WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, resident in the Island of Trinidad, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with every sentiment of attachment and veneration.

And whilst we deeply lament and hold in utter abhorrence the flagitious and disgraceful attempt recently made on the person of your Royal Highness, in returning from the constitutional exercise, in the House of Parliament, of one of the important regal functions committed to your care and execution, we request permission to offer your Royal Highness our most sincere and loyal congratulations on the providential escape of your Royal Highness from an attempt so nefarious in its nature, so odious in the sight of God, and, in contemplation of the wicked design, exitious to every principle of legitimate government.

And we beg leave also to assure your Royal Highness, that our anxiety upon this occasion is not diminished, by knowing that an act of so much atrocity has been committed under the blessings and protection of that Constitution, which has been so long the glory of the British empire, and the admiration of the world.
