To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects now resident in the City of New York, beg leave to express our most sincere and most heartfelt sympathy in the recent bereavement of the Royal Family, but we trust, that Divine Providence will enable your Royal Highness and all the other members of your illustrious House to see His hand in the calamitous event; and that the loyalty, spirit, and attachment of the British people, will enable them to surmount this, as they have surmounted other great and trying evils; and hand down to the latest posterity unimpaired, that constitution of King, Lords, and Commons, which has, in times of unexampled difficulty and danger, proved not only the safeguard of the British empire, but the deliverance of Europe and the World.

And above all, we trust, that our glorious constitution (more dear to us by absence and experience) will continue to flourish under the Star of Brunswick which has lighted it to its present pre-eminence in glory, a glory far transcending that of any nation that has yet appeared in the annals of the world.

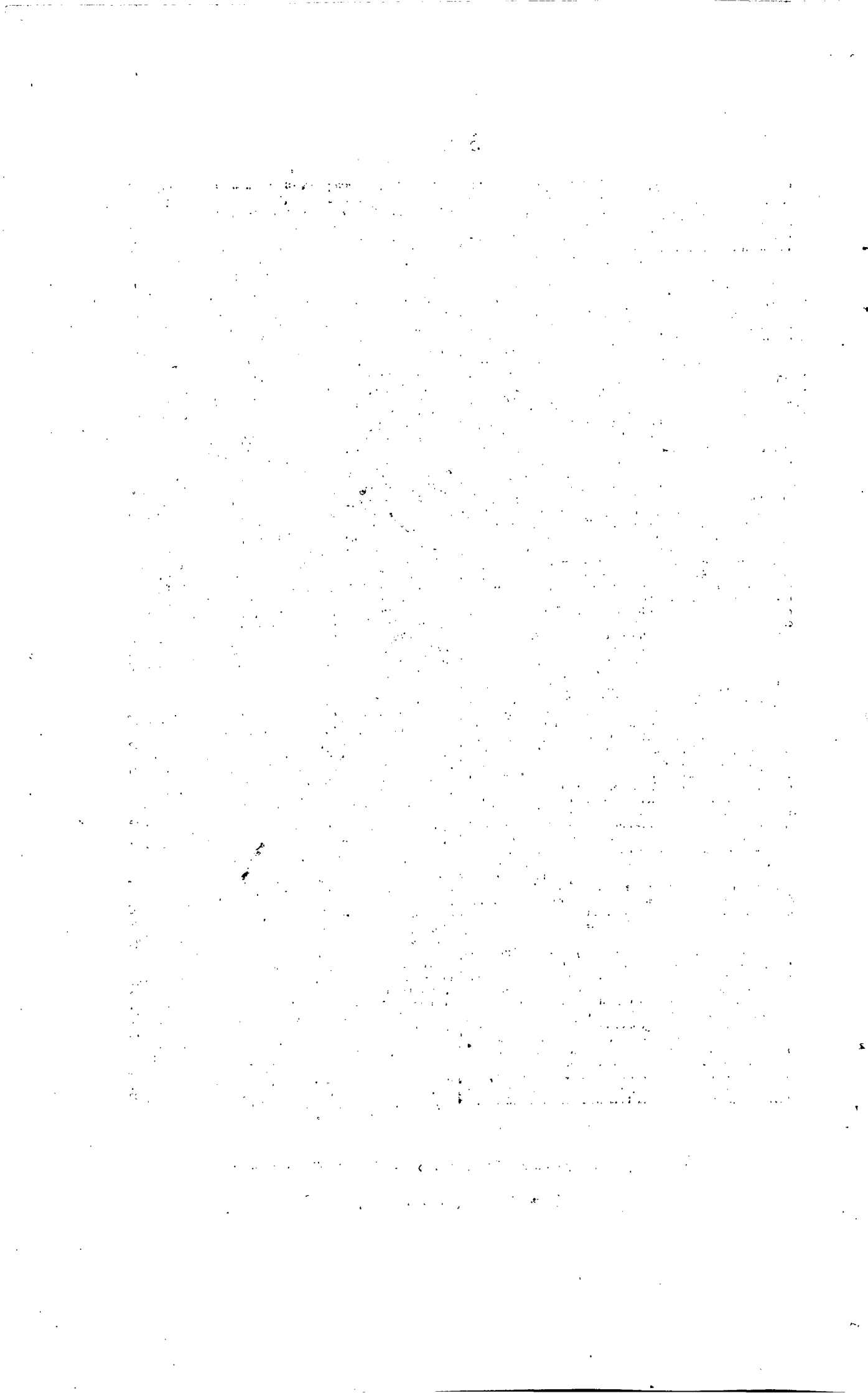
