us, that the King of *Sweden* will assist the Emperor and the Empire, if he be not diverted by the King of *Denmark*, and the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who it's not doubted are in the Interests of *France*.

Marseilles, June 9. It has been reported here these two or three days, that Monsieur *du Quesne* was upon the Coast, with the Ships under his Command from the *Levant*, so that we judge he may be ere this at *Toulon*; he will quickly be at Sea again with the Fleet he is to Command, which is to Rendezvous at *Port Mahon*, and will consist, as is said, of 20 Men of War, (fitted out at *Toulon*, as well as at *Brest*, and *Rochelle*) and 20 Gallies, besides Gallies, Fireships, Victuallers, &c. There are various reports concerning the Design they are to be employed in; but that which is generally believed, is, that they are intended against the *Algerines*. Two or three days since, arrived here a Park from *Smirna*, from whence we have an account, that the English Ambassador at *Constantinople*, had accommodated the Matter concerning the extraordinary Duty upon Silk, for 50000 Dollars, and that the English were not to pay that Duty for the future. That the Grand Vizier did demand 350 thousand Dollars of the *French*, for Monsieur *du Quesne's* action at *Scio*; and till that was paid, he would neither give the French Ambassador Audience on the

the *Sofa*, nor would suffer him, or any of his Family to depart from *Constantinople*, though Monsieur du *Quejuehad* sent in two Men of War to demand the one or the other. An Embargo is laid upon all Vessels here in Port, bound for the *Levant*, and all Commerce is forbid with any part of *Turkey*. Windsor, June 9. The Humble Address of Your Majesties most Loyal Subjects, the Seamen of this Your Majesties Kingdom of England

Sheweth,

THAT the Acceptance Your Majesty was pleased to allow to the Dutiful Acknowledgments ye lately presumed to tender You, upon Your Gracious Declaration, in maintenance of the Established Religion, and Laws of this Your Realm, encourages us to lay before Your Majesty in no less solemn manner, our Resentments of that Impiety and Ingratitude wherewith Your constant and unexampled Clemency has been answered by some, whose Rebellious Principles (embodied by impunity) have transported them to the designing (at once) the destruction of Your Royal Person and Prerogative, the Liberties and Lives of Your People, and the total Subversion both of Church and State, in that detestable Model of Association lately produced (upon Oath) out of the Cloister of the Earl of *Shaftsbury*.

Which Association, and every other League, Covenant, and Engagement, tending to the diminution of Your Majesties just Prerogative, or the Exclusion of Your Legal Successor, we do hereby firmly Renounce and Abhor, and shall ever with the expence of our Lives stedfastly oppose; begging Your Majesty (in all humility) to rest assured, that after having (under the Conduct and Loyal Example of Your Royal Brother) so long served Your Majesty in the defence of Your Rightful Dominion at Sea, we shall never fail of asserting it with equal Allegiance and Resolution in its full extent at Land; nor, after opposing the most Hostile Attempts of powerful Princes from abroad, ever submit the Right and Dignity of Your Majesties Crown, or our own Liberties, to Invasion from our Fellow-Subjects at Home.

With which Protestation most Zealously recommending to the Protection of Almighty God Your Sacred Person, Government, and Royal Succession in its Right Line, We are,

The Humble Address of the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jurors for the Body of the County of *Carmarthen*, at the Quarter-Sessions held at the Guild-Hall of the said County upon the Twenty fifth of April, 1682.

Dread Sovereign,

HAVING formerly presumed to approach Your Royal Presence with an humble Address for the evincing of our constant Loyalty, and the asserting of our Obedience to Your Majesties Laws and Government; Permit us yet, most Gracious Sir, by this repeated Testimony of our Allegiance, with all imaginable sincerity and submission, in the simplicity of our Hearts, to Witness to Almighty God, to Your Majesty, and the whole World; our just Detestation and Abhorrence of that Cursed Association produced at the Proceedings

against the Earl of *Shaftsbury* in the Old-Baily. Our Prayers are for Your Majesties long Life and happy Reign, and our Pows and Resolutions are with our Lives and Fortunes for the Defence of Your Majesties Royal Person and Government, Your Heirs and Lawful Successors, according to the Duty of our Allegiance. In Testimony whereof, we have hereunto Subscribed our Names.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects, the Grand Jury for the County of *Pembroke*, at the Great Sessions holden for that County in *Haverford-West*, the 17th day of April, in the Four and thirtieth year of Your Majesties Reign, Anno Dom. 1682.

AMIDST the Importunities of Petitions on the one hand, and of Addresses on the other, we have hitherto adjudged it becoming the Duty of Subjects to be silent, and raised by our Petitions and Addresses to Almighty God in Prayer to implore his Divine Protection upon Your Majesties Sacred Person and Councils, than to interpose our rash Conceptions in things above us: We cannot but stand amazed at the Licentiousness of some prophane Libels and Pamphlets, and likewise at an horrid Association (of a deeper dye than the holy League of France, or the Scotch Covenant) which in Opposition to the Laws of God, the Laws of the Land, and the Example of Primitive Christianity, would at one instant by an Inhumanity more than Savage, root up and subvert Your Majesties Person, with all the Royal Line, the succession of our Kings, and the very Essence of our Monarchy; whilst amidst our Confusions, that Popery we have so much justly feared, would not fail to break in upon us.

This, Dread SIR, has awakened us to reflect more deliberately upon that Bloody History of the late Rebellion, carried on by Ambition and Enthusiasm, in which many well-meaning, unwary Men, infatuated by the Canting Declarations, and gilded Promises of those Times, were unfortunately involved to the Ruine of the best of Kings, the purest of Churches, and the most equal of Governments; And we do believe that the design of this Traiterous Association was to bring us back into the same Miseries and Calamities.

Permit us therefore, most Gracious Sovereign, with this Loyal, though late Address, to lay our selves humbly at Your Majesties Feet to bless God for Your Majesties health, (which God long continue) for Your gentle Government, and for Your constancy in the True Protestant Religion Established by Law: And to render to Your Majesty our most submissive and endeared Acknowledgments, for Your Majesties particular Care to this County in the Exclusion of Irish Cattle: And to assure Your Majesty, That we, with our Lives and Fortunes, with Loyal and resolved Hearts and Hands, will stand by Your Majesty and Your Lawful Successors to the utmost, without reserve or limitation, against all Your Enemies Domestick and Foreign; And God grant Your Majesty a long, a gracious, and a prosperous Reign over us.

We the High-Sheriff, and other the Justices of the Peace and Gentlemen of this Your Majesties County of *Pembroke*, do in all things Concur and Agree with the Gentlemen of the Grand Jury in this Abhorrence and Address.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of Your Majesties Loyal Subjecte the Grand Jury for the Town and County of Havverford: Well, at the Great Sessions holden for the said Town and County, the Seventeenth day of April, in the Four and thirtieth Year of Your Majesties Reigne.

WE Your Majesties Dutifull and loyal Subjects, prompted by your Religion and Obedience which perswades Kingdoms, by fearing God and honoring their Sovereigns, do most humbly lay this hearty and sincere Acknowledgment of Your Majesties Princely Care and Protection of the Protestant Religion, the Liberty of the Subjects, and the wholesome Laws of the Kingdom, at Your Majesties Feet. The great Immunities and Priviledges which Your Majesties Royal Ancestors have been pleased to invest this small Corner of Your Dominions with, and which is happy in being situated upon Your famous Port of Milford, is that in once elected a Victorious King for the beating down of Ufurpation and Tyranny: We acknowledge his not only their favours of Your Illustrious Predecessors which incourage us to this late (though truly Loyal) Address, but the sad reflecting upon these dismal Times, in which through the licentiousness of an Headstrong People, the greatest Champion and Defender of the Faith was unlawfully Judged, inhumanely Sentenced, and most barbarously Executed: We shall therefore still render to Almighty God our just and due Thanks for establishing a Prince in the Throne of his Ancestors, whose Courage and Policy have hitherto secured us from the Power of Foreign Invasions, which have so much threatened us, have shown up and countermin'd the deepest and most helthfull Works and Contrivances of a Bloody and Antichristian Church, and have temper'd and calmed the Tempestuous Resolutions of a Giddy and unsettled People, who, possess'd with needless Feares and Jealousies, have been almost fomented to an open Rebellion. To Your Majesty we owe the price of our Redemption from that insupportable Bondage under which the best of Your Majesties Subjects had for a long time groaned and languish'd. To Your Majesty we owe the Refining of that Religion, which now, for its purity, is envied and admired: The Church truly flourishing under the Protection of so great and Gracious a Nursing-Father: The Church which in those black and terrible days of Rebellion, was trampled on and defil'd by the Rabble, whose Banner carried the pious Motto of Reformacion and Liberty.

We furthermore Your Majesties Obedient Subjects, do from our very Hearts abhor and detest that damnable Association, too near of Kin to the Solemn League and Covenant, and promoted by the same Interest and Engines as that was. As we have libertho, so still shall we heartily pray that Almighty God would be pleas'd to bless Your Majesty with length and prosperity of days, and never divert the Stream of a true and Lineal Succession, but let it run in its proper Channel as long as the Sun and Moon shall endure. And lastly, from that indelible Copy of Loyalty which is writ in the Hearts of every one of us, our Hands shall subscribe our selves Your Majesties in all Obedience to the utmost of our Lives and Fortunes.

We the Mayor, Justices of the Peace, Common Council, Sheriff, Bayliffs, and principal Burgesles of the said Town and County of Havverford: Well, do in all things Concur and Agree with the Gentlemen of the Grand Jury in this Abhorrence and Address,

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

WE the Mayor, Steward, Magistrates, Arch-Deacon of Colmwal, and the Inhabitants of Your ancient Corporation of Portbybau, a ias West-Loot, being deeply sensible of the Benefits we have received under Your Majesties Gracious Government, since Your happy Restauration, and earnestly desiring a long and happy Continuance of it in Your Majesties Person and Family: Having lately seen a Copy of an horrid Association, found among the Papers of the Earl of Shaftesbury, a Model of Sedition and Rebellion, and of a most cursed War, which though pretended to secure our Religion and Liberties, would, if it had succeeded, have utterly Destroyed them, and reduced this

long Flourishing Kingdom into Confusion and Anarchy, we should esteem our selves the ungratefullest of all your Subjects, did we not declare to your Majesty, and the whole World, our Abhorrence of all such Traiterous Confederacies and Associations, as were able to weaken that Solemn League and Covenant which has been unanimously Ratified by the Nation; most humbly beseeching Your Majesty to assure your Self of our constant readiness for the further to oppose all such damnable Designs; and the Contrivers of them by all means possible, and of our firm Resolution to defend and protect with our Lives and Estates, Your Majesties most Sacred Person, the antient Monarchy of this Kingdom, in its just, Lawful and Lineal Descent, and the True Protestant Religion, as it now stands in our Church Established; most devoutly assuring Your Majesty that we sever it shall please you, out of your Royal Wisdom, to constitute a Parliament, we will make Choice of such former Representatives therein, as we shall know to be of the same Principles with our selves, prepared always to obey Your Majesty, and to promote the Good and Prosperity of the Kingdom.

We plead, Oath & I Re to accept this unfeigned Protestation of our Allegiance and Duty which upon all Occasions, we will be as ready to declare by our Actions as now by our Hands.
