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Vizenna, June 8.

From Hungary they write, That the Baron de Saponara has had several Conferences with Count Teckley, and other Principal Commanders of the Malcontents, and that he found them very much disposed to Peace, and to accept of what was offered them on the Emperors behalf: It is so be wished this News may be confirmed, and that an end may at last be put to the Miseries and Devastations which that Country has so long suffered under. For other News we can only tell you, that the Imperial Troops are on their march; and that the Emperor has made Count Waldeck, who is General of the Forces of the Empire, one of the Marschals de Camp General of his Army.

Strasburg, June 12. This day our new Bishop parted from hence for *Saverne*, where great preparations have been made to receive him. The Baron de Monclar is gone for *Landau* to give the necessary Orders concerning the encamping of the Troops that are on their march thither. The Battalion of *Ansolt* that is here has orders to march to *Friburg*, and Monday of Tuesday next we expect here the Troops of the Kings Household that come from *Lorraine*.

Brussels, June 16. We have Advice that the Baron d'Hostell is got very well into *Luxemburg* with his Regiment, having passed through the French Quarters; but with so great diligence, that the French, if they had had a mind to hinder his march, had not time to do it. The Marquis de Bedmar is likewise marching with his Regiment to *Luxemburg*; and upon his arrival there the four *Italian* Regiments now in that Garrison, are to leave that place, and to go and take their Quarters in *Gelderland*.

Brussels, June 19. Yesterday his Excellency the Marquis de Grana returned hither from *Flanders*, very well satisfied with the States of that Province, who have in the Supply they have given his Excellency, exceeded what he had desired of them; and besides, the several Cities have made particular Presents to his Excellency: These his Excellency immediately disposed of for publick Services; and assured the States, That the Money's they gave should be employed towards the maintaining the Troops its necessary to keep on foot for their Defence and Preservation. This Morning his Excellency received Advice, by an Express, That the Marquis de Bedmar arrived the 17th instant with his Regiment at *Luxemburg*. The King of *Spain* has given the Order of the Golden Fleece to the Duke of *Hoß in Ploen*.

Paris, June 24. There are different Reports concerning the last Brief which the King received from the Pope, some assuring us, That it was in a style that very much pleased his Majesty; and others

again telling us, it was in terms very sharp, and threatening to Excommunicate the Deputies of the Clergy, if they went on as they had hitherto done. This is certainly that the said Deputies have not met since the King received that Brief, nor is it known when they will. In the mean time we have an Account, that the Parliaments of *Metz*, and of *Dole*, have not yet Registered the Kings Edict upon the late Declaration of the Clergy; and have sent hither their Reasons why they have not done it; it's believed the Parliaments of *Rennes* and of *Dyon* will follow the Example; and we expect to see what the *Sorbonne*, when they meet the first of the next month, will do in this Matter, and whether the sharp Reproof they received the last week from the Parliament, will have any effect upon them. On Sunday last two of the Doctors, who had opposed the Registering of the above-mentioned Edict, received a Command from the King immediately to leave the Society, and to repair the first to *Guingan* in *Britany*, and the other to *Iffoudun* in *Berry*, and there to continue till farther Order. The Kings Troops are marching towards the *Rhine*, as likewise towards *Italy*, which, and the preparations that are every where making, occasions discourses of War. There is a Report in Town, That as well the Imperial as the French Ambassadors are retired from *Francfort*; as likewise, that the Duke of *Savoy* is very ill; which, if true, are two very considerable pieces of News.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, Your Mayor and Approved Men of Your ancient Town and Burrough of *Goldesford* in Your County of *Surry*, seriously weighing how much our happiness, and that of all Your Majesties Subjects, depends on the rightful Succession of the Kings of this Realm, and the inevitable Grants of Jurisdictions given by God himself immediately to Emperors, Kings, and Princes, and in Succession to their Heirs; and calling to mind the direful Calamities and Mischiefs which have in former and latter times ensued the interruption of the Right of Descent of the Crown, and the Exercise of Regal Power, do most solemnly and sincerely declare, that we detest and abhor from our very Souls that Seditious and Treasonous Project of ASSOCIATION, (Printed in the Proceedings against the Earl of *SHAFTSBURY* at the Old-Bayly) for the Exclusion of Your Royal Brother from his Right of Succession to the Imperial Crown of this Realm.

And we heartily and with a stedfast Resolution, according to our bounden Duties and Allegiance, devote our Lives and Fortunes to be (Most Gracious Sovereign) at Your Princely dispose in defence of Your Sacred Person, Crown and Dignity, the Government as now Established in Church and State, and the Rightful Succession of the Imperial Crown of this Realm; according to the Right of Descent thereof.

We bless and magnifie (Great SIR) the Goodness of Almighty God in Your Majesties most happy and miraculous Restauration and Preservation of Your Sacred Person to this day, and for Your Royal Brothers late Preservation from the dangers of the Seas.

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
