

festy, solemnly and unanimously to declare from the bottom of our hearts, our utter Abhorrence and Detestation of the said Association, and all other Associations, Covenants, or Engagements whatsoever, (not directed, warranted, and approved by Your Majesty) and all and every the Contrivers, Maintainers, and Abettors of any and every such Associations, Covenants or Combinations; and shall endeavour to discover, all such as shall not declare their Abhorrence and Detestation, of those and all such-like doings; being justly doubtful, that if such Persons shall be permitted publickly to poison Your well meaning, but incosiderate Subjects, Your Majesties sacred Person and Life may be in great danger of destruction, and Your truly Christian and Loyall Subjects brought into the like Confusione they were under unto your death, Memories, & where the wickednes and basenes of such bludred, the Estates, impounding the Religions, and rooke away the Friends of all other Righte would not cast off all true Religion and Loyalty, and stearne a Vnapation or Democracy, and it last durst not that most Gloriouse Martyr Your Fisher of your Majesties Memorial. All which Desires, we hope by Your Majesties long life, (for which ever shall ever happen that the happy Return of the most incomparabile Kinges our Brother, may be delayed, and we also be partakers of those other Blessings and Benefits, which by the meane of Your Kingdom of Scotland (as themselves acknowledge) cometh,) And we hereby faithfully protest, we will upon all occasions engage our Lives and Fortunes in defence of Your Majesties Sacred Person, Your Heires and Lawfull Successors to the Church of England, and the Government of the Kingdomes, by Law, soeare Established, against all and every Contrivance, and Opposition whatsoever, and when Your Majestie shall please to call Your Parliament, we will do our utmost endeavours to obteane such Representaciones for this Your Burrough, as shall answer the true Exhortations of Your Majesties Writ for their Election, and Your Majesties Gracious Speech at their Convening; In all which, if we any thing fail, our Hands bereauely subscribed with testifie the falsoenes of our Hearts. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our Names, and caused our Common Seal to be fixed at the General Quarter-Sessions of the Peace holden by Adjournement in the County-Court of the said Burrough, the Twenty-first day of June, in the Four and thirtieth Year of Your Majesties Reigne.

Falmouth, June 22. The 20th instant came in here the Generall Merchant bound for Carolina, having on board above 100 Passengers that are going to settle there. And the next day, the Samuel of London, bound with about 180 Passengers for Pennsylvania; and the Princess of London bound for Guinea.

Plimouib, June 23. This day arrived here his Majesties Ship the Assurance, commanded by Sir Robert Robinson, from Cadiz.

Whitehall, June 26. This Morning the Council met extraordnarily, and the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriff of London Attending, and giving His Majesty an Account of what had passed on Saturday last at the Guildhall, and several Persons having been Examined upon Oath, it appeared to His Majesty, That the Lord Mayor having on the 24th of this instant June, called a Common-Hall, for the Confirming and Electing the Sheriffs for the year ensuing; and having afterwards thought fit, with the Advice of the Court of Aldermen, to Ad-

journ the Common-Hall till Tuesday morning, Mr. Pilkington and Mr. Shute, the Sheriffs, had notwithstanding gone ou with the Poll, which had occasioned a very great Riot.

Whereupon the two Sheriffs were by Order of the Board taken into Custody by a Serjeant at Arms, and committed Prisoners to the Tower by the following Warrant;

W<sup>H</sup>ereas it appears to his Majesty in Council, upon hearing of the Lord Mayor of London, and also upon the Examination of divers Witnesses upon Oath, That Thomas Pilkington and Samuel Shute Esquires, Sheriffs of London, upon the 24<sup>th</sup> of June instant, did promote and encourage a most enormous Riot within the said City, to the manifest endangering of the Publick Peace; These are thereto, for in his Majesties Name to require you to receive into Your Custody, the Bodies of the said Thomas Pilkington, and Samuel Shute herewith sent unto you, and them safely to keep till they shall be delivered by discourse of Law; For which this shall be your Warrant. At the Council Chamber at Whitehall the 26<sup>th</sup> June 1682.

Directed to the Lieutenant of the Tower.  
And, signed by the Lords of the Council.

And it was ordered by His Majesty in Council, That Mr. Attorney-General do forthwith exhibite an Information in the Kings-Bench against Thomas Pilkington and Samuel Shute Esquires, Sheriffs of London, and Agnes & Pringle Esq. one of the Aldermen of the said City, and such others as upon Examination shall be found to have bin Promoters and Encouragers of the said enormous Riot, and that he do proceed against them according to the utmost Severity of Law.
