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## ADDITIONAL ARTICLES

TO THE

## TREATY OF MARRIAGE,

*Concluded at London the 3d of May 1797, between His Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Wirtemberg, and Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal of England.*

**A**S by the demise of the late Duke of Portland, a Peer of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; of the Right Honourable William Pitt, Chancellor of the Exchequer; and of the late Baron de Rieger, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of His Serene Highness Frederick the late Duke of Wirtemberg, at the Court of London, being three of the Commissioners specially named on the part of their respective Sovereigns, for the dowry of Her Majesty, Charlotte Augusta Matilda, Queen Dowager of Wirtemberg, born Princess Royal of Great Britain, it is become necessary to complete the original number of Commissioners, and at the same time to confirm, in good and due form, the different acts made to the present time by the surviving Commissioners.

The undersigned Plenipotentiaries, that is to say, on the part of His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Robert Stewart, Viscount Castlereagh, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, one of His said Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, a Member of Parliament, Colonel of the Londonderry Regiment of Militia, and His Principal Secretary of State for the department of Foreign Affairs, &c. &c. &c.; and on the part of His Majesty the King of Wirtemberg, Major-General de Neuffer, Grand Cross of His Civil Order of Merit, Commander of His Military Order of Merit, Commander of the Imperial Austrian Order of Leopold, a Member of the French Royal Order of the Legion of Honour, and His Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of His Britannic Majesty, having met and exchanged their respective full powers, found in

good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:

### ARTICLE I.

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Majesty the King of Wirtemberg, confirm by these presents, in the most ample manner, and without reserve, and in conformity to the desire of Her Majesty the Queen Dowager of Wirtemberg, all acts whatsoever made in virtue of the Treaty of Marriage concluded at London the 3d of May 1797, between His Serene Highness Frederick William, Hereditary Prince of Wirtemberg, and Her Royal Highness Charlotte Augusta Matilda, Princess Royal of England, as well by the three Commissioners deceased, above-named, as by the two surviving Commissioners, the Right Honourable William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, Peer of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and Sir John Cox Hoppesley, Bart. Member of the British Parliament, collectively and individually.

### ARTICLE II.

The two High Contracting Parties have agreed to name, and they name by these presents, as Commissioners for the said dowry of Her Majesty the Queen Dowager of Wirtemberg, in the room of the three Commissioners deceased, as follows, viz. His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Robert Stewart, Viscount Castlereagh, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, and His Principal Secretary of State for the Department of Foreign Affairs, &c. &c. &c. and Herbert Taylor, Esq. Private Secretary of His said Majesty, and Major-General of His Armies; and His Majesty the King of Wirtemberg, Major-General De Neuffer, His Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of His Britannic Majesty; and they mutually grant to the said Commissioners, as well to the two surviving, as to the three named by these presents, all the powers and functions necessary for the full and entire execution of the Treaty of Marriage, concluded at London the 3d of May 1797, between His Serene Highness the Heredi-

tary Prince of Wirtemberg and Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal of England.

ARTICLE III.

The present Additional Articles shall have the same force and validity as the Treaty itself, and as if they were therein inserted word for word. They shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged in two months, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have thereunto affixed the seal of their arms.

Done at London, the 22d of May, in the year of our Lord 1817.

IT is ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Monday the twenty-fifth day of this instant August, be further prorogued to Monday the third day of November next.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 13th of August 1817,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 155, it is enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any private person or persons to import any goods, wares, or merchandise, from any port or place within the limits of the East India Company's charter, except only into such ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as shall be provided with warehouses, together with wet docks or basins, or such other securities as shall, in the judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, for the time being, or any three or more of them, in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, be fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon, and shall have been duly declared so to be, by the Order of His Majesty in Council, in Great Britain, or by the Order of the Lord Lieutenant in Council, in

Ireland: And whereas the port of Bristol has been deemed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in Great Britain to be fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the port of Bristol is a port fit and proper for the deposit and safe custody of all such goods, wares, and merchandise, as well as for the collection of all duties payable thereon.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Harry Hammond, of Richmond, in the county of Surrey, Esq. His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his issue, may, in compliance with an injunction contained in the last will and testament of his great uncle Harry Spencer, formerly of the parish of Saint George, Bloomsbury, in the county of Middlesex, Esq. deceased, take and use the surname of Spencer, in addition to and after that of Hammond, and bear the arms of Spencer; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Richard Baker, of Ebberston, in the North Riding of the county of York, Esq. His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he and his issue, may, in compliance with an express condition and proviso contained in the last will and testament of his maternal uncle George Watson, late of Old Malton Abbey, in the said county, Esq. deceased, from henceforth assume and take the surname of Watson only, instead of that of Baker, and also bear and use the arms of Watson; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise His Majesty's royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto the Rev. John Hogg, Clerk, Rector of Preston Bagot, in the county of Warwick, and diocese of Worcester, and Elizabeth his wife, His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that, in compliance with the wish of Sarah Ellis, the mother, and out of respect to the memory of Charles Cartwright, the maternal grandfather of the said Elizabeth Hogg, both deceased, they may take and use the surname of Cartwright, instead of their present surname, that the said John Hogg may bear the arms of Cartwright, and that the said surname of Cartwright may be taken and borne by the issue of their marriage respectively; provided the said arms be first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed John Davies, of Swansea, in the county of Glamorgan, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

*As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone*

*into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

*Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.*

**I**F any person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any artificer in wool, iron, steel, brass, or other metal, clock-maker, watch-maker, or any other artificer of Great Britain, to go into foreign countries out of the King's dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon indictment or information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any sum not exceeding **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** for the first offence, and shall be imprisoned three months, and till the fine be paid. And if any person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the discretion of the Court, and imprisoned twelve months, and till the fine be paid.

If any of the King's subjects, being such artificers, shall go into any country out of His Majesty's dominions, to exercise or teach the said trades to foreigners; and if any of the King's subjects in any such foreign country, exercising any of the said trades, shall not return into this realm within six months after warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the country where such artificers shall be, or by any person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this realm; such persons shall be incapable of taking any legacy, or of being an executor or administrator, or of taking any lands, &c. within this kingdom, by descent, devise, or purchase, and shall forfeit all lands, goods, &c. within this kingdom, to His Majesty's use, and shall be deemed alien, and out of His Majesty's protection.

Upon complaint made, upon oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any person is endeavouring to seduce any such artificer, or that any such artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's dominions, for the purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his warrant to bring the person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the oath of one witness, or by confession, that he was guilty of any of the said offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such person shall refuse to give security, the Justice may commit him to gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due course of law. And if any such artificer shall be convicted,

upon indictment, of any such promise, contract, or preparation to go beyond the seas, for the purpose aforesaid, he shall give such security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till security given.

If any of the above offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

*Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.*

IF any person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any artificer in wool, mohair, cotton, or silk, or in iron, steel, brass, or other metal, or any clock-maker, watch-maker, or any other artificer in any other of the manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this kingdom or Ireland into any foreign country not within the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon indictment or information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the county, &c. wherein such offence shall be committed in England, or by indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by indictment or information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such offence be committed in Ireland; the person so convicted shall, for every artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer imprisonment in the common gaol of the county or stewardry wherein such offender shall be convicted for twelve calendar months, and until forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent offence of the same kind, the persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer imprisonment in the common gaol of the county or stewardry wherein such offender shall be convicted, for two years, and until such forfeiture be paid.

If any person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any ship or boat, not bound directly to some port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such tools or utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the preparing, working up, or finishing of the woollen or silk manufactures, or any part of such tools, he shall, for every offence, forfeit all such tools, or parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by action of debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's warehouses, all such tools or utensils prohibited to be exported, as such officer shall find on board any vessel not bound directly to some port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all tools so seized shall, after condemnation, be publicly sold to the best bidder; and one moiety of the produce shall be to the use of His Majesty,

and the other moiety to the officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his vessel, he shall, for every such offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the penalties inflicted upon persons exporting the tools; and, if the vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his employment, and be incapable of any employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any entry outwards or sign any cocket or sufferance for the shipping or exporting of any of the said tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his office, and be incapable of any office under His Majesty.

One moiety of the forfeitures shall be applied to the use of His Majesty, and the other moiety to the use of the person who shall sue for the same.

*Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.*

BY these Statutes the like penalties and forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to persons packing or putting on board any vessel, not bound directly for some port in Great Britain or Ireland, any machine, engine, tool, press, paper, utensil, or implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the cotton, steel, or iron manufactures of this kingdom, or any part or parts of such machines or implements, or any models or plans thereof; and all Captains of ships and other persons receiving or being in possession of any such articles, with an intent to export the same to foreign parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of tools and utensils used in the woollen and silk manufactures.

**W**Hereas it hath been humbly represented unto His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that on the night of the 30th of July last, some person or persons did most cruelly and maliciously cut, maim, and destroy a hackney mare, and on the night of the 1st of August instant, did also cut, maim, and destroy a bullock, the property of George Haskins, and did also on the last mentioned night fire at the said George Haskins, with intent to kill him in his own dwelling house; and that there is reason to suppose that the above-mentioned outrages were committed out of malice and revenge towards the said George Haskins, for having zealously and faithfully discharged his duty as constable of the hamlet of Oldland;

His Royal Highness, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the person or persons concerned in the outrages above-mentioned, is hereby

pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually committed either of the outrages above-mentioned), who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **TWENTY-FIVE GUINEAS** is hereby offered by the Association for the Prosecution of Felons, in and round the neighbourhood of Cockroad, in the parish of Bitton, near Bristol, to any person or persons (except as is before excepted) who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof, or to any person or persons who shall apprehend and bring the offenders, or any of them, to conviction, or cause them, or any of them, so to be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid.

His Royal Highness, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the person or persons concerned in the felony above mentioned, is hereby pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually set fire to the said rick of hay), who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of **FIFTY POUNDS** is hereby offered by the said Charles Arnott, Esq. to any person or persons (except as is before excepted), who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; or to any person or persons who shall apprehend and bring the offenders, or any of them, to conviction, or cause them, or any of them, so to be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid.
